You don't have to be uncomfortable about not being a professional writer to report the results of your tournament. Just give us the facts and we'll take it from there. And don't depend upon someone else to do it for you!

# Shufflers' Notebook

News and Views from The World of Shuffleboard

#### **Hustlers Will Never Be Finished!**

As in all things, there are two sides to every story. Who is this so-called "hustler"? (See June Hammer.) He is one of a small group of men, and very few women, who has kept the sport of shuffleboard alive the past 30 or 40 years while most of you were golfing, playing tennis, boating, fishing, or doing whatever you were doing. They were playing in redneck bars and night clubs from the Crown Point Inn in Jersey, all the way to the Pink Pony in Brawley, California, and many stops in between.

In any other sport, a man who pays his own way all over the country and then puts up his own money to play when he gets there would be called devoted to his sport. In shuffleboard, he is called a hustler. These so-called hustlers will never be finished! They have proven that over the last 40 years, my friends. And maybe thousands of people who "play" shuffleboard wish they could walk into the local tavern and beat this so-called hustler, but it's not going to happen. Shuffleboard isn't just a game to these guys -- it's part of their lives.

Once the game gets bigger, and all the "old stats" come into play, you'll have your commissioners, referees, staffs, qualified state and local personnel and plenty of assorted whoevers and whatevers. But you won't have "the game" these hustlers have been preserving for 30 or 40 years. You probably won't be able to get within 30 feet of a player at a tourney, no talking, no side betting, and nobody getting in stroke until it's over (maybe).

Players will no longer play in bars or clubs; it will be beneath them. I've seen it ruin motorcycle racing for the die-hard fan, and shuffleboard will be no different.

You will never see things like Pee Wee Ramos making one of twelve foot combos and drive into a trey in the other corner shots, or Tommy Campbell lagging five treys in a \$200 a corner game on the first challenge off the street, or Glen Davidson drive a one into a trey to go out, or Bob Miles outlag a near four for \$1500 a game, or Billy Mays make a 5 or 6 weight combo to go out from 10. You'll never see these things because you people don't even know they exist.

Hip, hip, hooray for the beautiful people. Sometimes I wonder just who is "hustling" who.

Definition of a hustler: "To crowd or jostle, to force, to make money by clever or unscrupulous means; having no morals, unprincipled." We know some of the players you mentioned and they certainly do not fit that definition. Open play establishes the reputation upon which shuffleboard will or will not progress and grow. Hustlers will never be responsible for preserving any sport.

While I've made only a few tournaments, the 2nd Annual Michigan Open, sponsored by The Shuffleboard Federation, bears mentioning. The tournament was great, as was the hospitality. 




Linda Cooper of Texas led a crew of dedicated workers at the Michigan Open.




