"Both these tourneys were over early, so there's room for more shooters next year in this annual event," says Bobby. Mark your 1989 shuffleboard calendars now.



providing boards to The Federation for our tournaments as needed. Both American and Playfair shuffleboard companies have pledged increased support for the coming year.

Anyone who enjoys the game has an obligation to support The Board Talk. The game does not need freeloaders. Depending on input from the Policy Board at their meeting in Las Vegas, it may be a requirement that you subscribe to The Board Talk if you are going to play in a Federation tournament. This may not sit well with some people, but we are not going to cater to those who are not doing their share.

The other big tavern sports have made much better progress in terms of attracting sponsors than we have. Does their game involve better people? Is theirs' a better game? We think not. What they have done is worked together, and put their politics and egos aside enough to put the game first.

The Federation has no desire to make the rules we play by; that is now the responsibility of the Player Policy Board. The amount of cooperation we receive will determine how fast it happens.

The bottom line is: we all need each other. Shuffleboard players are a different and special breed. Our slogan is "Friendship Through Competition." It is an unusual concept. Maybe you have to be a shuffleboard player to be able to relate to it. If you are a player and look at who are your closest friends and think about the people you have met through this game, it begins to make sense.

To those of you who have supported us, we extend our most sincere thanks and appreciation. You are the people we want to work with. The time to be recognized and supported by sponsors is closer than it has ever been. You will see flyers very soon for two tournaments in 1989 with sponsorship by a major beer company. To those who have not yet jumped on the bandwagon, judge us by our actions and deeds. There will always be room for you later.






