The Hammer

Every month, after we go to press, we receive results of tournaments and notices of upcoming tournaments that should have been in the issue we've just put to bed. It's frustrating! It makes us want to shout out to The World of Shuffleboard: "Watch our lips! Th deadline for every issue of The Board Talk is the 15th of the month!" That deadline is published in every issue (last month it was on the back page, right above your name and address so you wouldn't miss it), yet few take it seriously.

We know it's difficult to understand that early deadline when you don't receive your Board Talk until several weeks later. But there's a lot of work that goes on between the 15th and the finished product that you read. There are a few exceptions to the rule and this month is one of them. With three big tournaments the weekend following the deadline, we held up a couple pages to insert the results. However, we stuck to the deadline for the remaining pages because if we didn't, it would be time for the May issue deadline before you got your April Board Talk.

That deadline isn't just for you; it also pertains to the editors. A lot of people were looking for the March "Top 50 of the U.S.A." listing because there would have been many changes. Why wasn't it there? Because Editor George came home from Rising Sun, Maryland, and got involved in his shuffleboard business. He was in Detroit on February 15 and missed the deadline. Editor Donna closed the pages and took them to the printer.

Help us help you. Keep that 15th of the month deadline in mind when you plan your tournaments so we can promote them, and when you report the results, so we can pass that information along to The World of Shuffleboard in a timely manner.

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Only those of you who have run a tournament know the hours invested and the hard work involved. The remainder only know the difference between a smoothly-run tourney and one that you go back and tell your buddies: "Boy, are you lucky you didn't go! It was a disaster!"

The smoothly-run tournaments are the result of the efforts and time of a lot of people and, to this point in time, it's been a volunteer effort simply because of the volunteers' love of the game. Volunteerism is great when it helps get something you believe in going. After that, it wears a little thin. It gets expensive and it takes time away from family members and other priorities, with no compensation.

That fact of shuffleboard life was very much in our minds as we started planning for our 4th Annual Board Talk Tournament. Unlike sponsors who benefit from the added food and beverage sales involved in a tournament, we operate on the basis of trying to keep our loss figures to a minimum. Our dependence on volunteers the past three years has been heavy and those volunteers have been fantastic.

Houston, Texas - Trying to Make a Comeback

It is no secret that last year's "Tournament of Winners" at PT's in Houston was a disaster tantamount to the aborted "U.S.S.A. National Championship Tournament." I attended both tournaments and they were extremely disappointing. I think the key word here is "disappointing." PT promised \$36,000 in prize money. USSA promised 20 new boards. Both were mere promoters' pipe dreams. I had a great time at both events, but there was always the lingering feeling that I had been taken by a shifty promoter.

Anyway, all that is behind us now and hopefully shuffleboard players and promoters are growing and learning from mistakes. A good example of a well-run tournament was Dave Davidson's Washington's Birthday event (Corporate Image). I can honestly say that this tournament ran like a swiss watch:

- 1. Each match on the entire bracket chart had a start time next to it that was adhered to.
 - 2. Four boards in excellent shape.
 - 3. Major players from all over the country.
 - 4. Officials always available.
 - 5. Plenty of room for spectators and players alike.

Dave did not promise the moon, yet he delivered it.

Warren Bass at Houston's Sports Arena, as well as other Houston shuffleboard clubs, is trying to rebuild a good reputation here in Houston. The March 4 tournament at the Arena drew over 32 participants from Texas — mostly from Houston, but 15 players came from Austin and Dallas. In fact, the Dallas folks all came up on a bus and parked it out back of the Arena. Tammy Denson came up on the bus with them but she won so much money, I wouldn't be surprised if she flew back to Dallas first class.

Warren provided free tuna casserole on Friday, then free barbecue on Saturday. He brought in an extra board at his own expense, for a total of three good boards. On Saturday we were supposed to have \$50 bring your partner, but since only seven teams signed up (all players from Houston), we all decided to have another \$50 draw so that all the out-of-towners could join in. The change of plan was a success since we got 12 teams in there on the draw. It was a heck of a lot of fun.

Table shuffleboard may not appeal to everyone, but for that addicted minority — it is a way of life.

Their dreams did exceed the results, but we're also sure that both expected to fulfill their obligations, right up to tournament time. Why else would they invest advertising dollars in The Board Talk? It was a financial disaster for both of them as well as a disappointment to all of us players. We predict the USSA will live to get theirs going successfully. We hope so because The World of Shuffleboard really needs an amateur event.

where we enjoyed their hospitality and good shooters. We then met our old friends at the Edgewood in Bellflower, Calif. — it still feels like home. I played in the team event at the Showboat in Las Vegas, but we didn't do too good. We then took in the great shooting at the Corporate Image in Fort Worth, Texas.

While visiting our son in Springfield, Missouri, we happened onto the 6th Annual Miller's Highlite City Doubles Championship at Uncle Bentley's Pub. There were 20 teams representing 13 taverns. The shooting wasn't up to the Corporate Image standards (what is?), but was quite respectable. First place went to Andy Friedhofen and Bill Stacey. A good shooting women's team, Pam Teeter and Cheryl Bowler, took second. Third place went to W.L. Burks and J.R. Woods.

What surprised me was that with their quality of play, they were still playing "keep hammer," the "long foul line," and sprinkling the corners was not permitted. Other places we played in Missouri also used these antiquated rules.

I suggest that the Shuffleboard Federation rules be amended to include these basic items and then published in The Board Talk so that it could be copied and distributed. My talking just doesn't carry the weight that the official rules of shuffleboard would.







That is something to be proud of and should be worth enough of the purse to pay some of the expenses.

We have given a lot of thought to this subject and have come up with what we think is a good idea. How about the number of places receiving prize money being determined by the number of entries in the tournament? For the upcoming Michigan Open, we're going to try it. Here's how we're going to do it: 16 entries or less, pay 3 places; 17 to 24 entries, pay 4 places; 25 to 32 entries, pay 6 places; 33 or more entries, pay 8 places.

We feel that this will attract more players to tournament play and also help those who are currently active in tournaments to have the finances to attend more. Please write us and let us know how you feel about this or any other ideas you have.

Point Standings

Based on players' input, we are going to make a change in the qualification requirements. Final standings will still be based on the top 5 finishes. We are going to change the number of tournaments you need to attend outside your division from three to two.

There has also been some confusion on how points are awarded. You receive your points based on your performance in the singles tournaments on our pro tour. All of the individual sports on TV-golf, tennis, bowling — have singles and doubles tournaments, but singles is what you see on TV.

Though doubles have been the backbone of shuffleboard for many years, singles tournaments are becoming increasingly popular and our best chance of attracting a national





How Should Shuffleboard Be in 1988?

In my opinion, the game is still behind times 20 years. The game and players have come and gone since the 50s two or three times and now everyone is talking again about what should be and shouldn't be.

That is great! But ask yourself what have YOU done for the game? Usually the people who grumble the loudest are the ones who have never been involved in organizing a tourney or a league. If someone else will do all the work, get everything set up for them so all they have to do is come in, put their money up (or have someone else put it up fo them), then they can complain all the way through the tourney —— about bad boards, weights or wax, or about the way the round robins are run, etc.

I say to all you crybabies: put on a tournament yourself, then you will definitely respect the people who do all the work for you. Why not go in and ask if there is anything you can do to help — — and then do it. At my tourneys, I always tried to put the complainers in charge of some event and let them listen to the rest of them. I noticed quite a change in attitude in all of them.

If you don't agree with what's going on, get involved yourself. You will be an enlightened person by it all. Good luck on your first event. You will need it!

I would like to say welcome back to the game to Hal Perry of Sacramento, Calif., who came down for the first time to the Corporate Image and finished third with Glen Young. Not bad for a guy who had not played in tough competition for two years. Thanks also from me to Donnie Cox of Sacramento for being my partner in the doubles. We almost got there —— next year, Donnie! My congratulations to Sam Summers of Oklahoma City and Karl Spickelmier of Malibu, Calif., 1988 Corporate Image doubles champs, for a good, tough game.

It was good to see Fred Thumann, Leroy Ledford, Jerry and Sharon Miller and Leon Benton from the Ace of Clubs in Marysville, Calif., at this spectacular event. Also Bud and Fritzi Broka and their son from Ohio; Larry Creakbaum, Bobby Voorhis and his coach/Dad from Indiana; and Wayne Reist from Michigan. Thanks, also, to John McDermott for letting an old man on his last few years beat him. This win will keep me high enough to continue for another year anyway.

Glen Davidson, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma

We realize shuffleboard has been taking one step forward and two steps backward the last 20 years, Glen, but we really don't think we should expect it to have the player or fan participation that golf, bowling or even tennis has. In the past, shuffleboard players have destroyed their own game by letting it acquire a reputation of being a hustler's sport by doctoring the board, putting curves in to their benefit, wiping the corners bare of wax, making their opponent use worn weights only they were familiar with, not letting a challenger on the board unless he or she will play for the amount of money they specify, and more. Some of this still goes on today.

We agree there are crybabies in the sport. However, there are crybabies in all sports, amateur and pro. As for them putting on their own tournament, forget it. They can't han-

dle the responsibility. There are a certain few that will always run the organization and tournaments and then there are those who only want to tell YOU how to run a tournament. Brian Crowl of the Playfair Shuffleboard Company sent us some clippings from a 1950 shuffleboard publication he'd found when he was doing research before he went into the business of manufacturing boards. They were quite a revelation and contain some lessons that we must learn if we are to survive.

There were articles about the second annual conference of the Table Shuffleboard Association of America (TSAA). There were agenda items such as point versus frame play; different rules followed by different leagues and tournaments; the seeding of players for tourneys as followed by organized tennis; and the feasibility of patterning the TSAA according to regulations similar to the American Bowling Congress.

There was also discussion regarding the merits of handicapping players to bring closer competition in any type of organized play, and the need for shuffleboard manufacturers and suppliers to recognize the TSAA as the players' association.

"The facts are that unless the industry can see the efficacy of TSAA as the preserver, promoter and future life's blood of organized shuffleboard play, this organization, like others, will fall by the wayside."

Evidently, it did fall by the wayside, as did many others in the industry. With the exception of American, those oncefamiliar shuffleboard manufacturer names listed in the publication have faded from the scene. In an editorial entitled, "Which Way Shuffleboard?," the writer talks about 20-odd firms which sent representatives to a meeting in Chicago to decide whether the TSAA was the answer to their promotional problems, or whether they, the business side of the sport, would form their own organization.

"To make TSAA a success, all factors in shuffleboard must be included," the editor concluded.

All factors — the players, the leagues, the manufacturers, the suppliers, the publication that served as the voice of shuffleboard back then — most of them are gone now. Let's not let it happen to us! Let's learn from the past. Let's get commitment from all factors to make sure that almost 40 years after those words were written, we'll all not only be survivors, but an inspiration to those who will follow!

Top Player Ratings Temporarily Discontinued

By George Wilber

We are discontinuing the division ratings because of criticism of it. Certainly, some of it was justified. One big reason is that so many deserving players go to less tournaments than others because of various reasons —— either a work schedule, finances, health, family responsibilities, etc. They, therefore, do not receive the rating they probably deserve. However, I know of no other way to rate players, except how they perform in qualified tournaments.

Since we've run the ratings, these are some of the things I've experienced:

1. Accused of showing favoritism.

2. Many times, I have been advised on how much better a friend is than the rated players.

3. I received a call stating that a player didn't deserve rating because the caller beat him in a money game.

4. Accused of over-rating a league teammate.

5. Been asked to drop the rating of an unpopular player.

6. Verbally attacked for dropping the rating of a player.

7. Overheard unkind remarks about my ability to rate.

8. Been chided for not rating a player who did well in league play or a small home area tourney.

9. Had player insist on being rated because of finishing high in a couple of draw your partner tourneys.

10. Had players insist on being rated because of how they used to play before the ratings started.

The guidelines I used to rate players were: did not recognize league play; gave very little recognition to tournaments of 12 or less; gave higher recognition for winning singles than doubles.

We started the ratings to create interest and for reader enjoyment. However, it probably has caused more bitterness than enjoyment. I wouldn't rule out the possibility of re-establishing the ratings in the future. If so, I would like one or more persons from each division doing the ratings in the division of which they are familiar, preferably people with a knowledge of the game and the players and who could be very unbiased. Volunteers, of course!


