Central Indiana Action



From California to Delaware, Oregon to Florida, and places in between, shuffleboarders gathered at The Corporate Image in Ft. Worth, Texas, Feb. 10- 16, for one of the biggest events of the year. Billed as a "Shuffleboard Extravaganza," it lived up to its name with players vying for a pot of nearly \$47,000.

While the "official" tourney didn't start until Friday the 13th, there was plenty of action all week long on the four Bill Melton boards. Owner Dave Williams had broken through a wall to add another room for the anticipted crowd giving ample room and pleasant surroundings for spectators and players. Depending upon your financial situation, you could play a friendly game for a drink, participate in \$20 or \$50 round robins or dare for much higher stakes (which some did!).

#### Organized Shuffleboard: Pipedream or Possibility?

Interested shuffleboarders took a break from the boards Thursday afternoon to discuss if, how and when their sport could get organized nationally so it can enjoy the same recognition and sponsor support as other sports.

The meeting had excellent representation of a crosssection of The World of Shuffleboard — geographically, professional and amateur, bar owners and players, and even currently existing organizations. Everyone knew going in that reaching a concensus of opinion would be difficult, but most also recognized the value of organizing and that the time was right to start acting instead of just talking.

While the group didn't emerge from that smoke-filled room with an organization charter in hand, they did take a few tentative steps which they hope will bring shuffleboard closer to being an organized sport. And while participants didn't come to a final decision on how it should be accomplished, the call for "good sportsmanship" on the part of everyone involved in shuffleboard was unanimous.

A committee, headed by John McDermott of Michigan and composed of Darrol Nelson, Oregon; Bill Melton, Okla.; Karl Spickelmier, Calif.; Jodie Slack, Colo.; P.T.,

Texas; Don Casula or Dick Gorman, Dela.; and George Wilber of The Board Talk, will develop a plan to submit to members of The World of Shuffleboard to gain their input.

Objectives discussed included uniformity of tournament rules so players know what to expect regardless of location; development of association chapters in each state; sanctioning of players; and sponsorship of at least four major sanctioned tournaments per year — one in each of the four divisions. These association-sponsored tournaments would be held in hotels with "neutral" boards rather than in bars.

What would this mean to the tournaments that have become a tradition for The Corporate Image, The Ace of Clubs, P.T.'s, Stagger Inn, The Board Talk and others? They won't be affected unless the sponsors wish to have their tournaments sanctioned by the association. It is hoped that the incentives for being sanctioned will make that happen.

Ideas for sanction fees for players ranged from \$3 to \$100 per year and a split fee system — one fee for amateurs and another for professionals. How to make the distinction between an amateur and a pro, which is often a fine line, remained unsolved.

Other topics of discussion included required advance registration for tournaments with 25% of the entry fee (transferrable if necessary) submitted two weeks in advance with a time line and percentage for refunds; paid seating for spectators; the need for incorporation as a non-profit association, and bonding of a treasurer when elected.

Not discussed was a name for the new association. Its founders will have to take into consideration that there already exists a U.S. Shuffleboard Association, a Professional Shuffleboard Association, and an American Shuffleboard Association. To this point, the sport has been so fragmented that there may be more with names unknown. They hope that whatever the name, it will someday have the same recognition and acceptance as the PGA, ABC and NFL.

In upcoming issues of The Board Talk, watch for suggested uniform tournament rules and other committee proposals and send your reaction and ideas to the editors.

# West Vs. Midwest: Battle of the Divisions

In a battle that went down to the last lag of the 9th game, the West beat the Midwest in a battle of the divisions that followed the meeting. Both teams gave spectators plenty to cheer about in the doubles competition.

In the first match, Midwesterners Dave Williams and Bill Melton beat the dynamic Western duo of Billy Chiles and Darrol Nelson. The Midwest made it a 2-0 match when Billy Mays and Sam Summers took the second game from Leroy Ledford and Don Cox. Then the West evened things up with two consecutive wins — Fred Thumann and John McDermott over Glen Davidson and Bob White, and the Cox-Ledford team beating Melton and Williams.

The Mays-Summers team tipped the scales in the Midwest's favor 3-2 with a win over Thumann and McDermott. Making it a 3-3 tie were Chiles and Nelson beating White and Davidson.

A tough match between Thumann-McDermott and Melton-Williams resulted in a victory for the Midwest. That 4-3 edge was erased by a Chiles-Nelson win over Mays and Summers.

In an exciting tie-breaker game, the Cox-Ledford team brought victory to the West with a close 15-14 win over White and Davidson. Leroy lagged the winning three and



The result was a big auction pot of nearly \$38,000.

High in the doubles bidding were Billy Chiles (Calif.) and Darrol Nelson (Oregon); Bill Melton (Okla.) and Dave Williams (Texas); Glen Davidson (Okla.) and Rick Boyer (Texas); Leroy Ledford and Don Cox (Calif.); Billy Mays and Earl Kelly (Texas); John McDermott (Mich.) and Karl Spickelmier (Calif.); Sam Summers (Okla.) and Howard Mouton (Texas).

In the singles, Darrol Nelson, Billy Mays, Billy Chiles, Leroy Ledford, Bill Melton, Glen Davidson, Don Cox, John McDermott and Dave Williams brought the highest bids.

#### **Defending Champs Retain Doubles Title**

Whoever said shuffleboard wasn't an exciting spectator sport had never seen the best players in the nation bump heads. The gallery was lined up six deep, some standing on chairs to get a peek at the action.

Billy Mays and Earl Kelly of Texas, last year's champions, kept their title in a tough bout against challengers Bill Melton, Okla., and Corporate Image host Dave Williams. Bill and Dave were the only unbeaten team in the 21-team field until Billy and Earl wiped out that distinction with two consecutive wins.

John McDermott (Mich.) and Karl Spickelmier (Calif.) beat favorites Darrol Nelson (Oregon) and Billy Chiles (Calif.) to assure themselves third place. Eric Waldman (Calif.) and "Portland Eddy" Graves (Texas) finished in fifth spot.

**Nelson Earns Top Rating** 

The Board Talk's top-rated player in the Pacific Division, Darrol Nelson of Oregon, and Bill Melton of Oklahoma, second-rated player in the Midwest Division, met in the singles event as the only two unbeaten participants in the field of 33. It took three games for Darrol to put Bill in the loser's bracket and that set the pace for the remaining brackets, each match going the full three games to determine the championship.

Glen Davidson, Okla., third-rated player in the Midwest Division, beat seventh-rated David Williams of Texas. Glen met Don Cox, Calif., after Don beat Glen Young of Arizona. Davidson emerged the victor of that match to take on the formidable Bill Melton. Glen won leaving Bill to pick up the not-too-chintzy third place pot.

That put Glen and Darrol head to head for the championship. It was 6 a.m. Tuesday, Feb. 17, when Darrol finally claimed his crown. He'd met the best and come out the victor. He'd earned his top rating and a whole lot more!

# A Place for Women in National Tournaments?

The "giants" of shuffleboard don't scare Chris Monahan of California or Diane Hagen of Texas. The lone women entered in the tournament, both have the confidence it takes to challenge their male counterparts on the boards.

A relatively new player, Chris has taken the game seriously and the already high regard local players held for her ability spread to all participants in this national tourney. That she was a force to be reckoned with became evident as she defeated her first two challengers in the singles, "Tall Don" Baker of Texas and Bud Hillburn of Oklahoma. In her third match, Don Cox of California had his work cut out for him to finally defeat Chris. "She is tough!" Don said.

It took big Sam Summers of Oklahoma to knock Chris out of the running and it took three games to do that. Sam didn't underestimate the ability of the determined Chris and played tough to win the match.

Chris would like to see a national tournament for women, perhaps with qualifying local tourneys to help finance their participation. Such a tournament, she believes, should be set up the same as any other major event with an auction that would make it worthwhile for the women to participate. She's working on getting women in her own local area in-

and take notice.


—John Myles of Michigan who showed The World of Shuffleboard that he can do with one arm what many can't do with two.



# Doc Makes Plea for Common Courtesy in Shuffleboard

Recently I had an unpleasant experience of being harrassed while shooting the final game of a singles tournament. I still managed to win the title but was annoyed enough to send a special message which appears elsewhere in this issue (see ad on page 5). That prompted me to write an article on Common Courtesies of Shuffleboard.

I also met some great shuffleboard people on my recent trips to Oregon and Las Vegas. In Cottage Grove, Oregon, I met Howard Jackson. We played some games and later went to Springfield where I met Walt Morris, Glen Lindberg and Bob Howard.

Las Vegas has more than 40 shuffleboards but I sensed some frustration among the players because of lack of organization. Frank Zavala at Duffy's voiced his concern in this regard. I also met Jim Nugent and Dan there. My gracious host was Jim Golden. We then went to Deluxe Liquors. I met Mary and Laura of the women's league. We also played at Cal's. I missed Russel and Craig, two great players. Frank is trying to contact all establishments so they can subscribe to The Board Talk.

Recently, 10 players from Dacono and Longmont, Colo., came to Chevenne and we had some great games.

As I travel around these glorious United States, I usually end up in an establishment where shuffleboard is played. Time and again, I have sadly noticed that outside of the professionals, a majority of the players do not observe even the most basic common courtesies of the game. In fact, quite the opposite! I respect the local ways and usually shut up. Nevertheless, it is annoying. As an ordinary player but lover of the game, I suggest a few common courtesies:

•Do not pile heaps of wax on the playing surface during the game.

•Do not wipe off powder with your hand or sleeve.

- •Do not remove pucks without letting your opponent check the score.
  - •Do not punch someone else's score.
- •Do not go clear across the board and punch your partner's score.
- •After you have finished shooting, please step away from the board to give your opponent plenty of room to shoot. Don't crowd him/her.

•Do not talk to a player while he is shooting or harrass him in any other way.

•When playing a game, please stay and play. Do not always be gone when it's your turn to shoot. Don't be making phone calls or hustling women during the game. Remember, there are others waiting to play.

•Do not play pool and shuffleboard at the same time (sounds incredible but, believe me, some people do that).

•Do not hold a cigarette or drink in one hand while shooting. Ashes get mixed with the wax and drinks get spilled.

We thank you for your ad and your article, Doc, and hope those who are guilty of such poor sportsmanship will recognize and correct their shortcomings. Such conduct hurts the sport and must be dealt with if shuffleboard is ever to gain the recognition it deserves. The problem is intensified because a large majority of shuffleboard play takes place in taverns. Those who are discourteous by nature usually become more so after they've had a few drinks.

In addition to your common sense/common courtesy suggestions, we call readers' attention to the Official Rules and Regulations for Table Shuffleboard Team and League Play from the American Shuffleboard Leagues, Inc. (also approved for tournament play) that deal with this issue:

A. All generally accepted rules of good sportsmanship and good conduct will apply at all times.

B. It is to be considered common courtsey for each player to step back from the board after he delivers a weight in order to give his opponent freedom of the board in every respect, with no interference while shooting.

C. The Grievance Committee of the league (or could be tournament officials) shall, by majority vote, have the power to disqualify and bar from further league (or tournament) play any member or team who disregards the accepted and normal courtesies in any way implied herein; or for unsportsmanlike conduct; or for misconduct of any nature which may be considered detrimental to the well-being of other participants and spectators or injurious to the reputation of the league.

The foregoing shall, in part, be construed to mean that no audible comments, remarks or unsportsmanlike gestures shall be made before or during a shot. Violation of this common courtesy will be subject to a minimum penalty of forfeiture of one match point from the total match points.

### Action in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania

Although we live in Harrisburg, Pa., we were introduced to shuffleboard by John Barrow at the Rendezvous Inn in Perryville, Maryland, because we own a boat and camper in that area.

During 1985, we traveled four hours round trip to watch the Rendezvous play their league games and in 1986, we both joined the league and we are still traveling to Perryville every Tuesday.

We felt we had to play more than once a week to be competitive and we searched for a board in the Harrisburg area. The only one we found was at the Lawton Legion, Post #998, 4700 Derry Street. In December of 1986, we decided to start an "in-house" league and presented our ideas to post commander Jerry Patrick. It was approved and we posted a sign for interested players. Within two weeks, we had over 30 names. We held a meeting and formed an A and B team and voted Jim Sterling and Don Koppenhaver captains and Pat Sterling as treasurer.

We are now in our seventh week and the enthusiasm is great. We have a terrific bunch of men and women who make it a lot of fun. The Lawton Legion has been very cooperative and has even opened the kitchen on Monday nights to serve the players. But a lot of the success of this league, and we're sure many other leagues, is due to the enthusiasm of The Board Talk. Keep up your good work and thanks for your support.

If any of you players come to our area, please stop at the Lawton Legion for a game!
