For the first time, its organizers didn't say when it was all over with -- "never again!" Sure, there was the usual physical and mental exhaustion, but there was also the emotional high of feeling that this reunion was really special. With that high came the recognition that it wasn't anything we did that made it special. It was first and foremost, the players.

This was the first time we had held our tournament in two different locations. Probably never has there been the foot traffic across the 27-55 intersection at Houghton Lake than there was this particular weekend. No sooner would a team finish their match at the Northway and trek across the street to Skip's Lounge for a brief respite from the action, that they'd get the announcement that they were up again on a board -across the street -- or vice versa. If they did grumble, it must have been out in the middle of the intersection dodging the pre-4th of July traffic because we didn't hear it. Just good natured "well, slug-a-lug, let's go."

For the first time, our shufflers' reunion tournament wasn't a big financial burden for us. Thanks to Playfair Shuffleboard Company and Budweiser, the expense of bringing the boards in and out and the trophies for the winners was borne by them -- not small items in the debit column. And thanks again to the players, none grumbled about the small percentage we took off the top of the entry and sponsorship sales to give some compensation to our loyal, hardworking officials and helpers. The hours and dedication they invest in helping to run a smooth tournament are so important that no amount of money could be adequate compensation. We love and appreciate each and every one of them.

For the first time, the printed program which has become a tradition for our tournament, giving players a tangible item in which to record their memories, was not a heavy financial burden. Thanks to the sponsors who purchased ad space, we could give this booklet of memories to every player.

For the first time, we reached beyond the loyal circle of players who have supported the Board Talk tournament for the past five years and gathered in some new "kissin' cousins" from The World of Shuffleboard to join in the reunion. Many experienced competitive tournament play for the first time and -- thanks to the warm welcome by the regulars -- it won't be the last time. To those of you who extended the hand of fellowship to our new family members, we say "Bless you for reaching out and touching someone."

Broka Brothers Win at Lakeside

The Broka name has been synonymous with shuffleboard for a lot of years, but the May 12 doubles tournament at the Lakeside Lounge, Union Lake, Michigan, marked the first time that brothers Terry and Greg (we've forgotten which one is "the other guy") earned top honors together. The Buckeyes took the largest share of the \$3300 pot, with Phil McGrew of Pontiac and Neil Fetter of Detroit taking second place honors. Locals Gene Gach and Wally Frederick took third place.

Dew Drop Inn Hosts First National Open

The Dew Drop Inn hosted the first Waterloo, New York, National Open on June 8-10. The event was sponsored by Pabst Blue Ribbon beer and co-hosted by the Waterloo American Legion. Players from eight states competed for a total purse and prizes of more than \$5,000.

Friday night's draw partner event sold out two weeks before as 30 players shot for over \$1600 in prize money. First place trophies and jackets went to the surprise team of Tracie Fridley of Waterloo and Ken Vanzile of Sidney. Turned back to second were Doug Fridley Jr. and Russ Reynolds of Sherburne on a super three-draw by Ken. Taking third spot were favorites Lonzo Knight from Hagerstown, Md. and Jerry Herrmann of Philadelphia.

The American Legion set up sausage and cheeseburg sandwiches with peppers, onions, and french fries for all the players.

On Saturday, the bring partner event saw 20 teams vie for over \$2000 in cash, plus a paid entry to the first place winners into The Board Talk's Houghton Lake, Michigan, tournament. From Sherburne, New York, it was the team of Milt Benedict and Steve Bennett earning the first place jackets and trophies. Runners-up from Philadelphia were Judy Gartland and Jerry Herrmann, with tourney favorites Doug Fridley Jr. and Lonzo Knight in third. Fourth place winnings went to Arlo Johnson and John Canino from Baldwinsville, New York.

The Fridley family opened up, for the first time, their recently completed shuffleboard banquet room upstairs with a buffet-style dinner prepared by Elsie Fridley for all the shufflers. The huge wall mural and hanging fan lights added a nice touch to a great weekend of shuffleboard shooting.

Sunday's singles event turned out to be a battle to the finish with prize monies topping \$1500. After losing 15-2 in the first match of the finals, Jerry Herrmann bounced back to take a 15-14 decision from Doug Fridley Jr. to win the singles. Along with the first place jacket and trophy, Jerry received a paid entry into the Houghton Lake, Michigan, tourney.

Second went to Doug Jr. the hard way by beating out brother Dave Fridley by a tough 15-13 score and settled for third. To get to that match, Dave had to last out a 15-14 score over 4th place winner Steve Bennett. Once again, a superb buf-(continued on page 3)





Record Turnout for Board Talk's 6th Annual Tourney

An unprecedented 120 players turned out for The Board Talk's 6th Annual Shufflers' Reunion Tournament, held this year at Skip's Lounge and Northway Lanes in Houghton Lake, Michigan, June 28-July 1. That record number of players vied for a share of the nearly \$20,000 pot in five events. The tournament was co-sponsored by Playfair Shuffleboard Company, who furnished six boards for the big event, and Budweiser, who furnished trophies, jackets, caps and suspenders for winners and player drawings.

Action started on Thursday night with 64 players competing in the draw partner event, with six different states represented in the winner's circle. Winners were Chris Passariello of Saginaw, Michigan, and Mike Johnson of Warsaw, Indiana. They beat the tough team of Mickey Mickens of New Jersey and Milt Benedict of New York. Taking third place honors were Skip Jackson of Indiana and Steve Bennett of New York, with Paul Dickens of Bay City, Mich., and Jerry Siebert of Lansing in fourth place. Jerry Herrmann of Philadelphia and Jimmy (the cop) Kumpula of Michigan/Florida, and Frank Parrish of Michigan and Paul Macarrone of Florida, tied for fifth and sixth.

Twenty-one very tough ladies entered the women's singles and it came down to Top 20 representatives Cheryl Collins of Michigan and Deb Voorhis of Indiana to give the standingroom-only crowd some thrilling moments. Cheryl used her win to put her in gear for the U.S. Open in Austin, Texas, where she travelled to immediately following the tourney. Deb showed the admiring gallery why she's one of the topranked women players in the nation by capturing second place. Veteran Michigan contender Marie Sweeney took third place honors, with East Coast favorite Joann Ware of Ours & Your Place, Sudlersville, Maryland, in fourth.

Neil Fetter of Michigan, ranked No. 19 in the national standings coming into this tourney, showed his prowess by coming out ahead of a formidable field of 44 players in the men's singles. He had to work hard to beat second place finisher Rick Boyer, also of Michigan, ranked No. 20 in the national standings. Taking third place honors was veteran Jim Long of Indiana, with Dave Boaz, also of Indiana, in fourth place. Larry Creakbaum of Indiana and Chris Passariello of Michigan tied for fifth and sixth places, with Scratch Todd of Maryland and J.R. Lopez of Michigan tied for seventh and eighth.

Michigan was prominent in the 37-team open doubles event with natives Jim Stockmaster and Phil McGrew, beating out the famous husband and wife team of Gordie and Cheryl Collins. A surprising "dark horse" team of long-time Michigan players, Don Bauer and Ceylon Davis, took third place honors with the East Coast team of Mickey Mickens and Jerry Herrmann in fourth. Bernie Sunde and Doug Stewart of Michigan and Paul Maccarone and Jimmy Kumpula tied for fifth and sixth places, with Cassie Kern of Michigan and Al DiBella of Pennsylvania, and J.R. Lopez and Dana Gray of Michigan finishing seventh and eighth.

At 2:30 a.m. Monday morning, two teams out of 16 were still battling for the championship of the 4-person team event. With no place to go, finalists Neil Fetter, Val Borja, Chris Passierello and Jerry Siebert; Cassie Kern, Phil McGrew, Wally Fredericks and Gene Gach, all of Michigan, agreed to split the pot and take the title of co-champions. The Board Talk tournament directors salute them for their understanding and good sportsmanship. The East Coast team of JoAnn Ware, Judy
Isemarin, Scratch Todd and Lenny Dell took third place honors. Dillinger's, another Michigan team, finished in fourth place: Marie Sweeney, Bev Armsdon, Rick Boyer and Jim Kelsey.







It is with great pleasure that I announce a new column that will hopefully be a solid addition to The Board Talk's contribution to The World of Shuffleboard.

"Ask the Pros" will present various questions to some of the top shuffleboard players in the world. I'm sure their answers will serve as a great teacher to beginning players and experienced shooters as well.

Our regular panel of pros consists of Bill Melton of Oklahoma, John McDermott of Michigan, Sam Summers of Oklahoma, and Bobby Voorhis of Indiana. This lineup, a virtual Who's Who in shuffleboard, has agreed to share with us their outlooks and strategies that have helped them become some of the most consistent winners ever to play the game.

In later columns, we will feature guest panelists from various skill levels of the shuffleboard world to add their viewpoints to those of our regular star- studded panel.

I would like to take this space to thank Bill, John, Sam and Bobby for caring enough about the game to take the time to share some of their expert knowledge with the rest of us. If you find that you enjoy this column, remember to thank these players in person when possible. When one of their tips helps your game, drop a line to The Board Talk and let them know.

WHAT ADVICE AND TIPS WOULD YOU GIVE TO BEGINNING SHUFFLEBOARD PLAYERS THAT COULD HELP THEM BECOME BETTER AND MORE COMPETI-TIVE PLAYERS FASTER?

Bill Melton:

The best advice I could give to a beginning shuffleboard player would be to practice alone, shooting the pucks over and over again. Designate a certain spot on the board and practice the same shot until you have mastered it, then move to another spot on the board and do the same. You learn complete control of the board and of your pucks by doing this.

Also, learn to shoot rails. This is probably the single most difficult thing for a beginner to learn.

A beginner should also develop a good sense of concentration. Concentration is the key to shuffleboard.

John McDermott:

There are three things I would recommend to beginners. I am a believer in developing good habits right from the beginning. If you learn something the wrong way and then have to back up and re-learn it later, it will be more difficult and you will end up investing more time than if you did it right the first time. To become a reasonably good player, you are going to have to learn to shoot off the rails as opposed to free hand, so it is best to start that way right from the beginning. It may take some time to find a release you feel comfortable with and, in fact, you may experiment with different releases for as long as you play. The important thing is to get started shooting off the rails right away.

The second thing is to learn to shoot with both hands. Anyone who wants to be an average or better player is going to have to learn this eventually. No player has this ability from birth. It is something you will have to develop, so the sooner, the better.

Third, in order to be a good lagger, which will keep you in the game even if you are missing some weights, you should try not to change speeds on your shots any more than necessary. It makes keeping a good feel for the speed of the board much more difficult if you shoot one shot hard, then another medium, etc. If you develop a good medium speed shot for shooting at the weights and then just shoot a little easier when you are lagging, I think you will be pleased with the results.

Sam Summers:

Ask this question of 100 different people and you'd probably get the same answer -- practice, practice, practice. Well, it's true! Practice builds confidence and confidence wins games. To become a top amateur or pro player, you must be confident in your ability to make a shot as well as know it's the correct shot.

Practice can be fun! When practicing alone, it sometimes means more if you play little games: right hand versus left hand, red versus blue, top board (free hand) vrsus span shots. When possible, have a friend or spouse set shots up for you so you can practice your doubles, clip-outs, come-arounds, rail and span shots, cross-boards, blast shots, short game, etc. If available, put two or three sets of weights on the same board. Remember, when practicing your lag, always concentrate on your release and direction. Practice lagging with a weight blocking your favorite spot.

Be aware of, but don't worry too much, about strategy. Hit the weights and lag. Straight shooting and average lagging will win a lot of games for you. When you have the opportunity, play opponents who are better than you at this time, in order to learn from them. Watch games between the better players and observe strategies and techniques. Ask questions later. Every game you play or watch can teach you something if your mind is on what's going on.

Play as often as possible -- league play, Friday night robins, local tournaments. Play on as many different boards as available. Control your drinking and always display good sportsmanship.

Like anything else in life, you only get out of it what you put into it. Don't get discouraged. Good practicing! Good playing! And good luck! See you in a big tourney soon.

Bobby Voorhis:

Practice, practice, practice, and don't give up if things don't go quite right. Try to join a local league and shoot in all the \$2 and \$5 round robins you can find. Practice by yourself if there's no one to play against. Watch and study the acknowledged "pros" and don't be afraid to ask questions. There's a lot more theory to the game than just hitting weights and lagging. Enter the smaller local tourneys and take your lumps, but learn from the experience.
