Buhl/Monarrez/Cox Winners at Ace of Clubs

Doug Buhl of California came out of a three-year retirement from the game and with partner Frank Monarrez won the doubles tournament at the Ace of Clubs Labor Day Masters in Marysville, Calif. Leroy Ledford of California and Mel Currie of Canada finished second after losing a game 13-7 to the determined duo of Buhl and Monarrez, who came back from the loser's bracket to win it all. Karl Spickelmier and Gregg McFarland took third place honors.

The singles crown went to Donnie Cox again. Leroy Ledford came back from the loser's bracket to beat Donnie one match and the second match went three games, reports Glen Davidson. "A tough finish for the two favorites of the tournament," he said. Glen finished third after lagging two 4's in the third game, only to lose to Leroy Ledford who had a few 3's and 4's himself.

Twenty-five singles and 14 doubles teams participated in the tournament. Included in the singles competition were four women, Chris Danke, Mary Chapp, Donna Cox and Georgean Monahan. "Chris shot up a storm and knocked a few men out of the tourney," Glen reports. "She finished fifth and I'm sure in the near future, she will win an open singles."

Several States Represented in Winners' Circle at First East Coast Extravaganza

It's a long way from Fort Worth, Texas, to Mechanicsburg, Pennsylvania, but it was worth the trip for David Williams, who took home the singles title from the First East Coast Extravaganza staged over the Labor Day weekend. Michigan's John McDermott finished a strong second in the 40-player field, with Bill Melton of Oklahoma in third and Bobby Voorhis in fourth.

Bill Melton and Sam Summers of Oklahoma were the winning combo in the open doubles, stacking up their talents against 19 other teams. The husband-wife team of Gordie and Cheryl Collins of Michigan took second place honors. Bob Lewis of Arizona and Jim Snyder of Hagerstown, Pa., finished third, with Dave Williams and John McDermott in fourth.

Diana Hoffman of Ohio proved she's a force to be reckoned with by taking the top spot in the women's event. Pam Draheim of New York played tough and took second place, with Judy Gartland of Pennsylvania in third.


As the evening hours fade away, so too do the players; each saying to whomever will listen, "just wait until tomorrow."

Who's Who in The World of Shuffleboard: Jerry Herrmann Makes Things Happen in Philly

Everyone in Eastern shuffleboard circles knows the Herrmann (that's two r's and two n's) brothers, especially the friendly, fun-loving Jerry, who has invested a lot of time and effort into making the sport grow in the Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, area. When he's not involved in playing and promoting shuffleboard, Jerry is a pile driver for wharf and dock builders.

He was introduced to the game in a neighborhood bar league in the Bridesburg section of Philadelphia 27 years ago. It was Al Kweeder who taught him the basics of the game. He currently plays two or three times a week at Pickle's Bar and Lou's Sportsman's Bar in Philly.

Jerry started playing in tournaments 16 years ago and last year won the total point championship at the Lafayette Inn in Rising Sun, Maryland. Out of 16 tournaments played at the Lafayette Inn, he placed in 12 of them.

He considers two events as the highlights of his shuffleboard career. One was an East Coast doubles win with partner Bernie Martin, beating Stosh Chmielenski and Jerry's teacher, Al Kweeder, in Reading, Pa. in 1982. The other was a special award presented to him in 1986 by his peers in the Northeast Philadelphia League for his efforts in shuffleboard.

The other shuffling Herrmann brothers are Ray, Ronnie, and Bob. Ray and Ronnie have placed in many tournaments and Bob has been named rookie of the year six times.

What does he think of the future of shuffleboard? "It will grow with efforts of people like Jack Czerwonk, president of the N.E. Philly League; Judith Iseman, Joann and Art Ware, Dick Gorman, Milt Benedict, Doug Fridley, Rob Kern, The Shuffleboard Federation, The Board Talk, Sol Lipkin, Jim Yank and Ski," he said. All of those people would add to that list the name of Jerry Herrmann.

And what does he enjoy most about the sport. "Kneelock, splinters in index fingers, smoke-filled eyes, stepping on Rick Boyer's toes, and meeting a lot of nice people like the Wilbers," he said.

- Q. I understand the cost of the program is \$10 per person. How will my \$10 be spent?
- A. Your \$10 will be spent in five different areas. The breakdown is as follows:

\$3.00 for administration within your league, including wages for league officers, score sheets, membership cards, postage, etc.

\$1.50 to The Board Talk for team subscriptions and a full page every issue for league news and standings from your region.

\$1.50 for the Regional Handicapped Team Championships.

\$2.00 for the National Handicapped Team Championships scheduled for Las Vegas next summer.

\$2.00 to The Shuffleboard Federation for administration and wages for a full- time National Program Director.

- **Q.** I see handicap referred to several times. Does this mean our league will have to play under your handicap system?
- A. No. The Shuffleboard Federation's handicap system will be used for the regional and national team tournaments, as well as all new leagues being formed by The Federation. Existing leagues that join the program are exempt. We highly recommend the handicap system to all leagues as it has a proven record in helping leagues in other areas to grow.
- Q. How will my handicap be determined and who will do it?

A. The Federation will receive a copy of all league score sheets and will keep track of the won and loss records of all players individually. Each player will receive a handicap rating based on his or her record and where that record ranks them within their league.

Handicaps will be determined as follows:

The top 15 percent of the players will be a 1 handicap The next 35 percent of the players will be a 2 handicap

JFFLEBOARD LEAGUE

The next 35 percent of the players will be a 3 handicap The last 15 percent of the players will be a 4 handicap Pro players will be allowed to participate and will have a handicap of -1

- Q. How will the handicap system be used in the regional and national championships?
- A. All teams must submit a roster in advance. Each team must include at least two women, and the combined handicaps of the six players must be between 14 and 16. This system gives every team in the tournament a chance to win.
- Q. Can the team be made up of any one or do the players have to be from my team in the league?
- A. The team may be made up of any six players who are members of the NASL as long as there are at least two women and the team qualifies under the handicap requirements.
- Q. When and where will the regional handicapped team tournament take place? A.The regional tournament will be held the weekend before the Great Arizona Open in Phoenix, Arizona, and will include free instructional clinics by top pro players.
- Q. Will joining the NASL mean we have to change our league rules?
- A. No. The Shuffleboard Federation will insist that your league include some good rules of sportsmanship for the protection of all the parties involved as well as to assist us in attracting sponsors. We will, in the future, establish uniform rules through a committee of amateur players from across the country as we did with the pros through the Player Policy Board.
- Q. Can I sign up as an individual or does my whole league have to join?
- A. The program is a national league program and is designed for leagues as a whole and individual memberships are not a part of the program at this time.

WOMEN'S PRO TOUR

The Shuffleboard Federation is making the Women's Pro Tour one of its top priorities in 1990. The women, as a result of their active support of The Federation's efforts to promote their events, have received a larger commitment of The Federation's time and money for the upcoming year.

We are happy to announce Fritzy Broka of Toledo, Ohio; Cheryl Collins of Davisburg, Michigan; Diana Hagen of Houston, Texas; Peggy Richards of Phoenix, Arizona; and Rita Yank of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, will be working with The Federation as Women's Pro Tour Representatives. They will be providing feedback on how to increase participation in pro tour events, tavern tournaments and league play.

NATIONAL AMATEUR SHUFFLEBOARD LEAGUE

Things are going at a hectic pace for the new NASL, with existing leagues jumping on the bandwagon in addition to the many new leagues being started by The Federation. The NASL and the development of amateur shuffleboard in general have become our top priorities and will continue to be for the foreseeable future. As you will see in our calendar section, our 1989 schedule will feature regional handicap NASL tournaments the weekend before our pro events. This interaction between pros and amateurs, which includes instructional clinics, will be very healthy for the promotion and development of the amateur side of the game.

For all of you interested amateur players, if you have any suggestions on how we can do a better job for amateur shuffleboard, or if there are events you would like to see us promote, please do not hesitate to write.






