Ross Baer then climbed on the ladder and painted the walls and brought it all together right before our eyes.



Third place went to Doug Fridley Jr., Waterloo, New York, and Alvis Ramey, Perryville, Md. The final money spot, fourth place, went to Milt Benedict and Russ Reynolds of Sherburne.

A new format for Benedicts this year was substituting the open singles on Sunday with a mixed doubles. The response was great and proved to be a popular decision. Losing their first match and coming all the way to first place were Judy Gartland of Philadelphia and Mickey Mickens. They beat out the husband and wife team of Jim and Rita Yank. Third place went to the sister- brother team of Tracie and Doug Fridley Jr. and fourth to another husband and wife team, Jane and Arlo Johnson of Jordan, New York.

"The East Coast point race is on and the results of this fourboard tournament show Rita Yank in the women's race and Jim Yank, men's division, in first place in the Blue Division. There are a lot of tournaments scheduled for points this year and it is a long way until next August. But so far, it is Yank and Yank," reports Dick.





And second place brings smiles from Val Borja of Michigan and Chuck Norris of Oregon with congratulations from The Shuffleboard Federation's Phil Skover.




They did it again! "Neighbors" Diana Hagen and Brenda Moore of Texas squared off in the women's singles with Diana the victor.

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

It's Time for a Change!

For many years now, I have been upset at the way possible fours have been decided in the game of shuffleboard. It seems to me that when the outcome of a game or tournament hinges on someone's ability to run a weight down the back of the board to determine if a three or four has been scored, we put not only the players, but the officials running the weight, in a very bad position.

First, only one official can run the weight to determine if there is any movement which would then make the call a four. Second, most weights are high in the center, making it impossible for anyone to consistently run a weight with any degree of accuracy. Third, if the weight moves or not can be great cause for argument.

The Shuffleboard Federation's Player Policy Board has come up with a very fair and accurate way of determing other calls by using a minimum of three and up to five officials to make a call.

If the officials are trying to determine if a weight is an ace or a deuce, they simply check to see if they can see any board in between the weight and the deuce line. Majority rules. The officials are able to look over the weight as many times or for as long as they need before making their call. This system is the best I have ever seen.

I feel that we can reach the same degree of accuracy in calling a potential four by the addition of a four line at the end of the board. With the addition of the four line, officials would then look over the weight and in this case, if they could not see board between the weight and the four line, the call would be four. The end reult would be a much more professional way of calling the weight in this situation. A beneficial side effect would be more fours, which will lead to faster and more exciting games and give players the chance to "come back" more often.

With the growing clout that Phil Skover, The Shuffleboard Federation, along with the Player Policy Board and The Board Talk have with shuffleboard manufacturers, the four line can be added at the factory. I'm sure that once the proper width of the line has been determined by the Player Policy Board, a method of adding this line to existing boards would be easy to come up with. Fours are to shuffleboard what home runs are to baseball and long touchdown bombs are to football -- instant excitement!!!

Phil McGrew, Union Lake, Michigan

In theory, you've made some good points, Phil, but let's look at it from a view of being practical. Putting a four line at the end of the board means every line at each end would have to be moved to maintain the 6-inches between lines unless it was agreed to have less space between three and four. We think we should get more opinions on the subject. We always assumed the four was the easiest to call, but cringe to see someone (especially an official) zip a puck across the end with speed. It's too easy to tip the measuring weight one way or the other without being detected. I would like to see a larger and flat measuring device having one official draw it across the end very slowly while the other officials observe. While on that subject, there's something else we should probably be more concerned about. We should be careful to select officials who are not in conflict of owning a player they are making a call on. This is not to suggest the official would be dishonest, but let's not induce doubt into the minds of owners of the other players involved.



Question: What is the best way to learn an unfamiliar board?

Sam Summers: Assuming a tournament situation where you are allowed 5 minutes practice (approximately eight weights up and back twice), you should follow a set routine. Example -- shoot a normal rail shot just above estimated lag speed and note the drift in or out. With the same hand, release a finger or span shot down that same rail and note its reaction. Shoot the same two shots with the other hand, again noting the drift. By now, you should be getting a feel for the speed also. Now, try a cross board shot to the corner with each hand, aiming at the deuce line and note if the rail dumps or comes back toward center. With your last two weights, practice picking a weight off the corner with your best rail shot. The second time around, with the first four shots, practice playing the drift to set on "pretend" deep weight. Practice your lag with the last four weights or practice a shot you're not sure of. During the first game, shoot firmer shots until you become more comfortable with the board. Of course, there are "as you play" strategies of learning a board, but I'd prefer to teach you personally.

Hint: watching a match on your next assigned board can be very rewarding.

Bobby Voorhis: Watch Billy Mays play a game on it! If forced to play on a strange board, you have to shoot harder at first and practice lagging when possible. Watch your opponent's tracks and try to follow them. If you have practice time, shoot down each rail several times at varying speeds to determine the break or lack of break. Shoot the crosses at different speeds to see if you might set a weight in the corner or hide behind a weight. Practice the lag on all shots -- rails, crosses, center shots, spread shots, and free hand -- because you never know where the best lag might be. Remember, though, if shooting at a weight on a strange board, shoot harder than normal to insure clearing it.
