

I'm sending a snapshot of my dear granddaughter, Rachel. She was born Dec. 6, 1974, here in Vista, California. When she was little, I would put a chair at the end of "the board" and she would love to slide 'em down the plank. Such fun she had. Over the years, she's kept her hand in the game and still enjoys it. She was 15 this Dec. 6.

I bought this board from Duke Snyder, the left-handed slugger from the Brooklyn Dodgers era. He lives about 20 miles from Vista. His team mates back in the late 50s and early 60s had this board custom made for him. I understand that he liked the game very much. How I came to be the proud owner of this fine board is a long story. I won't go into it now. And I'm not even sure how I got in touch with Al Stewart, but I did.

Al came to my place and took my board top back to his place in El Monte and refinished it. I also bought an old, beatup electric scoreboard from him that goes to 15 for two players and 21 for four, dime-fed if you so charge, or you can open the front of it and flip the lever. I bought the board from Duke on Nov. 17, 1972. I still have the canceled check and a note of thanks from him. I also have Al's canceled check from the job he did for me back in March of 1974.

I have a few friends who really enjoy the game. Most of them had never heard or seen a table shuffleboard before, only the deck-type game, which is no comparison. We have a lot of good times at it.


Thanksgiving Action in Indiana

Who's Who in the World of Shuffleboard: No. 2 in National Rankings - No. 1 in Class!

Tough, consistent, cool under pressure, strategically smart this young shuffleboard couple fits all the criteria that put each in the No. 2 spots of nationally-ranked players for 1989. It was these qualifications that earned Bobby Voorhis and Deb Somers of Indiana that recognition and the dollars involved in winning. Their involvement in Shuffleboard Federation and other tourneys always give a boost to the total pots, but it's their demeanor, their class act, their willingness to give back to the game, that make them highly- respected and popular figures in today's shuffleboard movement.

Bobby comes from a shuffleboard family. His dad, Bussy; his sister, Marisa, and his cousin, Jerry Warr, are all active players. Dad Buss is a tavern owner and Bobby started bartending at 20 (he now also runs a shuffleboard refinishing business) and "you had to know how to shoot," he said. He became known locally as a force to be reckoned with and when The Shuffleboard Federation, Inc., was founded, Bobby was tapped as a member of the prestitious Player Policy Board, representing players from throughout the nation. During the past year, he has participated in every Shuffleboard Federation sponsored event and placed in every tournament except Phoenix. He finished first in the Fort Worth, Texas, and Fort Wayne, Indiana, singles, and first in the Las Vegas doubles.

According to Bobby, the highlights of his 15-year (10 "hardcore") shuffleboard career were winning his first major singles in Fort Worth last year by beating Billy Mays of Texas once and Bill Melton of Oklahoma twice, and winning the Las Vegas doubles with Billy Chiles "shooting around the clock and playing the finals while they tore down the boards around us."

What does he think lies in store for shuffleboard in the years ahead? "It will grow in some areas and decline in others. It goes in cycles. The pros need sponsor money and the

amateurs need good organization," Bobby said. He believes The Shuffleboard Federation is making strides in both of those areas.

And what does he enjoy most about the sport? "The competition, the people, and the paycheck after beating everyone they send against you!"

Debbie, a technical support representative for a data processing company, has been playing for six years. She doesn't come from a shuffleboard family, but was introduced to the game by watching it at a local bar. She went to a tournament and met Bobby, who taught her the basics of the game.

Up until this past year, she played twice a week in leagues, and is now concentrating on the tournament trail, where she is doing very well. She played in seven major tournaments this past year and placed third in Las Vegas, second in Fort Wayne, second in Detroit, and second in Austin, Texas. The highlight of her shuffleboard career, Debbie says, was winning the women's singles event at The Board Talk's 1988 tournament.

Deb thinks the sport of shuffleboard will grow in the future "because there are so many good people involved." What she enjoys most about the game are "the competition and the good friends I've made."

If these two players are representative of the people involved in the sport, the future of shuffleboard is in good hands.





Weight/Counter-Weight will be a bi-monthly feature column in The Board Talk. The column was created to serve as an open forum to show opposing viewpoints on subjects that are frequently discussed among shuffleboard players nationwide. The purpose is not to change anyone's personal viewpoint on a particular topic but rather to show that on most issues, there are valid points to each side. Greater understanding among players is the goal.

Should there be separate events for women players only?

YES!

Even though at many tournaments there are not enough women to have separate events, there still should be a concentrated effort to do so. In order for the female population of shuffleboard players to grow, they should be able to compete against one another so the competition remains somewhat equal.

Most women have just started enjoying the game of shuffleboard at the competitive tournament level. If allowed to learn the finer points of the game while competing against each other, they would be less inclined to get discouraged as is possible when forced into competition with the generally more accomplished male players.

All one has to do is compare the auction selling price of a top female player when she is competing in a field comprised exclusively of women, against the amount that is bid when she plays in open competition, to realize that there is a need for separate events.

There are a handful of women who can and do play the game on the same level as the men but, at this point in time, that remains the exception rather than the rule.

NO!

Sincere there is no physical advantage for one sex over the other in shuffleboard, why should there be separate event? Besides, most of the time not enough women show up to have a good tournament. Women should be treated as equals in the game and that will not happen as long as they compete only amongst themselves.

Competitors should be separated by the talent level that they have reached, rather than gender. What in the world does a person's sex have to do with shuffleboard anyway?
