THE HAMMER

It's difficult, when you've directed so much of your time and energies toward one event, to get back to "normal." But as you all know, there is life after a tournament....

The first order of business is to salute the people who helped make our 3rd annual tournament a success (players from 11 states participated; it would have been 12 if New York's Al Ryan hadn't been involved in an accident on his way to Michigan. Thank God he's O.K.!).

When a bar sponsors a tournament, the payoff comes from the products players and spectators consume—and that's a pretty healthy payoff if it's a tournament of any size. But when you're not a bar owner—like us—staging a tournament is an expensive proposition. Thanks to the growing number of co-sponsors throughout The World of Shuffleboard who contributed toward door prizes, trophies, and printed programs, it was less expensive this year than it was for the first and second annual Board Talk tournaments (see listing of co-sponsors in the July issue).

That still means a lot of volunteer effort is involved and we can't put a monetary value on the amount of effort that our volunteers contributed! We're not very comfortable "passing the hat", but we did have a jar where players and spectators could drop in their change as a "tip" for the volunteers. The result was \$80 to be split eight ways. That's \$10 each for about 38 hours of work, plus they had to foot their own bills for travel, lodging and food. That's dedication, and we salute:

- Joe Kowaleski, who traveled from the northern tip of Michigan's "mitten" to be our co-director. Nobody can do it like he does!
- Steve Hart, who came all the way from Tuscon, Arizona, to be our auctioneer for the third consecutive year. He's set a precedent we hope will never be broken!
- Rob Kern, who got less "breaks" than anyone involved in the tournament. Never did he leave his post at the charts, except to prep a board when no other official was available.
- Larry Creakbaum, Bobby Voorhis and Gordy Collins, who were always there to make a decision and prep a board for the next match.
- Mary Lisle, Josie Bordayo and Jamie Kay, who signed up the players for the various events and handled the auction money and records. With thousands of dollars involved, where would a tournament director/sponsor be without such a dedicated, trustworthy support system?

It didn't pay this vital support system to be volunteers for our tournament; it cost them! We're probably not unique and that's why we're posing this question to The World of Shuffleboard: Has the time come when we should consider taking a small percentage "off the top" of the entry/auction pot to at least pay the expenses of those who play a key role in staging a tournament? Ask yourself, as a player, would you work for 26ϕ an hour? Would you trade a few dol-

We have found two boards so far (regulation) and some 16 foot boards. Madge says hello, and she hopes no one gets her job of keeping the round robins going.



Cheryl Collins and Jerry Siebert, both of Michigan, each earned a new set of weights for signing up 25 new Board Talk subscribers.



Pro Player Profile



VIEWPOINTS FROM THE TOURNAMENT DIRECTOR



For days after a tournament, you catch yourself shaking your head, chewing your nails, scratching where there's no itch, and asking yourself—did it go O.K.? Did they like it? We probably should have...... If we had it to do over again, we'd......

We had a minimum of problems at the 3rd Annual Board Talk Tournament over the 4th of July weekend, but they seemed pretty big at the time:

- I shouted at one of my unpaid officials because he suggested we alter a rule. I got my way; he kept his cool, and it worked out O.K.
- A doubles team got irritated because the officials insisted on holding to our number rotation instead of skipping ahead. They were forced to play on a board they didn't want to. Yeh, you guessed it! They won on the board they wanted to avoid, but then lost on the board they wanted.
- We had a player who said he'd forfeit before he'd play a certain board. Fortunately he didn't have to play it. Fortunate for him, that is, because he played it the next game with no problem.
- We lost a couple of our long-distance players who couldn't stay as late as the doubles were projected to last (they ended at approximately 10 p.m. on Sunday night), and there were pressures from other out-of-staters to change our format. We stuck to the schedule (and those who put the pressure on were probably glad we did!). It was great for the establishment because it kept a good crowd to the end of the tournament, but not so great for those from afar. In retrospect, our biggest mistake was not using all four boards for the mixed doubles which had 18 teams.
- The women, with the least number of entries (13) ended up taking the brunt of our mistake in not using all four boards for the mixed doubles. They had to finish their event under difficult circumstances—fitting them in on available boards during the open doubles and playing during a distracting auction. Hopefully, they'll forgive me.

If all this sounds familiar to you—it's just another day in the life of a tournament director....







There are two subjects we wish to address this month. The first one is some thoughts generated by last month's Hammer column, which discussed a letter from "A Group of Concerned Players." The second is a list of rules which the Shuffleboard Federation will use in their tournaments.

We would like to start out by saying that we would like to include ourselves in that group of "concerned players." Also, as stated in The Hammer last month, we certainly want to recognize all those who have worked to promote the game we all love. Taking credit for someone else's ideas is not what we are about. In fact, we do not claim to have any original ideas.

It is our intention to assemble all the best ideas from players on both coasts and everywhere in between.

Shuffleboard is a unique mix of mental and physical stamina which has not received even a fraction of the attention and recognition it deserves. It is our intention to remedy that situation, and we will need the cooperation and participation from players everywhere to accomplish this.

State and divisional pride can be a wonderful thing, but it can also be destructive. We need to put all the politics of the past aside and move forward.

Over the last year, we have had the opportunity to visit and compete in many different areas of the country. Players everywhere have a genuine desire to see their sport become a professional sport.

Imagine then our shock when, after approaching various bar owners all over the country and presenting our ideas about a standard set of rules and a "tour" with a national champion to be determined by a point system, and being turned down with a curt, "No, thank you. We don't need anyone to tell us how to run a tournament."

The solution to this problem, in our opinion, is for the players to band together. We do not want to take shuffleboard out of the bars. Rather, we would like to be able to address the bar owners as a group and ask them for cooperation in the areas of rules and playing conditions.

We would like to extend an invitation to concerned players everywhere to unify and support us so that our dreams may become a reality.

The second subject we want to address is a standard set of

rules. We will use the ones listed below as a starting point and will add and subtract accordingly to whatever feedback we receive from the players.

Please contact the players' association representative in your division (see names and addresses in July issue of *The Board Talk*), in writing, and let us know what you think.

By the way, thank you, Jerry Siebert of Michigan, for sharing your thoughts (both positive and negative) about the Michigan Open.

The Shuffleboard Federation official rules:

- 1. No score, hammer changes.
- 2. Tie weights, no score, hammer changes.
- 3. Weights in question to be decided by officials only.
- 4. Any weight in danger of falling off the end of the board may be made safe.
- 5. No blasting on a clean board; 1 point penalty.
- 6. Wax rails only.
- 7. More than 5 minutes late for match, 1 point per minute penalty; forfeit of first game shall constitute forfeit of entire match.
- 8. Respect players on boards next to you.
- 9. Stay at the end of board until all weights have been delivered; one warning, then 1 point penalty.
- All players will shake hands before and after each match.
- 11. No harassment of players while shooting; no warning: 2 point penalty.
- 12. No drinks or cigarettes in hands while shooting.
- 13. No changing weights from one board to another; automatic disqualification.
- 14. Tampering with boards' wax or weights will result in automatic disqualification.
- 15. Flip for hammer before first game; loser gets hammer second game; third game flip.
- 16. Players are encouraged to bring their own weights.
- 17. All tournaments will be 2 out of 3 double elimination.
- Players may walk to opposite end of board to examine position of weights.
- 19. More than 1 minute in between shots shall constitute slow play; 1 point penalty.
- 20. In doubles matches, three time-outs of 2 minutes each will be allowed per team.
- 21. If the object weight (weight being shot at) has wax on the sides which may result in a "soft" or "mush" hit, you may have an official wipe off and re-spot the weight.
- 22. If a call needs to be made on a weight, a committee of three people will be used.
- 23. If a player has a weight made safe and then outlags it, the lag will not count.


