The Hammer

Our recent trip to Shuffleboard Land (see "Indiana Diary" on page 2) and the number of questions we got from new subscribers and advertisers regarding our origination got us to thinking. There's really only a handful of shuffleboarders who witnessed the birth of this publication, who know why its parents made the decision to have this post-menopause child and who these crazy people are who messed up a fairly normal life with the uncertainty of a risky venture.

It all started in December of 1983. George was secretary of the Greater Lansing Area Shuffleboard League. He distributed the weekly standings to all the participating bars and often added little tidbits of news on the bottom of the sheet. (Once upon a time, we were publishers of a weekly newspaper and it's hard to break the habit!) As secretary of one of the most active leagues in the state, he received flyers from bars that were sponsoring tournaments and he posted those on the bulletin boards along with the standings.

The wheels started turning...wouldn't a newsletter to all the shuffleboarders of the state be a real service to the sport? George had the knowledge, the dedication and awareness of the benefits of shared information; Donna had the experience and skills of writing and packaging the information. Let's go for it!

There would be no subscription fee, we decided. Surely, the bars that benefited from the business of regular league play and especially those who profited from the big business of tournament play would be willing to provide us with enough advertising revenue so we wouldn't have to charge the players for a newsletter that would, in the long run, benefit the shuffleboard businesses.

Vol. 1, No. 1 came off the presses in January 1984. A few local bars carried the burden of "Good Luck, Board Talk" messages and George climbed into his beat-up old van to peddle the baby. We were far more excited about its birth, we discovered, than anyone else.

Simultaneously with the birth of *The Board Talk*, one of our Michigan shuffleboarders, Lee McDonald, earned the right to participate in a national tournament in Las Vegas. We scrimped and saved and followed him there. We took along a few copies of the first *Board Talk* and distributed them to the players there. As long as we were covering the tournament, we thought, we might as well send copies of the second issue to the people from other states who participated.

Overnight, it seemed, we went from being a state publication to a national. That was fine, except it was beginning to cost us a lot of money. The dream of publishing a newsletter — state or national — that would be subsidized by advertis-



Taking the advice of the Hoosier state license plates to "Wander Indiana," we did just that the first week of May. The Bourbon American Legion's annual Spring Tournament on May 3 was the best excuse we could think of to sneak out of work a bit early Friday afternoon and head south.

We made a detour on our way to Bourbon, wandering through Amish country to find Topeka, a small dot on the map, to see Layton Pergrem at Perg's. Layton had inquired about a gift certificate to *The Board Talk* for a very important person. We obliged and were happy for the opportunity to deliver it in person.

Layton said he had some players who would like to participate in our 4th of July tournament but were concerned about being amateurs in a field of professionals. We told him that *The Board Talk* tournament is their tournament. It's got something for everybody, no matter what level of play they've achieved.

Just as *The Board Talk* is the voice of everyone in The World of Shuffleboard, so is *The Board Talk* tournament an event for everyone in that select circle. There's nothing more exciting than to watch the "champs" compete on the boards, but it's equally as exciting to see "rank and file" members, who pump a continual stream of quarters in the machine trying to better their game, take the big step into the world of tournament play.

We hope the players at Perg's and throughout the nation get that message and turn out for *The Board Talk*'s second annual tournament, July 4-6, in Howell, Mich.

Bourbon: Small Town — Big Tourney

You'll find the results of this tournament in Tourney Talk; what you're going to get here are some views from the sidelines and backstage....

Frankly speaking, it's been kind of a sore spot with us that this tourney could be such a success year after year without our help! We'd been to Bourbon tournaments long before we started *The Board Talk* and we just assumed they'd be one of our "headliners" once we began publishing. We sent them a complimentary copy for well over a year but never heard a word from them — no promotion of the tourneys, no results, no subscriptions, no ads (a humbling experience to counteract the swelled egos created by positive feedback from tournament sponsors who said we made a difference!).

Why did this particular tournament continue to attract players from many states? That was a question to which we were determined to find an answer.

It started out, we're convinced, because shuffleboard players have big hearts. When two avid local players, Bill Knox and Butch Visel, were killed in an auto accident near Niles, Mich., in 1973, Butch's dad spearheaded an American Legion shuffleboard tournament as a memorial to them. It became an annual event in memory of two people who were an important part of The World of Shuffleboard until an untimely death ended their competition on the boards.

In the 13 years between 1973 and 1986, some of the initial hype and reason behind the annual tourney has faded for most players. For the majority of the 92 players who participated in the 1986 tourney, the big pot and recognition were likely the key motivators.

Jerry Knox was an exception. He's still very much aware of the "roots" of this tournament — his brother's death. You can tell by talking with him that he felt a win for him would be a win for his brother.

If there is a special spot in heaven for shuffleboard players, we know that at least three people "up there" were watching the May 3 tournament with keen interest and pride. One would be Bill Knox as he watched his brother capture second place honors over a tough field of competitors. Another would be Butch Visel. The other would be Michigan's Ed Estep as he watched his friends drink a toast to shuffleboard, a tradition he started and continues today as a tribute to his memory.

So, as memories fade, why doesn't participation? We found a couple good reasons . . .

Ingredients of "Recipe" for Success

Both players and spectators appreciate a smoothly-run tournament and this one certainly is that! The pre-tourney banter between Mike Koontz and Steve Banic sounded like a Laurel and Hardy comedy but once the action started, they were all business. As soon as a match was completed, the next team was "on deck" and the boards were ready for play.

The efficient, no-nonsense style of auctioneer Steve Hart added yet another layer of smoothness. (His recognition of *The Board Talk* editors and his audience's response brought lumps in our throats that took a few drinks to dissolve!) The friendliness of the Legionaires, the good food they serve, the good sportsmanship of the players and the enthusiasm of the spectators were also important ingredients in their recipe for a successful tournament.

From the Sidelines

It was fun to greet old friends, meet new ones and relate faces and personalities to the names we print in *The Board Talk*.

There was that colorful character, Orris Hughes Jr. of Indiana, who proclaims to the world that he's a shuffleboarder

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by listing that profession in the telephone directory. He tells *The Board Talk* editors that he has another profession but we can't print that in this family publication.

There was the "man of few words" from Michigan, O. B. Brimm, who asked us why we never put his name in *The Board Talk*. We told him to do something and we would, so he and his partner, Jeff Cottrell, put up a valiant battle on the boards to get their names in the headlines. While that didn't work, O. B. did get his name in print.

There was our good friend, Larry Creakbaum of Indianapolis, who also tried to get his name in print legitimately by winning (and he came close) or by bribery. The latter worked.

There was Shirley Harris and her lovely daughter from Ohio who proved that women are tournament contenders to be reckoned with and that this is a family sport that spans any generation gap.

There was Indiana *Board Talk* reporter Steve Hart who took a lot of ribbing for his fashionable wearing apparel. He could be the dress code pacesetter for shuffleboard that Arnie Palmer is for golf, Pat Riley is for basketball and Tom Landry is for football. There were a few of us at the Las Vegas tournament a couple years ago who were relieved when the anticipated TV crews didn't show up. Rag-bag reject pants and hot temperature-dried T-shirts that no longer covered bulging midriffs would have projected an image of the sport that we sure don't need. Steve knew he'd take some ribbing but perhaps he was making a statement that shuffleboarders, if they truly desire the media recognition that other sports receive, ought not to ignore.

We arrived at The Palace just in time to help move out one shuffleboard and bring in one newly refinished by Bob Corn of Redkey. Bob, a railroad worker who recovers pool tables, reupholsters furniture and refinishes shuffleboards in his "spare" time, is gaining a good reputation throughout Indiana for his expertise. We invited him to Michigan to help us tackle a growing pile of boards in our garage. (He accepted, brought his equipment and his lovely wife, Linda, and we spent a grueling but productive weekend together refinishing three boards.)

Anderson was our next stop to visit with the father and son team of Bob and Tom Vorndran, owner-operators of The Triangle in Anderson and Monty's in Chesterfield, both shuffleboard hot-spots. The Vorndrans have relatives in Michigan not far from our *Board Talk* 4th of July tournament site. We hope we talked them into coming.

We stopped in Portland to say hello to Bob and Marcia Brown at The American Bar, but they had "gone fishin" so we took some notes about upcoming tournaments from their bulletin board.



The "recalled" rejects are now piled on the plant floor beside crated new topquality boards ready for delivery.

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and service are all part of what Playfair has to offer (see ad in this issue).


We liked Brian. He's going to be an important part of The World of Shuffleboard.

I say to all tourney promoters: ask what the players want in a tourney. Some answers will likely be: room enough to play, good sportsmanship, trophies and a threeman referee team.

That is a bad deal to travel 1,500 miles for a tourney that was a bust! We would like to explain the difference between promoting and advertising a tournament in The Board Talk. We don't charge a cent to promote any tournament in Tourney Talk. It does cost money to advertise. The tourney to which you are referring was promoted in Tourney Talk; the sponsor did not purchase advertising. While advertising cannot guarantee a successful tournament, it does show commitment on the part of the sponsor to gain as much participation as possible. P. T. invested in two full-page ads and we sure hope they worked! We are not saying, however, that a Board Talk ad will ever carry a money-back guarantee with it. Good promotion should include advertising, but it's building a reputation for well-run tournaments that really draws the players and keeps them coming back.

ing, vanished in a hurry. In April 1984, we started charging subscribers a \$10 a year fee to help cover expenses.

The Growing Pains

So, what happened? Advertisers (with few exceptions) backed off because we didn't have the circulation they felt would benefit them. Subscribers (with few exceptions) didn't want to commit \$10 because they weren't sure they'd get a next issue. Reporters (with few exceptions) fell by the wayside because we couldn't deliver what we promised for their volunteer services.

At the end of over two years of struggle, the publishers said, "this is not fun at all!" and sent out the message — this is for sale to anyone who can do it better. Nobody answered. Was it goodbye *Board Talk*? Or was it....

Hope on the Horizon?

Overnight, it seemed, tournament sponsors began to recognize *The Board Talk* as a viable vehicle to spread the good word about their events. Players decided that knowing what was going on in The World of Shuffleboard was worth a \$10 investment. We started getting enough news to add more pages.

Two years and three months after deciding to "go for it," we were able to pay for an issue without dipping into our personal account. It was a breakthrough and we celebrated!

Where We Are Today

There are a lot of people we've met in our limited travels and phone conversations who have a false image of *The Board Talk*'s "headquarters." They have this mind-picture of an office with a receptionist to take their calls and connect them with the editors. Wrong! *The Board Talk*'s "office" fluctuates between our kitchen table, an enclosed porch during the warm months and an upstairs bedroom during the cold winter months. The telephone, located in the living room, goes unanswered much of the time because there is no receptionist.

George has a shuffleboard refinishing and service business that demands a lot of his time weekdays and weekends — and tests the fortitude of the same old beat-up van that delivered the first *Board Talk*. Donna is beginning her 20th year with the Michigan Farm Bureau, serving as assistant. director of information and public relations, no 8 to 5 job.

Unless we win the Michigan Lotto, it will be another 10 years of burning the midnight oil to turn out The Board Talk
