Scheduled Times Vs. First Available Board

To those shuffleboard players who missed the 4th Annual Board Talk Tournament, sorry we missed you!

I helped run this event that took three and a half days from 9 a.m to 3 a.m. and I would like to thank all those who participated and helped me have one of my greatest vacations ever!

I would also like to thank John McDermott of the Shuffleboard Federation, Inc., for teaching me the ways to set up scheduled times and boards at 4 a.m. Saturday night (Sunday morning) after playing all day.

This is the second tournament I have run brackets for The Board Talk. The first was last year when we ran a first available board format. This year's had scheduled times and boards. I have come to the conclusion that the latter is better. I will tell you why and hope you will also voice your opinions on this matter.

With the first available board format, we had lots of players playing back to back boards while also playing back to back teams. I heard many complaints because a shooter would have to play against someone who has been on the board for over an hour already when he or she hasn't been playing on that board.

On the scheduled board format, I only had complaints about being backed up because of slower or longer, close matches. I would estimate I had 75% less complaints with the scheduled boards than the open board format.

Although there were complaints about a board being open because a match had gotten over with quickly and some would say that open board should be used, I think the tournament for the players overall works better knowing what time to play rather than waiting all day for their names to come up.

Again, I would like to thank all of those who shared my vacation and all the new and old friends I got a chance to see. If you have an opinion on the scheduled versus open board format, I would like to read it here in The Board Talk.

Hoosier Deb Somers did the host state proud as she beat out 13 other hopefuls in the women's singles. Rita Yank of Pennsylvania finished second, with Cheryl Collins of Michigan in third place.

Home-staters Bobby Voorhis and Jerry (Radar) Warr were winners of the 18-team open doubles event. First and second place singles winners Darrol Nelson and Mickey Mickens joined forces to take second place honors. Don Casula of Delaware and John Lukas of Maryland collected their third place purse before beginning their long trek back East.

All of the 4th of July fireworks were on the Playfair boards as 17 teams staged a valiant fight for top honors in the mixed doubles. Texans Janet Cook and Howard Mouton came out the victors. Buddy and Fritzi Broka of Ohio finished second, with Diana Hagen and David Williams of Texas in third place.

Cox Takes Double-Header at Ted Z's



26th Annual Labor Day Tourney, Ace of Clubs, Marysville, Calif., Aug. 31 - Sept. 5

The Ace of Clubs, 328 I St., Marysville, Calif., will host its 26th Annual Labor Day Masters Tournament Aug. 31 through Sept. 5. Plan your end-of-summer vacation around this big event, which will attract the best players in the nation. The total pot is expected to reach the \$50,000 mark!

Action will start with the women's singles on Wednesday, \$75 entry fee, play starting following the 7 p.m. auction.

The auction for the open doubles and singles is scheduled for Thursday at 8 p.m. with the doubles starting on Friday, Sept. 2, at 8 a.m. Entry fee for the doubles is \$200 per team; \$200 per player for the singles. Payoff will be: 1 to 16 entries, 60-30-10; 17-20, 58-28-10-4; 21 to 32, 56-26-10-4-2-2. For the first time in this tournament, players will be seeded. In a 16 bracket board, the four players with the highest sales will be seeded. In a 32 bracket board, the eight players sold for the highest amount will be seeded. Sharon Miller explains that this system will benefit the buyers as well as the players.

All events will be 2 of 3, double elimination. The Ace of Clubs will have five good boards for this tourney. All five will be used for the women's singles. Then, five boards will be used for first rounds only with the No. 5 board open for players. Times and boards will be posted.


Bracket boards will be by Sharon Miller. Tournament directors will be Fred Thumann and Jerry Miller.


Fort Worth Wins Shootout


