It's time for fall shuffleboard leagues throughout the United States and Canada to start their play. It's also the most frustrating time of year for me when I think about the future of shuffleboard.

I strongly believe that if shuffleboard is ever going to be recognized as a sport, such as bowling and golfing, it is imperative for us to organize, sanction every league everywhere and, most important, adopt one set of rules for everyone. Boards should be well-maintained and kept in good playing condition, with pucks in good condition as well, and adequate supplies on hand.

To make it fair for all teams, regardless of the league, a legitimate handicap system must be developed. It's what makes bowling and golf leagues thrive. The one suggested in The Hammer of the June issue may work or there may be other ideas.

Just think of the rewards for shuffleboarders if we were able to organize throughout the nation. We could then have our own genuine state tournaments and crown a champion in each state. From there we would pick a site for the nationals, compete in them and declare a national champ each year. We could keep records of teams and individual accomplishments and even create our own Hall of Fame for deserving players. This, I'm sure, is the way to attract sponsors. We must show them we are worthy of their sponsorship.

Both of us are interested in knowing what your rates would be to advertise in your paper for a nice 14-16 ounce mug with a really sharp shuffleboard logo (mail order).

At any rate, I'm subscribing to your paper. It's refreshing to at least read about shuffleboard. Early next year I plan on entering some tournaments. Omaha, Neb., is fairly close.

Looking forward to my next issue. I have Larry Tafoya to thank for turning me on to *The Board Talk*.

Pardon the headline, Brad. We just couldn't resist! You can't imagine how excited we get when a new subscriber expresses an interest in advertising. We need this revenue to keep on delivering what you describe (bless you!) as the "greatest thing to happen in the World of Shuffleboard." Since we started publishing in January 1984, only two advertisers, Sun-Glo of New Jersey and A & M Amusement Service of California, have been consistent month-aftermonth supporters. Others have been loyal in responding to seasonal specials, but it's these two advertisers who placed their faith in a newborn, sometimes very wobbly, toddler that still has a ways to go before it's a profit-making venture.

So, pardon us too, Brad, for answering your letter publicly in the hope that other businesses that can capitalize on our very special audience will "listen" to this sales pitch.

What we recommend for you is a quarter-page ad with an order coupon in the October and November issues to promote special Christmas gifts (\$65 per ad) and then switch to a Shuffleboard Directory listing (\$12 per month or \$100 per year if paid in advance) as a reminder that shuffleboard mugs are great for birthdays and other special occasions. Because table shuffleboard is not a widely-recognized sport (see The Hammer), it's not likely that mugs such as you describe are easily available elsewhere.
