An editorial policy that permits unsigned letters gives free license to those who have personal gripes or axes to grind but aren't willing to take the feedback that their letters stimulate. Writers should have the courage of their convictions and sign their names with pride. This is to serve notice that this letter from "Concerned Players" will be the last unsigned letter we will publish.

Let's Work Together From Coast to Coast

We are avid readers of *The Board Talk* and look forward to its arrival each month. But we are disappointed and aggravated that the Northern California players receive so little, if any, recognition.

Let's give credit where credit is due! The rules listed in the April Board Talk were assembled by PeeWee Ramos of San Jose, Calif., constructed, printed and given to each player by Fred Thumann of Auburn, Calif., at a tournament held by Jerry and Sharon Miller at the Ace of Clubs, Marysville, Calif. We totally agree that there should be uniform rules for tournaments. For years Bill Melton, PeeWee Ramos, Gene and Shirley Johnson from the Black Cat Tavern in Portland, Oregon, Fred Thumann, Jerry and Sharon Miller, along with others from the West Coast have worked to promote the game, but no one listened.

It is not our intention to take away from those now trying to improve the game — John McDermott, Bill Melton, Dave Williams, Glen Davidson, to mention a few. The Board Talk is doing a great job of getting the news to players.

We love the game, too, but money, time involved with no one caring finally took its toll. Twenty years of unrecognized effort can break anyone's spirit.

Let's ALL work together from coast to coast on making the game of shuffleboard a professional sport.

New Oklahoma League Sanctions Players

The Arbuckle Shuffleboard league was founded this past year by Alan Primrose of Davis, Okla. The league consisted of six teams with six members per team, representing four taverns in the Sulphur/Davis area of southern Oklahoma. A total of 56 sanctioned players (regulars and substitutes) played nine games to 15 points, short line/switch hammer, every Thursday night.

From all indications, the league will have at least 10 teams next season and we are all looking forward to the 2nd Annual Arbuckle Open Tournament next year (see Tourney Talk for results), which we plan to advertise in *The Board Talk*.

The Board Talks's Top 50 Players in the U.S.A.

Top Players Commentary:

In the January 1987 issue, Gary A. Moore from Tulsa, Okla., had this to say about our rating of players:

"For several reasons, I disagree with your Top 20 ratings. Have you considered all the options? How about a Top 50 rating? Or an Honorable Mention list? Or a men's and women's Top 50 list?

"(1) How can a person be declared No. 1 and then drop 14 places in two months? If a person is No. 1, shouldn't they hold that position for a year? Or at least six months?

(2) I don't like to see rankings based only on the number of tournaments that a person might attend. Not many players can afford to spend \$500 to \$1,000 to attend a tournament — and take a week off. There are many players who have competed well with those ranked in the Top 20. Let's not forget them just because they don't have the money to travel and compete; therefore the Honorable Mention list.

"(3) Or a ballot distributed to the players in each state for their ranking of players within that state, a comparison with your rankings. Let the players vote on the Top 20 or 50 or Honorable Mention list.'

Ironically, we changed our format before we received his letter. However, the questions he posed will get top billing here

(1) In our desire to have the very best players represented in their divisions, and because we are in our infancy, it won't be unusual to see a player drop out of the ratings from one month to another. Some players are so evenly matched that it's only fair to raise or lower them in the rating depending on how they do from one tournament to another, and we'll allow more recognition for winning a singles event than for a doubles.

(2) If a person doesn't attend tournaments, how can we rank them? Possibly there is some very deserving players out there and it's a shame they can't afford the tournaments because small local tournaments won't get them the recognition. We've had phone calls, letters and been "cornered" personally by players who have won local tournaments of 12 teams or less while playing on their favorite board against local players. An Honorable Mention list? We've never seen it done in this type of rating. Perhaps if we were compiling the best in the nation once a year, it would be good.

(3) A ballot might be a great idea. Maybe we'll try one in The Board Talk monthly and see if we get better feedback on players than we have been getting. We probably couldn't talk Jimmy the Greek into having his staff scour the countryside and send in a monthly report.

We're scratching our heads over a comment Shirley Robertson of Tulsa made in the April 1987 issue. She said she noticed that when Diana Hagen's name showed up on the national list, the method for determining top players changed. That method was changed by popular demand to have a Top Ten Women Players list. However, we believe we do have a problem after watching some of these women "kick ---" in the open tournaments. Is it right to have a separate women's listing and still rate them in the other

ratings, where some of them certainly deserve to be? What we're saying is, we'll leave it up to you to help us decide whether to continue with the women's listing or drop it. We'll need your feedback.

You'll note, "Concerned Players," that when we published the proposed rules, we did indicate that they were known as the "Ramos Rules" and it should be a real tribute to PeeWee that a national organization would use them as the basis for establishing national uniform shuffleboard rules.

The "Concerned Players" are unhappy because after 20 years of effort, some new kids on the block are in the spotlight. We remind them that some of those "new kids" have no idea in the world that somebody before them tried to accomplish what they're trying to do today. We admit that when we started The Board Talk, we didn't know anyone in Northern California played shuffleboard, let alone tried to initiate uniform tournament rules nationwide. We had no recorded history to refer to then.

We've learned that was a misconception and the "Concerned Players" need to accept the fact that The World of Shuffleboard (east, west, north and south) is full of people who just joined yesterday or today. They don't mean to take anything away from the 20-year veterans; they just operated under the assumption that their ideas were original.

As for the fact that "no one listened," perhaps that was because there was no vehicle through which promoters of the game could communicate nationwide. We hope *The Board Talk* fills that void. We'll certainly try! Its pages are open to the viewpoints of those who have invested 20 years of effort into getting the sport recognized. as well as those who are new to the game.

"Concerned Players" do raise a question of accountability. At the Corporate Image in Fort Worth, Texas, last February, eight people accepted the responsibility of serving on a committee to develop a plan to organize a national shuffleboard organization. Four months later, any meeting of, or communications between, members of that committee have not been reported to *The Board Talk*.
