As this is written a couple weeks before our annual Board Talk Shufflers' Reunion Tournament, we're in our usual state of frenzy. We thought it was going to be different this year --set a limit, stick to the limit, have paid- in-advance registration so we'd know going in who was going to play and estimate fairly accurately how long it might take for each event. The first few weeks after we first advertised the tournament, it appeared that this year was going to be different. Then, overnight it seemed, the system blew a fuse. Suddenly, one day's mail put us over the limit in some events (so what are we to do? Put them in a fishbowl and draw to see who gets in and who doesn't?). Then, the phone calls started coming ("You should know we'd be there; we haven't missed one yet.") and we relented, raising the limit to let in the latecomers. We're praying we won't be sorry that we did!

It did teach us a lesson, one we think tourney directors and players should learn from, too. Paid-in-advance registration is the only way to save your spot and the posted limit IS the limit. Dick Gorman has been using that procedure for a long time now and Eastern players have learned that if they want to play, they have to pay -- in advance and early. It's the only way directors can determine who and how many will play and that knowledge can make the difference between a smooth-running tournament and one that gives players cause to complain. This sport is getting big enough (five Memorial Day tournaments reported in this issue!) that we need to get professional about entries. Other sports do it -- why can't we?

Despite the normal pre-tourney jitters, we're looking forward to the big reunion and seeing all the members of the shuffleboard family who will be at Houghton Lake.

Is there a shuffleboard in heaven? The many friends of Wayne Reist like to believe there is and that "Weener" has located Ed Estep up there, and together they're enjoying the sport they both loved so much. Weener's sudden death shook the midwest's shuffleboard community. He was still a young man, a gentle man, a talented shuffler who added a touch of class to league activities and whatever tournament he entered. The World of Shuffleboard gathered around his grieving family, supporting them with their kindness and help and with two benefit tournaments. After his funeral, a teammate said: "This is a sad day for shuffleboard." It was indeed. We will miss our friend Weener.

The response of the shuffleboard family to this great loss was a tribute to Weener and hopefully a comfort to Carol and the family he left behind.

That didn't deter shufflers from traveling to Sherburne, New York, for Benedict's Classic. It was another sell- out and the bad weather was outshined by the Benedicts' hospitality.

Saturday morning, the weather was gloomy but there were 16 of the fairer sex who looked bright and sunny as they entered the women's singles. JoAnn Ware, Sudlersville, Md., owner of Ours & Your Place, outdistanced the field to take first place. Pam Draheim, New Drop Inn, Waterloo, N.Y. took second place, with Rita Gates, Sherburne, N.Y., representing Benedict's Classic, came in third.

Saturday noon, 32 bring-partner teams were ready to "shuffle off" and at 5 a.m. Sunday morning, Al DiBella and Jerry Herrmann, both from Philadelphia, outdistanced the field and took first place. It was Al's first major win. Second place went also to first-time winners, John Canino and Arlo Johnson, Baldwinsville, N.Y., with third place going to John Lukas, Millington, Md. and Charlie Walker, Wilmington. Fourth place was taken by Jack Gardner, Greensboro, Md. and John Ware, Templeville, Md. Steve Bennett, Sherburne, and Doug Fridley Jr. took fifth, with first time tournament players Doug Krum of Sherburne and Lauren Law, Symrna, N.Y. in sixth.

The Indiana boys did well," said Dick. Beef "Stein" Camp of Kendallville, Ind. took first place in the singles, and in his first trip east, Mike Johnson, Warsaw, Ind. finished second. Bobby V took third place, with Mike Johnson's twin, Chuck King of Dover, Del., in fourth.

"It was a great tournament arranged and hosted by the hospitable Benedict family and despite the weather, everyone thinks it's a great place. Beef Camp left with a smile on his face -- again!" reports Dick.






Pros, Amateurs Celebrate Memorial Day at Michigan Open




Another win for Diana with partner Earl Kelly of Texas in the mixed doubles event.

was second place Papa's I team. Dillinger's "Pink" finished in third place.


Rick Boyer and Jim Stockmaster of Michigan were winners of the pro-am event.






Tournament officials Kathy Broka, Rob Kern and Diana Hoffman logged over 200 hours to help keep the Michigan Open running smoothly.


