The Hammer

Nobody feels more joy about the good things or agonizes more about the bad things that happen at a tournament than the hosts who have invited The World of Shuffleboard to their event. Following one of the "bad" events at our recent tournament, when our palms were sweating and our hearts were sinking down to our churning stomachs, someone asked, "Do you suppose the pioneers in organized golf and bowling went through these growing pains?" To which some wise man, bless his heart, responded, "But of course they did. Nothing good comes without some pain."

A greater than expected number of the shuffleboard family turned out for our reunion. More space would have made it more comfortable for players and spectators and more boards would have kept the events on schedule. (We and The Shuffleboard Federation and Playfair Shuffleboard Company have already addressed these problems for next year.) We sort of felt, this year, like the kid who puts on last year's pants and finds them six inches above his ankles! At Shuffleboard Federation pro-tour tournaments now, a few key officials are paid an honorarium and we applaud that as a big step forward. The first couple years, we took up a collection from the players to show appreciation for the time and effort the officials, auctioneers and other helpers invested in our tournaments. We were embarrassed to give those skinny envelopes to them! Winners who automatically take something off the top of their pots for a "tip" to those who worked night and day are few and far between. Shufflers are great people, but they're also among the most critical and hardest to satisfy. Officials and directors are more often verbally abused than they are praised. They deserve to be compensated and we're glad that has been recognized.

Proper officiating is extremely important in a tournament. The ideal scenario would be to have a bracketeer/director who doesn't play or drink and is willing to take all manner of abuse and work long hours for a pittance (bless you, Rob Kern!) and a crew of officials with the same qualifications, dressed in black and white striped shirts so everyone would know who to holler at. If anyone has those qualifications and is interested in the job, we're taking applications.

The majority of the workers at our tournament are still unpaid volunteers and we thank them from the bottom of our hearts! There are very few from our vast World of Shuffleboard who know the behind the scenes work involved in staging a big tournament. For example, there's no magic wand

"The competition was fearsome because the teams with little tournament experience were dedicated house players familiar with the nooks and hooks of both boards," reported Michelle Foran. "As Jimmy Allis so honestly put it, any team entered in this particular tournament has the skill to win."

"It is a true pleasure to watch such talented players perform their magic on the boards," Michelle said. Jimmy and Steve took second place, with Fred Johns and Dick Henley of Longview, Washington, in third. Fourth place went to a mixed team out of Spokane, Rose White and Bob Shirley.

Michelle reports that everyone seemed to have a great time at the well- organized tournament. "Nancy Hiller, the owner, did an excellent job of extending herself to the players and her help was unbelievable. The bartenders were so courteous and efficient, you never had a chance to ask for service; they were always there asking you. So a special thank you to Bob Sharbutt, John Massey, Greg Haney, Billy and Gus Gustelum, Brad Malone, Kelly Grubbs and Ed (Pineapple) Kaleikini from all the players and spectators.

"The potluck was delicious, as usual, because Bill Ketron is an excellent cook. He barbecued up a pile-o-chicken that melted in your mouth and sent the roosters-a-crowin'. Along with that was a heap of barbecued ribs and many salads, beans and garlic bread. What a feast! Nice job, Bill."

Ron Wicks from Tacoma donated a sportsmanship trophy in honor and remembrance of a well-loved shuffleboard player, Marty Melike. This special award was won by Cory Bisson from Tacoma, one of the tournament directors. This trophy will travel to tournaments in the Northwest to be shared by many.

"The Acme Nationals is becoming one of the better tournaments in the area and getting better every year. Hope to see more new faces next year," said Michelle.

Let's get with the program. If you're running a tourney, why don't you think of the people who make the tournament? Take a vote. Remember, the players are the tournament, the show, the main body. Without them, there's nothing. Get with it, tournament directors -- be different. Do something for the players or forget shuffleboard.

Congratulations to Bill Melton for a great year of top shuffleboard. He deserves it and so does Rozanne.

STEWART BENEFIT FUND ESTABLISHED

West Coast shufflers have launched a fund-raising drive to help Al and Von Stewart pay medical bills which accumulated from Al's accident and Von's massive heart attack and subsequent triple by-pass surgery. Two benefit tournaments are scheduled, one on August 19 in Orange County, Calif. and the other on Aug. 26 in Bellflower, Calif. (See enclosed flyer for details.) But even if you cannot travel to California to participate in the tourneys, you can make a contribution to the fund. "Ten of us met on a Wednesday night to talk about what we could do to help Al and Von," reports Lou. "On Thursday, we put a flyer together and on Friday, we distributed 200 copies. Lou said area businesses have donated a TV set, watches, dinners at various restaurants, in addition to money. A limousine service has offered to pick Al up and take him to the Bellflower tournament where a check from the proceeds of the two tourneys will be presented to him. The remaining contributions will be presented to the Stewarts at the January Las Vegas tournament. DO YOU KNOW WHAT SHUFFLE SHOE IS?

Few shufflers know what Shuffle Shoe is, according to Phil Heinzman, owner of D.J.'s in Warsaw, Indiana. He recently purchased a 22 foot Valley board in Mt. Pleasant, Michigan. It looks like an ordinary shuffleboard except it has a couple of steel pegs, 16 inches from each end of the board. And the "pucks" (5 of them came with the board) are shaped like small horseshoes. They're about 2-1/2" by 1-1/4" by 3" in size and have the words "Shuffle Shoe" on them.

Valley has been out of the shuffleboard business for a number of years. Sol Lipkin of the American Shuffleboard Company vaguely remembers that the game existed, probably in the early to mid-1940s.

If you have any knowledge or information about this unique form of shuffleboard, would you please write to The Board Talk, 421 E. Sheridan Rd., Lansing, MI 48906. We'll pass the information on to Phil and to our readers, who must be as curious as we are about this piece of shuffleboard history.

We'd also like to thank The Shuffleboard Federation and Playfair Shuffleboard Company for their valued contributions to the tournament. They, like us, make major investments to make it a success and the only reward we receive is good will (we hope).

Glen Davidson reminds us in his letter (See Shufflers Notebook) that it's the players who make the game and we certainly don't argue with that. However, particularly during shuffleboard's "growing pains," we believe players have a responsibility to put something back into the game that brings them so much enjoyment. They can help improve the sport and make it what we all want it to be -- by sharing constructive ideas with the Player Policy Board, by helping beginning players improve their game, by offering their help to tournament organizers, by playing a role in establishing amateur leagues. Remember TINSTAAFL -- "There is no such thing as a free lunch."

The total pot was \$16,000.


Overflow Crowd at Board Talk's Reunion Tourney

Players from 18 states gathered at the Holiday Inn, Lansing, over the 4th of July weekend for the 5th Annual Board Talk Shufflers' Reunion Tournament. Total pot for the four-event tourney was over \$27,000.

An unprecedented 40 players gave spectators a show in the men's singles, with five states represented by the top six finalists. John McDermott of Michigan took top honors, with Bobby Voorhis of Indiana in second place. Neil Fetter of Michigan finished third, Tony Howard of Texas took fourth place, and Dick Losee of New York and Denny Busch of Nebraska were fifth and sixth.

Top-ranked Diana Hagen of Texas displayed her winning skills, coming out on top of a field of 18 in the women's singles. The tough-playing Fritzy Broka of Ohio gave Diana a run for her money to take second place honors. Gwynette Orsi of Nebraska showed how they do it in the cornhusker state and took home the third place purse. Marie Sweeney of Michigan rounded out the winners' circle in this event.

Twenty-six teams fought for a share of the open doubles pot, with Texans Earl Kelly and Frank Blade capturing the title. John McDermott teamed up with veteran Mickey Mickens of New Jersey to take second place. Bobby V and Gordie Collins of Michigan finished third, with Jim Long and Jerry Knox of Indiana in fourth. Dick Losee and Milt Benedict of New York and Terry and Buddy Broka of Ohio took fifth and sixth places.


