

The Hammer

Coming fresh off a major tournament seems like a good time to approach a sensitive subject: charging a registration fee.

There are still some players, we've discovered, who think that those 10 (or whatever number) boards magically appear from beneath the floor of a tournament site, ready for them to display their skills upon. The truth is that there is a tremendous amount of expense and back-breaking effort to set them up and tear them down again.



Many hours of hard labor are involved in setting boards up and tearing them down again.

There are also those who think that very proficient tournament directors who spend vacation time and money to run a smooth event should do so as a contribution to the sport. Let's get realistic!

Who, in our circle of shuffleboard supporters, can afford to contribute hundreds of dollars in expenses to assure than an event offers others the opportunity for enjoyment, recognition and compensation for the expenses involved in their participation? Very few, including us.

We've been proponents of taking something off the top of sponsor sales to cover expenses. However, after our recent tourney, we discovered we'd to take at least 6 percent to beat the initial \$10 registration fee that came nowhere near meeting those expenses.

The Pacific Coast Shuffleboard Association is considering raising their registration fee to \$15. We support that action. We know they're not going to realize any profit from that increase, but only come closer to meeting expenses. Support groups like the P.C.S.A. and The Shuffleboard Federation -and The Board Talk -- should not have to absorb costs involved in staging events that give players an opportunity to win back their investment.

It's time we accept the difference between tavern events and those in a hotel setting where entire families can be in-(continued on page 4)

Ted Z's annual 4th of July tounament attracted 13 teams and 21 singles to the Best Little Wherehouse in Temecula, California.



You have taken a giant step forward, Ralph, in revitalizing shuffleboard in your area simply by telling us what's going on there. (See Tourney Talk.) It's people like you and Jerry who will assure that the sport will thrive. Don't get discouraged. The road to a healthy future is taken one step at a time, and we need people like you.

"Ask the Pro" is no different. Author Phil McGrew gets no compensation for his efforts other than response. When he reads that you miss the column, he's likely to increase his efforts to "nag" the pros for their contributions.

It's a sad situation that our world has to contend with in regard to your efforts to stay "dry." We are usually in an environment that encourages it and that makes it tough for people like you. It might help you to know that you're not alone, and that distributors have responded to that need by making available non-alcholic alternative beverages. Ask your shuffleboard tournament sponsors about the availability of these beverages. Nothing helps like support from somebody who has already been there. If you call us, we'll supply you with names and phone numbers of players who might be helpful. In the meantime, we'll provide your number to those who would like to reach out and help you. They'll help you accept the fact that shuffleboard and drinking aren't necessarily synonymous.

Ed Shares Some Concerns

I have been playing this game for 46 years and I know how important The Board Talk is for the continued growth of shuffleboard. However, I feel you must surely present divergent opinions. I respect your right of editorial license, but there are ideas that conflict with yours and The Shuffleboard Federation's, and I personally feel your newsletter should address these issues.

Number one, I certainly liked having the annual Board Talk tournament in such close proximity to the East Coast and my home. But I feel that you should open your mind to the location that the majority of your readers would choose through an annual vote conducted by you. I feel that this would be fair to all.

No. two: The Federation and you feel that the amateur player is the future of shuffleboard. I fully agree with this viewpoint because if we don't have new talent being encouraged, the game will surely die. But, again, I feel as did Budy Broka who I respect very much, that all boards set up for a tournament, be it a major or local tournament, be as straight as humanly possible. The pros and advanced players can handle almost all conditions. The amateur or novice player cannot. I feel that in order to encourage a greater arena of participation, all conditions should be geared to the novice player.

I, personally, have travelled great distances to participate in tournaments and would not enter -- not because I couldn't win there because I did win round robins and other money games there. I just feel that if the owner is ignorant enough not to keep his boards in tip-top shape, I will not honor his personal ignorance.

In some of the major tournaments I have attended, I have seen approximately 10 to 12 people adjusting boards to suit themselves. I do not feel this is fair if your aim is to attract as many amateurs as you can. The fairer the conditions, the less you will discourage the amateur player and consequently increase your amateur base.

Ed Galke, Oakdale, New York

Thank you, Ed, for bringing up a number of issues that will stimulate reader interest.

First of all, it gives us the opportunity to say that we do welcome divergent viewpoints, with this stipulation which was spelled out in our June issue: "We print all letters which will further the future of our sport. The only ones we do not print are those which directly attack a person, association, or product, and which we feel will not be beneficial to shuffleboard." Early on in our venture, we allowed our pages to become the battleground for some league in-fighting and learned a painful lesson. If we had allowed it to continue, it would have gone on for months with no real purpose served.

In response to your No. 1 issue -- holding the 7th Annual Shufflers Reunion on the East Coast: you suggest we hold an annual vote. During our first four tournaments, we offered the opportunity to hold the following year's tournament at any location the participants would like. We had no offers. Consequently, we took that decision into our own hands. We strongly believe our decision to have the tournament on the East Coast was a good one. And we may return there again next year. Our report in Tourney Talk will tell you why.

Second, you give the impression that The Board Talk and The Shuffleboard Federation are a single entity. This is wrong. We are two separate parts of The World of Shuffleboard who work together for the betterment of our sport. We've said it before and we're probably going to have to say (continued on page 4)

it many times again: the double-page spread in each issue of The Board Talk is purchased by The Shuffleboard Federation. That is their paid-for space in which they can deliver any message they wish. There are many issues on which we agree with them, such as commitment to the amateurs. This agreement is not dictated by monetary considerations; it is because we both happen to agree on this particular topic. Their advertising support is important to us, but it in no way obligates us to agree with them on every subject. It's a business agreement with mutual respect on both sides.

Third, on the subject of boards being set up as straight as possible: if you go to a local tourney, you must play on boards as they exist. Bar owners and home board players do not allow their board(s) to be wrenched upon. As for a major tourney, where boards are brought in, setting up 10 to 16 boards in time to start the tournament is a feat in itself. We have no quarrel with the boards being as straight as possible; however, there are many factors to contend with:

- 1. The time element;
- 2. The finish on the boards;
- 3. The carpeting the boards are installed on (boards have a tendency to settle after a few days);
- 4. Weather conditions (heat, humidity, etc.);
- 5. Powdered wax and/or silicone spray may be defective.

Don't sell the amateur and novice short, Ed. They've probably played on boards more crooked than they will find at a major tourney. Their biggest enemy is probably the speed of the boards and we have no control over that. Our procedure on all installed boards is to clean them, silicone them and wax them.

We're not aware of so many people (10 to 12) you've seen adjusting boards. In the major tournaments we've been involved in, we can't find that many people to help set them up. Two designated persons for final adjustments is the procedure and believe it, Ed, when they're through with that many boards, adjusting them to suit themselves isn't even on their minds. Getting them as playable as possible is.

volved. Events held in taverns -- and these are vitally important to the growth of our sport -- benefit the owner/operator because of increased sales. Others, like us, who choose a hotel setting to hold our tournaments, do not have that option; hence, the registration fee.

Both are vital components of The World of Shuffleboard. Let's support them both.


