Competitors from over 200 miles away came to Rainier, Oregon, to participate in Jay-Dee's annual tournament held the weekend of Aug. 13.

The mixed doubles event was won by Georjean Monnarez and Chuck Norris of Portland. Jolene Lembke of Bend and Doug DeBois of Rainier took second, with locals Diane and Lee DeBois in third place.

The open singles title was captured by the red-hot Chuck Norris. Frank Hepler of Longview, Wash., took second over Curt of Rainier.

### Lots of Winners at Seafarer

The Seafarer Tavern in Warrenton, Oregon, hosted a singles, doubles and draw partner tournament over the Labor Day holiday. The singles competition between 24 of the northwest's best was won by tournament director Don "Mitch" Mitchell of Warrenton. Mike DeAngelo of Portland finished second over Rick Gindt of Tacoma, Wash.

Al Pease of Hoquium, Wash., teamed up with Jim Foran of Tacoma to win the doubles over 15 other teams. Ruthie Miles and Don Campbell, both of Portland, captured second place with some spectacular shooting. Jolene Lembke reports: "One of the best ends I've ever seen occurred in the second game of the semi-finals when Ruthie went around Rick Gindt's shallow deuce for a deep 3 in the corner. There followed a series of 3-weight combos by both players. After seeing those shots, Jim Foran uttered the quote of the tourney, 'I give up,' and Ruthie wondered what she could do for an encore." Gary Singer of Portland and Rick Gindt finished third.

# Shufflers' Notebook

News and Views from The World of Shuffleboard

#### **Turning Adversity Into Adventure**

Our summer vacation to the Pacific Northwest started out peaceful enough, landing in Seattle doing the normal tourist bit -- Space Needle, Kingdome and Harbor Area. We then moved on to Mt. Ranier in the Tacoma area.

That evening we made a stop at the Acme Tavern for a little shuffleboard. We introduced ourselves to the owner, Nancy, who was quite congenial. She made some calls and before long, we had a few friendly matches set up. We played seven games against Clark and Clara Kenney, who were gracious enough to let us win three.

On Sunday morning, we began our trek to Vancouver, B.C., and this is where things became interesting. In a recent Board Talk, we saw an ad for the Corner Tavern in Bow, Washington. Like the Acme Tavern, we like to visit Board Talk supporters.

Bow, Washington, is a beautiful farm community off the beaten path. We found an information board next to the General Store. I got out of the car to see if there was any information regarding the tavern. My wife decided to go into the General Store. She got out of the car, flipped the automatic locks on the rental car (now don't get ahead of me) and proceeded into the store.

We were introduced to everyone in the tavern. The nicest group of people you would ever hope to meet, from Linda, the owner; Sharon, the barkeep; and patrons like Eve and Bill. We were accepted immediately and felt like old friends. We played several games and, too soon, the call came that the locksmith had arrived.

Beanie drove me back (I couldn't get Patricia out of the tavern, she was having so much fun). I settled up with the locksmith, thanked Shirley for all her help and proceeded back to the tavern. Beanie must have perceived

my notorious sense of direction. She was nice enough to follow me back so I wouldn't get lost. We played a few more games, said our goodbyes to our new friends with hugs and an exchange of addresses. The five hours we spent in Bow will always be remembered.

We proceeded to Canada where we played shuffleboard in a couple of clubs. The people were nice but we had already lost our hearts to the people from the Corner Tavern who turned adversity into adventure one Sunday afternoon in June.

Your letter makes the midnight oil worth burning! The experience you share is what we're all about and we thank you for this very special story. May it serve as a reminder to other places that opening up your hearts to kindred souls is appreciated more than you can imagine.

#### Our Role -- Critic or Communicator?

I feel you should print the true facts concerning your opinions and observations. Not in a derogatory way, but hopefully as a form of constructive advice. You know full well that the conditions of some of the boards at tournaments you attend are not up to true tournament standards.

I happen to agree with Glen Davidson (whom I would like to meet very much) about the slowness of boards from one end to the other. We have some boards around here that have an eight-foot difference from end to end.

The difference in speeds from both ends is attributed to the way the boards were finished either at the factory or the bar in which they were refinished.

I do not fully agree with Glen's views. I personally feel that tournament conditions should be made as perfect as possible. Our aim is to get as many people playing our sport as possible. If all boards were made as true as possible, you would encourage much more play.

After players really learn the different aspects of the game, then they can handle adverse conditions much more readily. Those climatic adjusters were designed to help straighten out the boards, not crank them into shape for house players.

As to your views about hustlers, remember only a hustler can be hustled. Any player, I emphasize any good player, can spot another good player almost immediately. I feel a handful of us players kept the game going until your Board Talk really got us over the top. I played for 42 years all over this country and Canada on my own money. I never hustled one person. I feel we have a lot more to accomplish such as national sponsorship, uniform playing conditions and rules, etc.

The only way we are going to accomplish those goals is through communication between everybody connected

with shuffleboard. As it is now, only a few people take the time to write you and express their viewpoints. I feel there has to be much more dialogue than just a handful of players and The Shuffleboard Federation.

Ed Galke, Oakdale, New York

When we started this publication nearly five years ago, we did so for these reasons: (1) We loved the sport and believed in its future; (2) we felt there was an information void that we had the ability to fill; (3) because of the first two reasons, we felt we could eventually make a modest living serving The World of Shuffleboard.

The role in which we did NOT see ourselves was being a critic or some kind of shuffleboard commissioner. Providing The World of Shuffleboard a network of communications, we felt, would surface qualified people to take leadership in achieving the goals you outlined. At this point in time, the only ones who have stepped forward to accept that challenge is The Shuffleboard Federation and they've made significant progress this past year toward those goals.

We do believe in the "press" serving as a watchdog and maybe five years down the road, we will take an editorial stance on tournament conditions and other issues. However, at this point in time when shuffleboard as a sport has to crawl before it can walk, and walk before it can run, we feel we must give encouragement to anyone who strives to keep the sport alive and growing. Some places do not have ideal tournament conditions, but at least they're holding tournaments and gaining participation and interest in the sport. We have faith that they will realize the value of upgrading conditions to accommodate major tournaments in the future.

#### A Different View of Tulsa Leagues

This letter is in response to Gary Moore's letter in your last issue.

My husband has played shuffleboard in Tulsa for 30 years. He has played with Gary and against him. His view of shuffleboard is of fun, nice people and a good time. I have been around shuffleboard for a long time, but never played.

The officers of the league talked us into getting a team out of our bar. They made it sound like so much fun that we did. From that, we made lots of new friends, had fun, and these new friends helped us in times of illness and death. They are true and loving people.

The officers of our league love shuffleboard so much that they took their time making calls, had meetings to arrange everything, did bookkeeping and everything that goes with having an organization run smoothly (which ours did), all without pay. And they did a wonderful job.

At the end of the league, the officers had a huge banquet for us, lots of food and drinks. They made a show of handing out trophies and we loved it. Our team won Best Sportsman Award (which the officers provided). It was a big honor for us because the other bars voted for us, even though our team came in next to last.

Cox/Waldman/Thumann Big Winners at Ace



Friday, Saturday and Sunday.







### SHUFFLEBOARD EXTRAVAGANZA UPDATE:

P.C.S.A. representatives returning from tournaments in different regions of the country are happy to report that interest in the Las Vegas Tournament is running very high. P.C.S.A. representatives also report that the most frequently asked question is, "WHAT IS P.C.S.A.'s DEFINITION OF AN AMATEUR?"

That question is perhaps best answered by attempting to define "Who is  $\underline{not}$  an amateur." After much thought and discussion, P.C.S.A. representatives have agreed that the following criteria will be used to determine Amateur Event eligibility:

- 1. If a player has finished 1st, 2nd or 3rd in any major tournament Open Singles Event during the past three (3) years, that player is <u>not</u> an amateur.
- 2. If a player has finished 1st, 2nd or 3rd in any major tournament Open Doubles Event two (2) or more times during the past three (3) years, that player is not an amateur.
- 3. If a player has accumulated more than one-hundred (100) points in the Federation's 1988 Pro Singles Tour Point Standings, that player is not an amateur.
- 4. Players who do not fall into either of the three (3) categories above but who are consistently competitive against top-level players will also be declared to be ineligible for the Amateur Team Event.

P.C.S.A. recognizes that Eligibility Rule No. 4 poses the most difficulty in as much as a number of players will or may be borderline. P.C.S.A.'s <u>decision</u>, after consultation with pro players from different regions, will be final.

It is imperative that the Amateur Team Event Rosters be submitted by the Thursday, December 15, 1988 deadline to allow P.C.S.A. sufficient time to determine "amateur" status of all players on all rosters. If P.C.S.A. determines that any given player is ineligible for the Amateur Team Event, the captain of that team will be immediately notified by telephone, followed by written confirmation of P.C.S.A.'s decision.

With everyone's cooperation, the Amateur Team Event could prove to be one of the more exciting events of the Tournament. P.C.S.A. respectfully asks for everyone's cooperation and understanding.

Finally, P.C.S.A. is proud to announce that the Federation has pledged its support to the Shuffleboard Extravaganza and will be providing four (4) additional shuffleboards for the Tournament.




