## **Tourney Talk**

### 89 Shooters at Ours & Yours Season Opener

The Season Opener on Sept. 9-11 at Ours & Your Place, Sudlersville, Maryland, attracted 89 shooters from six states. The tourney opened Friday night with 28 players drawing partners. This event was dominated by Delaware players with first place going to Chuck King of Dover and Skip Hammond of Milford. Delawarians Richie Casula and Richard Foreaker took second place, with third place earned by Donnie Casula of Newark and Doug Ammand of Milford.

In the women's singles, Judith Iseman of Chestertown took first place honors. Rosalie Kaufman of Queenstown, Maryland, came in second. "Thanks to all you brave souls who showed up, especially Jane Mierzepewski of Massachusetts," says tournament director Judith. "Hopefully, more of you will show up in January."

The bring your partner event had 22 teams participating with the "pros" taking first and second place. Mickey Baugh of Texas and Ed Galke of New York took first place, with John Lukas, Maryland, and Donnie Casula, Delaware, in second. Third place went to long-time shooter Jack Gardner, Greensboro, Maryland, teamed up with first-time shooter Kevin Husfelt. Dallas Hayman, Harrington, Del., and Tom Bernhard of Milford finished third.

Milt Benedict of Sherburne, New York, took top honors in the open singles. Ed Kibler, Henderson, Md., finished second, with Donnie Casula in third place.

Judith reports that this was her first solo attempt at running a full-scale weekend tournament and she thanks all the participants from Maryland, Delaware, Pennsylvania, Massachusetts, New York and Texas. "I couldn't have done it without Chuck (Mr. Auctioneer) King, Rosalie (cashier) Kaufman, tournament officials Scratch Todd, Jack Gardner and Ed Kibler, and draftsman Doug Ammand. Thanks also to our hosts, Art and JoAnn Ware, for their hospitality and great buffet. Ours & Your Place may be small but it's big on hospitality," Judith said.

#### Cerwonka Keeps N.E. Philly League Alive

Lou (Poppa Lewie) Schmek formed the N.E. Philadelphia Wednesday Night Shuffleboard League in the early 60s and he was its president until his death in 1977. Over the years, some of the top players in the East played in it.

Around 1970, Jack Cerwonka joined the league with McCarron's Bar. Eventually, Jack served the league as its president and financial secretary-treasurer.

Over the first 15 years of the league, there were team changes and rule changes, but always teams waiting to join the league. There was also the Tuesday Night Greater Philadelphia League, with plenty of players for both leagues. Then, toward the end of the 70s and early 80s, shuffleboard started to die, along with some of its players. By 1986, there were no leagues in the N.E. area. I started a pro league on Monday nights. Jack and some others from the old league joined, but it was not the same.

Then in 1987, Jack, with a lot of help from Peggy Herrin and Lou's Sportsman's Bar (Lou sponsored two teams), joined by teams from Rhawnhurst Cafe, Sweeney's Irish Pub, Continental Post, and eventual league champs Stumble Inn, had a highly successful league and a great banquet.

Now this year, joined by new teams Instant Replay, Continental's second team, Pickles (home of the kings) Bar, and Mick's Cafe, which was in the league in its first 10 years and won many championships, is back with many of their original players, we have a good thing going.

Shuffleboard league play is making a good comeback in the N.E. area due to the dedicated work and love of the game from Jack Cerwonka. I take great privilege for everyone who knows Jack and plays shuffleboard in our league to say thanks to him.

They'd never seen the game played before and I think we broke the language barrier. They were there to learn how to play and how to promote the game in their country and I hope we helped."

Why 16 foot boards instead of the generally-accepted 22 foot boards in American play? Simply because of space limitations. Space is a precious commodity in Japan.

The Board Talk has extended the fellowship of shufflers from coast to coast across the U.S.A., across the border to Canada, and now across the ocean to Japan. Welcome, Japan, to our World of Shuffleboard. It's a very special place and we're glad you're a part of it!

Lafavette Inn's Fall Classic Another Sell-Out

One hundred fifty-two entries from five states spent Halloween weekend in Rising Sun, Maryland, for the Lafayette Inn's Fall Classic. It was "trick or treat" as they played in four single game double elimination events and divided up just over \$13,500. Everyone listed in the Atlantic Division's Top Ten was registered and it was a tournament where some new leaders emerged.

Friday night's draw partner event was sold out two weeks in advance and the 36 entrants divided up over \$2800. First place went to Doug Fridley, Jr. of Waterloo, New York and Burr Miller, Milford, Del. Don Casula, Wilmington, Del. and Bob Hall of Rising Sun took second place honors with Mopey Hasson, Perryville, Md. and Ray Herrmann of Philadelphia in third.

"Saturday morning was brightened by sunshine and 14 of the fairer sex competing in a women's singles event," reports Dick Gorman. "Sometimes it is hard to see after a long Friday night, but these 14 women could brighten anyone's vision, particularly when you watch them shoot on four different boards." First place was won by Judy Gartland of Philadelphia; second place honors went to Helen Fuller, Sherburne, N.Y., and third was taken by Mary Lou Thompson, Dover, Del.

Thirty-seven teams squared off on Saturday afternoon in the bring partners event and 73 games later, six teams divided up almost \$5500. First place went to first-time tournament winners Gator Abbott and Ace Wettington, both from Milford. Second place was won by Stosh Chemeleski and Tom Schaeffer, both of Philadelphia. Third place was taken by George Chamberlin and Mopey Hasson from Perryville. John Finnerty, owner of Finn's Inn in Palmyra, New York, and Doug Fridley Jr. of Dew Drop Inn, Waterloo, New York (both new places on the Play Your Way Across the U.S.A. list) took fourth place. Fifth place went to brothers Ray and Ron Herrmann of Philadelphia, and sixth place to Steve Bennett and Dennis Brown of Sherburne, N.Y.

Sunday's open singles sold out with 30 players vying for just over \$4100. Another Herrmann -- Jerry -- from Philadelphia lasted to take first place, followed by a new tournament shooter, Leonad Dell of Baltimore. Third place was won by Rick Niblett, Salisbury, Md.; fourth to Doug Fridley Jr.; fifth to Ron Herrmann of Philadelphia; and sixth to Poncho Prevento from Port Deposit, Md.

The tournament saw prizes divided up among players from four of the five states represented and, as usual, Pat and Nelson Renzo reduced bar prices during the tournament hours as well as provided hot buffets both Saturday and Sunday.

The next major tournament at Lafayette Inn will be The Board Talk Winter Tournament on Feb. 10-11-12. Watch your Board Talk for details, but mark your calendars now. Lafayette Inn holds a first Sunday of the month tourney and has mixed doubles tourneys scheduled for Dec. 4 and Jan. 22.

## More to Celebrate Than 29 Years in Business

'Twas the day before Christmas and in bars across the nation, people were toasting each other with glasses held high and hustling to get one more game of shuffleboard in before Christmas Eve closing.

That will be the scene in a lot of bars in just a few short weeks and many of us will be there when it happens. One person in The World of Shuffleboard who won't be there is Al Stewart, onwer-operator of A & M Amustment Service, El Monte, California, for the past 29 years.

Not that Al doesn't have a lot to celebrate: a successful business, a vocation he loves and a wife he describes as "the sweetest thing God ever created." But the former shuffleboard hustler won't be celebrating with a drink. Instead, he and his "partner, friend and wife," Von, will celebrate Christ's birthday in church that evening. It's been that way for 12 years now, since Al and Von became "born again" Christians.

Before that, the Stewarts didn't have much reason to celebrate. Booze and shuffleboard hustling had taken their toll. Drunken fights threatened their marriage; Al's shuffleboard refinishing business was on the brink of failure because of lack of attention. But all that changed and, according to Al, "Thanks to God, He saved our marriage and our business."

So how does a born-again Christian reconcile his "new life" with a business where 99% of his work is in bars? Isn't there a "conflict of interest"?

"Absolutely none," Al said. "I'm completely at ease with what I do and how I live. I made up my mind from the first that I would not preach to those people sitting in the bars. I've had some people who knew me before and have asked me about the change. I'm more than happy to tell them how it all came about, but I don't throw it at them. Now the people who used to bring me a scotch and water or bottle of Coors come up with a cup of coffee."

### Learning Through "Trial and Error"

Al got into the shuffleboard business by "pure coincidence." He was working for an insulation company when his shuffleboard hustler partner, Freddy Anderson, broke off a key in the money box and asked Al to go to Los Angeles with him to pick up a screw lock from the American Shuffleboard Company.

"While I was there, a couple people called and wanted shuffleboards moved from one bar to another. I told John Weiss, who was the West Coast manager for American Shuffleboard, that I had a pick-up and could handle it. That's how I started -- just moving boards," Al said.

Then came the demand for refinishing the boards. Since he had neither the facilities nor the expertise to do that, he hauled them to San Bernadino, had them refinished there, picked them up 8 to 10 days later and then delivered them. There had to be a better way, he thought.

"I quit my other job, rented a building, got all the sanders and spray guns and started from scratch, knowing nothing. I opened the shop in 1962. I was dumb, green," he said. "The first board I refinished was so slow, you practically had to hit the weight with a golf club to get it to the other end of the board. I did seven boards in San Diego and had to redo them all because the paint peeled off.

"It was trial and error for a period there, but I just kept

working at it. But I loved it and I still do. I love to get those old boards and when I get them fixed up all nice and pretty and someone asks, 'is that a new board?' -- that really does something to me," Al said. "I've built up a pretty good reputation and I'm pre\_d of that."

Al refinishes boards in nine western states and has gone as far as 1,700 miles to Idaho. He averages more than eight refinishing jobs a month.

Al's stepson, Harold, better known as Bear, works with him and Al looks forward to the day when he can step back and let Bear be the shuffleboard man of A & M Amusement Service.

And what will Al do when Bear takes over? "I'm gonna work on my cars. I've got a couple Thunderbirds and I like to polish them up and drive them around town," he said. The Biggest Change is Speed

# Al has seen a lot of changes in shuffleboard during the 29 years he's been in business and since 1949 when he first started playing.

"The biggest change is speed. They want them faster, faster, faster. We never used to use any silicone or magic glaze. We just used regular powdered wax. Then they came up with what we call half-and-half, then they went to the American speed. Now they've gone to the super-glide which is a can of roller bearings and they've got all kinds of silicone, Pledge, and everything else to put on the boards that you can imagine.

"They want the boards faster and straighter and you can't have both. You have to throw the weight so slow that any type of imperfection in the board is going to show. With the slower wax we used in the old days, you had to throw it so hard to get it down there, you didn't notice any of the hooks or crooks in the boards."

Al believes the game of shuffleboard is, without a doubt, on the upswing. "It died out in the 60s when the pool tables came in. Nobody was promoting shuffleboard then. They stuck the boards in a room, sometimes the back room, and just let them set. It picked up a little in the mid-60s, then died out again and stayed pretty low until about nine years ago. The past few years, I've been busy, busy, busy," he said.

### A Career High Point

One of the high points of Al's 29-year career happened when he rented a board to Warner Brothers movie studio for "Police Academy Two." Al got to deliver the board on location, a bar set up in a warehouse in downtown Los Angeles.

"That was quite an experience -- to think that I was going to have a board in a movie that would be shown all over the country. It didn't show much, you had to really look hard to see it, but it was there," he said.

A more recent highpoint in the Stewart's life was announced by Al during a phone conversation with The Board Talk editors just prior to putting this issue to press. "Von has just become a great grandmother," Al said.

When you see Al at the Showboat in Las Vegas in January, be sure to congratulate him on Von's achievement! And when you see Von, congratulate her for tolerating Al's 'sense of humor all these many years!
