Skip Jackson continued his winning ways at the Kimmell Inn, Kimmell, Ind., on March 10, teaming up with Larry Creakbaum to take first place. Seventeen teams vied for a pot of \$1700. #### Fridley/Dunham/Draheim Big Winners at Amy's

Seventy-two players entered the 5th New York State ISL Tournament hosted by Amy's Checkered Flag in Waterloo, N.Y. on March 10-11 and shot for the largest two-day purse yet for the monthly tournaments.

In the draw partner event, 34 shufflers shot for a record \$1100, with Checkered Flag local Al Dunham (B.A.) teaming up with Doug Fridley Jr. from the Dew Drop Inn to take home the trophy. Earning second spot was the team of Jack Wheeler from B'Ville Moose and Yogi Rusavage from the Classic. They made it tough on the winners by beating them the first game in the finals with a nice 4-tunk by Yogi. Third place went to the exciting team of Jim Fowler and Les Hodge (playing in his first ISL tourney). Les says he showed up just to have a good time, which he did, and ended up with part of the purse.

In the bring your partner event, 38 shooters aimed for a purse of \$1285 with the Final Four being an all-Waterloo finale. The first place trophy went to the Dew Drop Inn team of Pam Draheim and Doug Fridley Jr., making a marathan of it by losing their second match and struggling through the loser's bracket (including an hour-long match against tourney favorites Dick Jeffrey and Steve Bennett). Turned back to second were hometown favorites John Arndt and owner Amy Westfall of Amy's Checkered Flag.

Two tough matches in the finals saw Pam and Doug win 15-14 the first game and in the second game it was who was going to last it out! "We ran out of gas but John and Amy broke down at the finish line," said Pam. Down 13-9, Pam and (continued on page 3)

# Shufflers' Notebook

News and Views from The World of Shuffleboard

#### The Need for Board Standardization

Whenever our family gets together, no matter what the occasion, one thing you can be sure of: the talk will eventually turn to shuffleboard. Between us, we have accumulated over 100 years of experience in this great game of ours.

As in the case in most family discussions, our opinions about the game are as varied as our personalities. Yet, there is one subject that we all agree on. Our sport must find a way of standardizing the equipment we use.

As the name shuffleboard implies, the board is the foundation of the game, so that is where we began. We each described our "ideal" board and unanimously agreed that it would possess all of the following characteristics: (1) rideable rails, (2) being able to "place" a weight anyhere on the board, (3) equal speed from both ends, (4) being able to slide weights, and (5) laggable.

We feel that play on such a board as this would increase spectator awareness, in that all aspects of the game are highlighted and therefore the game itself becomes more exciting.

We talked about the progress the game has made in the past several years. The Board Talk gave shuffleboard enthusiasts all over the country an open forum to comunicate with each other. The Shuffleboard Federation developed, organized and promoted a national professional tour and brought our sport out of bars and into a professional setting. The P.C.S.A. took their show on the road to Las Vegas a couple of years ago and gave us all a glimpse of how big tournaments could be.

It is now time for the players themselves to assume a responsible role in the promotion and growth of our sport and a perfect way to begin is by sharing your views about board conditions and requirements with your local promoters and writing these views down for the Player Policy Board.

In order for the promoters to provide us with a "standard" board, we as players must first express our opinions to determine board standards.

We have sent a copy of this letter to the Player Policy Board and we urge all playes to do the same. Only through awareness comes change, and change promotes growth. Sincerely,

#### Long Board Vs. Short Board

One of the biggest controversies in our area is the short board/long board version. I personally play in two leagues. One we play long board, the other short board. How nice it would be if they were both the same. I prefer the short version. We just this year got the one league to go from 21 points to 15. That's the one that continues the long version.

Doesn't the country play the short version -- or do they have the same problem?

#### John Cowen, Columbia City, Indiana

Here's the rule, John: any weight completely clearing the foul line nearest the player shooting shall be a legal weight and count 1 providing no opponent weight(s) are ahead of it. Our league has been playing 15 points for 17 years. It actually saved our league and made it bigger and stronger. You can now go home at 10:30 p.m. vs. maybe 1:00-1:30 a.m. We play nine games a match and start at 7 p.m. I' ve played in tournaments from Maryland to California and Oregon to Texas and everything is 15 points and short board. Have you ever run into this one, John? The player(s) shooting retain the hammer if no one scores. It's been just the last four years that the East Coast players became convinced that the hammer should change.



#### Knox/Long Winners at Lucky's Spring Bash



### **Player Policy Board Meeting**

Thanks to those who took the time to write and express their ideas on how to improve the tournaments and the rules which govern them.

There were several new rules added as well as a change in the percentages for distribution of prize monies.

- 1. A proposal was made to allow tournaments that are on the tour schedule to be played in a round robin format, and for them to count in the point standings. Citing difficulties in making the results work under the current points format, this proposal was voted down unanimously.
- 2. Coaching of an amateur team by someone who is not a team member: it was decided that only a person's partner or the team captain may offer advice. One warning will be issued and then a one-point per violation will be assessed thereafter.
- 3. Coaching of a player in the open events: no coaching of a player in a singles event by anyone. In doubles, advise may be given by a person's partner only. One warning, one point penalty thereafter.
- 4. "Extended Shot" guidelines: The following criteria must be met for a shot to be a legal delivery -- One food must be on the ground, both feet must be behind the deuce line when the weight is delivered. A line will be taped to the ground to mark the legal delivery zone. Penalty for violation will be the loss of that shot; any weights which may have been knocked off or moved will be replaced.
- 5. Time allotment for matches: It was agreed that The Federation will, on a trial basis, use 1-1/2 hours per match for the first round of winners and losers brackets. It should be noted that in the most recent tournament, the Great Arizona Open, the doubles fell behind by nearly two hours, resulting in matches having to be played later than we would like to see.
- 6. Adjusting of boards after the tournament begins: We wish to thank the Broka family for their letter regarding playing conditions and board standardization.

It is very difficult to install eight or more boards on a Monday morning and have them play as well as we would like them to by Wednesday. Those of you who are familiar with setting up boards know that even if your level says the board is right on, it does not mean that when you throw weights on it that it will shoot straight.

Often times as the week goes on, differences in the speed from end to end that were too small to

notice at first become very pronounced, resulting in a hammer control board.

Also, rails that were shooting good may start to dump as the boards continue to settle. The Policy Board decided that a person will be designated by the Policy Board members who are present to make whatever adjustments are necessary to the boards each morning prior to the start of play.

The issue of standards is addressed in more detail later in this article.

7. Distribution of prize money: Changes were made on the percentages for 16 teams or less, and for 17-23 teams. The percentages remained the same for 24-32 teams. For 33 or more teams, prize money for 7th and 8th have been added. The breakdowns are listed below:

16 teams or less: 3 places -- 58, 28, 14 (percentages)

17 to 23 teams: 4 places -- 55, 26, 13, 6

24 to 32 teams: 6 places -- 52, 24, 12, 6, 3, 3

33 teams or more: 8 places -- 50, 24, 12, 6, 3, 3, 1, 1

### **Board Standards: What's the Answer?**

From a promoter's standpoint, we would like playing conditions to be as good as humanly possible. We agree with the Broka family, who wrote a letter addressing this issue to The Board Talk and the Player Policy Board. The better the boards, the more fun they are to play as well as watch.

Anyone who is a shuffleboard player knows that counting on the people who manufacture the shuffleboards for support is shuffleboard's version of Russian Roulette.

American Shuffleboard is in the process of changing hands, Playfair Shuffleboard thinks that supplying boards for the tour is a bad investment because "players don't buy boards." Classic Shuffleboard has shown some interest but, as a new company, does not have the resources to sponsor the tour at this time.

The ideal situation is to have the same boards for each tournament and to make sure that they play up to the standards that we all would like. Ideally, we would also have the same person adjusting them at each tournament.

Most players feel the same about how they would like a board to play, equal speed from both ends, and rails which come in a little but not so much that rail shooting is taken out of play.

We have approached Al Stewart and asked him if he would be interested in doing this and, if so, to think about what it would cost for his services.

As the letter from the Broka family said, "It is now time for the players themselves to assume a responsible role in the promotion and growth of our sport...."

The Shuffleboard Federation has invested substantially to get to where we are now. Last year alone, our travel, hotel, food and drink expenses were in excess of \$32,000. When you add \$6000 for trophies and flyers, more than 100 buckets of wax, plus our time, you get an idea of the kind of commitment we have made.

It is time for the players to make some additional commitments if they truly want the game to continue to advance. If the players are ready to make the investment, we are ready, willing and able to continue to do our part. Quite frankly, the players' past performance in demonstrating a willingness to do their share has been very poor.

We had made it a requirement that everyone who participated in our events subscribe to The Board Talk. This caused so much griping that, since it has always been our intention to run the tournaments the way the players wanted, we have dropped that as a requirement.

We will be making a proposal to you, the players, in the near future detailing what it will cost to buy boards for the tour, as well as the cost of transportation, and hiring a person to level and clean the playing surface and gutters every morning prior to the first matches of the day.

You will have an opportunity to decide whether we can take ourselves to the next level. Are you as a player ready to be an asset to the shuffleboard community? Will you as players who express a desire to see our sport step up another level part with a percentage of your prize money to make it happen?


It's your hammer.
