The Hammer

Months ahead, you start planning and working to make your BIG EVENT the best, the biggest, one that will satisfy everyone who participates.

A week before the BIG EVENT, you ask yourself: "Where did the time go? We're not ready! It's going to flop, but it's too late to cancel."

Two days into the BIG EVENT, you're exhausted, you get a few complaints about the way things are going, and you vow: "Never again -- never, never, never! Nothing's worth this."

Show us a tournament sponsor/director who hasn't gone through this personal agony and we'll give them an Oscar.

While that agony still lingered, after our 4th Annual Board Talk Tournament, we decided to find out, before we ruled out the 5th Annual, what we did right and what we did wrong. We offered participants the opportunity to give us input into designing our next tourney if, indeed, there would be one. We asked them some key questions and we share the responses because they could apply to your next BIG EVENT as well as ours -- and sharing is what our shuffleboard network is all about.

We went into this self-evaluation with some preconceived notions that got blown away. We share those, too, for your enlightenment. We asked:

"What did you like about the tournament?" (By the time we packed up to go home, we thought the only happy people were the winners of the events and door prizes. We were wrong.) Almost 100% of the respondents rated "strong competition, fellowship with old and new shuffleboard friends, good sportsmanship, well organized events, and good hosts who made them feel welcome and didn't inflate drink prices" as resons they liked the tourney.

"What did you NOT like about the tournament?" (We thought too many events, too long hours and too high entry fees would be the major complaints.) 30% had no complaints; 45% said the early starts and late finishes were a problem; one said it should be closer to home; 15% said seating was a problem; one said play first available board instead of pre-assigned times and boards, and another said he missed the draw partner event but, at the same time, the tourney was too long.

"We want to know" why a tournament goes real smooth until the finish or last match and then, because one player wants to draw for boards, he gets his way, which is not the way the rest of the players had to play. The board for the final match should be posted or flip should be posted. No exceptions! As long as there are players who look for loop holes in the structure, there will be disputes and disorder in our tournaments.

I say stick with the decision that you make at the beginning of the tournament, then play or forfeit!

To Seed or Not to Seed

This letter has to do with taking the negative side to what I've read in The Board Talk recently on tournament seedings. While this way of doing things might be great for the top, established player, players without a big name, like my partner and me, have virtually no chance when we constantly would have to start with the tourney top dog, which is what would happen. Tournament seeding would definitely be a deterrent to any player trying to break in. Our chance of winning would definitely be enhanced by a lucky draw.

I know when we hit the road to start playing, we will ardently avoid seeded tourneys!

The State of Shuffleboard in Oklahoma

I started playing here in Tulsa, Oklahoma, when shuffleboard was in its heyday. In the early 50s and into the 60s, shuffleboard was at its peak. There were both men's and women's leagues and also a mixed league. Every tavern in town had a shuffleboard. A person could get a game any night of the week at any place in town. Ah, the good ole' days.

And then the people who ran the league retired and no one else seemed interested in keeping it going. And then there was pool and the majority of the club owners went to the "fast quarter." Only a few club owners kept their shuffleboards and the sport and competition declined. Most of us who have seen the sport rise and fall will agree that the leagues are necessary for the sport to survive and flourish. However, the manner in which the leagues are run is as important as the leagues themselves.

On occasion, some people have attempted to restart the leagues and have been successful for a short period of time. However, these people all seem to be afflicted with this disease called "E.I.A." In the equine world it stands for Equine Infectious Anemia, more commonly known as Coggins Disease. In the shuffleboard workd and particularly here in Tulsa, I.E.A. stands for Ego, Ignorance and Arrogance. This disease seems to be rampant, quite contagious, but most commonly found in people who have run the leagues or the "round robins." There is also an associated disease called "Roundrobinitis." When persons are afflicted with both diseases, the sport of shuffleboard is seriously threatened and could even be fatal.

After the end of league play a few years ago, it was determined there was a shortage of somewhere between \$1,000 and \$1,500. The decline was again inevitable.

And now, once again, the leagues are back. However, this time the disease seems stronger than ever. Incomplete by-laws and some crazy rules. Would you believe: 12 allowable timeouts per game? teaching beginners to play switch-hammer and playing frames? not allowing certain people to play? clubs with 18 foot boards can't play? etc. I could go on and on, but it would take up too much space.

There are some good rules, but rules are only as good as the attitudes of those enforcing them. Rules against cheating, gambling and profane and obscene language are no good unless it applies to everyone. To question the league leaders about anything has, in many cases, brought a tirade of profanities and obscenities on female as well as male. The leaders also scheduled a meeting at the time of the start of a round robin at a club so as to further enhance their importance by persuading the manager to delay the start until they got there. And why send \$2,000 to \$3,000 to Dallas, 300 miles away?

One financial statement was five months in preparation and seemed to be incomplete. Oh, well, as one director said, "Life is not fair." Another said, "I don't give a (bleep!)."

I hope the people of Tulsa are convinced that a league run by concerned players here would better serve the sport of shuffleboard, the players, club owners, and everyone else.

But all is not lost. Maybe the league directors would "allow" themselves to be replaced at the upcoming

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"election." This would be of great benefit to the game. If not, then I believe a different league should be formed.

Do other parts of the country have these same problems? Or is this disease only prevalent here in Tulsa? Oh, well, it's one step forward and two steps backward, again.

So keep those good league items coming, folks. We need them -- and I'm envious.

You have touched on a problem that is probably not as unique as it should be. There's no doubt that league play is the grassroots strength of this sport and we must keep it credible or we'll keep seeing the historical rise and fall of shuffleboard. We have some suggestions and we're certain others will, too.

First, there is no room in The World of Shuffleboard for that disease you so aptly describe as "E.I.A." To stamp out that disease, there are some segments of our "society" that have to step in and take responsibility -- and the power they have that they're evidently not using.

The people you're talking about number a handful -right? What is that compared to the hundreds of people who make up your league? Will the majority stand back and continually elect those infected with EIA or will they elect, from the rank and file, those players who are dedicated to the sport and its future? Will they insist upon the appointment of a Grievance Committee to handle confrontations? Will they insist that the treasurer be bonded? And, will they hold a meeting with each shuffleboard club/tavern in the league and insist that they enforce what all responsible establishments do -- have stringent rules about no cheating, no profanity. By enforcement, we mean barring those individuals who break the rules.

The 18 foot boards? Well, we'd like to see the day when league and tournament play are on uniform boards, but let's not lock them out now, not until buying a "regulation" board is economically feasible for every shuffleboard establishment. Buying a board, and sometimes having to remodel to accommodate it, is a big investment. They have to know it's an investment that will pay off before they make it.

It appears you've got a serious problem in Tulsa. We syggest that you contact The Shuffleboard Federation, Inc., which has several times issued a plea for league information. They have the expertise and the resources and the commitment to the sport to help you.

Thankfully, for every E.I.A. infected person in The World of Shuffleboard, there's one like the man described in the next letter....

A Salute to Jessie

More on The Top Ten

As the sport of shuffleboard grows, so will grow the demand to know who the Top Ten players are. The Arbuckle Open used the Board Talk's Top Ten as a qualifying format for its tournament. The overall results were great! People knowing they would not be facing the "heavyweights" were more than willing to test their skills against everyone else -- thus, the birth of the "B" Tour. We asked The Board Talk to assist us in our quest for more "B" events. However, some players felt they were unjustly declared ineligible becaue they had placed in a small tournament somewhere and ended up being ranked in the Top Ten!

We are a professional sport; therefore, let's explore the possibility of ranking our players the same way other professional sports do -- by money won during the course of a year from RECOGNIZED tournaments.

The Board Talk could keep these stats or select from each division a volunteer to keep records of money paid out to the winners. This will not includes sales money, only entry fees. To compensate this person, I suggest \$1.00 surcharge per person per event. They should also be required to attend a minimum of two recognized tournaments outside their home town per year to insure the minimum standards are being complied with.

Minimum standards should be similar to The Federation's and all tournaments should be advertised 30 days prior in The Board Talk.

What we end up with are three touring events: Federation, A and B. Maximum amounts on entry fees must be set for A and B events. I suggest \$50 for B and \$100 for A per person per event.

These are only ideas I have formed after talking to many shufflers from north Texas and Oklahoma. This letter is in no way meant to be critical of The Board Talk's methods, for without you, we would still be a "back alley" game.

You evidently have given this challenge some real thought, Alan, and we think you've come up with some great ideas. We're well aware that our system of ranking (working with less than complete information) is imperfect. We've probably gone too far in our efforts not to shut out those players who can't afford to travel or to pay the higher entry fees.

The Federation's system of money-won ranking works well because they have an unquestionable interpretation of "recognized" tournaments. That's something that has to be worked out for A and B.

We thank you for getting this dialogue started. Let's keep it going, readers.

P.S.: We really like your idea of advertising a tournament in The Board Talk 30 days in advance. Nothing frustrates us more than getting the notice of a tournament too late to publish it -- or getting the results of an event we didn't know was happening.

In the bring your partner event, the total pot was \$1,390, with top honors going to Sam Sweatt of Tulsa and Bobby Voorhis of Indiana. Steve Burkett of Tulsa and Steve Walker of Cushing took second place with Kenny Hawkes and Fred Compean of Denver in third.

Player Policy Board Holds First Meeting The Federation's Player Policy Board met twice for a total of about four hours at the U.S. Open in Austin, Texas. While many ideas were discussed, it was obvious that more time is needed than was available. Arrangements are being made to assemble the Policy Board members for a weekend in a non-tournament setting. The following is a list of topics discussed and decisions made.

1. Point Standings Money:

1st \$1200	6th \$500
2nd \$900	7th \$400
3rd \$800	8th \$350
4th \$700	9th \$300
5th \$600	10th - \$250

2. Tournament Rules: The only rule which created any controversy was #9, concerning forfeit time in a tourney which uses pre-assigned starting times. It was decided to leave the rule as is -- game time will be forfeit time. In the future, the Federation will furnish a tournament clock.

3. Players Association: The formation of a Players Association was discussed and it was decided that a charge of \$10 per player per event would be a fair way to collect dues. This money would be used to provide tournament directors with money to compensate tournament officials. One official for each board is what was deemed necessary and both the \$10 surcharge and one official for each board will be requirements for 1989 Federation sanctioned tournaments.

4. Auction Buyers: It was also discussed that auction buyers have an obligation to help support the tournaments. A decision was made that 2% or \$500, whichever is larger, should be deducted from the total combined auction for all events. This will also be a requirement for Federation tournaments in 1989.

5. Points for Doubles Competition: Although a firm plan for doing so has not been established, it was decided that points would be awarded for doubles as well as singles for the 1989 tour.

6. Sliding Payoff Scale: Some changes were made in the way prize money will be distributed and these

changes will be effective beginning with the upcoming Fall Classic in Oklahoma City.

1 to 16 entries: 56%-28%-16% 17 to 23 entries: 54%-26%-14\$-6% 24 to 32 entries: 52%-24%-12%-6%-3%-3%

7. Seeding: It was decided to postpone a decision on this issue at this time pending more feedback from the players. It is interesting to note that after two rounds in the winner's bracket at the U.S. Open, the top six seeds were in the loser's bracket.

The establishment of the Player Policy Board is a major step forward for our sport, and one that is necessary to organize ourselves to the point where we have the credibility to sell it to corporate sponsors. The members of this group are giving their time, free of charge, to help us achieve our common goals: Bill Melton, Oklahoma, chr.; Gail Crane, Mich.; Bob Lewis, Ariz.; Brenda Moore, Tex.; Howard Mouton, Tex.; Hal Perry, Calif.; Jody Slack, Colo.; Karl Spickelmier, Calif.; and Bobby Voorhis, Ind.

They will only be as effective as you, the players, allow them to be. Until now, the Federation has received virtually no input from the players even though we ask for it in almost every article we write. Once again, we ask for your written ideas. They will be typed and forwarded to Policy Board members for their consideration.

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



"What are your ideas for improvement?" (We didn't know what to expect from this question.) All events should be 2 of 3, double elimination; more boards (we had four); no pre-assigned times; lower entry fees; higher entry fees; all players should be Board Talk subscribers; have auction on Thursday night; better ventilation; if pre-assigned times are used, players should be there a half-hour before.

"What are your thoughts on:

Seeding of players?" (On this one, they responded about the way we expected.) 46% said no; 23% said yes; and 31% said they didn't know enough about it to vote. It's a subject that needs some discussion and David Williams of Texas made some good points in his evaluation:

"I think the seeding of players is a definite necessity to the future of tournaments. It's unfortunate that without sponsors we must depend on the auction to have a decent purse. However, until we reach the time that we don't need the auction, I feel seeding is necessary. For instance, in your recent tournament, Darrol Nelson, John McDermott, Bobby Voorhis, Howard Mouton and myself made up almost 3/4 of the auction in a 32-person field, and we could have all been in the same bracket. All other sporting event tournaments are seeded, such as tennis, basketball, and even the NFL playoffs. It seems to me that it is no disadvantage to the 'weaker' players, for they very well could knock out a Nelson-type player. However, if not seeded, they may have to play a Mays or Melton next. If

Also, if not seeded, it could immediately put one of the strong players in the loser's bracket. If everyone completely understood the method, I don't think there would be that much opposition."

"A separate women's event?" (Because all the other events are open to women and a separate event adds to the already full schedule, we thought the majority -- especially the men -- would say to drop it.) 70% said there should be a separate women's event; 8% said no because women play as well as the men; and 22% had no opinion or were open-minded on the subject. One said the event should be after the open singles; another said it should be before all other events.

"Entry fees for the various events?" (We charged \$150 for open singles; \$150 for open doubles; \$50 for women's singles and \$50 for mixed doubles. We thought they'd say to lower the fees.) 62% said they were O.K.; 23% said some events should be higher; and 15% said they should be lower.

We also gave players an opportunity to make "other comments." Space doesn't allow us to print all those, but we'd like to let those players who responded know that there will be a 5th Annual Board Talk Tournament because of their positive reinforcement. Bless you all!
