The Red Check -- What Does It Mean? First, a very sincere thanks to those of you who respond to your first red check, that signal that appears on Page 2 if your subscription has expired. That prompt response not only helps the financial viability of your newsletter, it also saves us record-keeping time. Because we hate losing any precious subscriber, we allow three red checks before removing the name from the mailing list and that does take time.

"My records show I renewed in May 1990, but I got a red check in my March 1991 issue. Why?" You renewed last May, but your subscription expired in March of 1990. Your April and May issues were mailed to you during that "grace" period. March will continue to be your "anniversary date" as long as you stay on The Board Talk mailing list.

"Why don't you send expiration notices instead of redchecking? You'd probably get better response." Yes, we're sure we would and someday we're going to do that. For now -and for about four more years -- the red check method will continue. The Board Talk staff consists of part-timers George and Donna, a telephone that takes messages while they're at work, and two grandsons who help once a month at mailing time. It's not likely that staff will increase until we retire and can devote full-time to The Board Talk.

Who Pays -- and Who Doesn't? Our advertising rates appear every month along with an order blank to let us know if you want a quarter-page, half- page, full-page, flyer, or Directory space to advertise your upcoming tournament, products or services. We depend very heavily upon the people who support us with this advertising revenue support. There are lots of months that we could not publish, without subsidization from our full-time jobs, if we had to depend solely upon subscription revenue. We were hit hard with the latest postal increase so subscription fees fall way short of covering costs.

That does not mean we shut anyone out who does not advertise from promoting their tournament and the results of that tournament in Tourney Talk at no cost. Without that news, we wouldn't have any reason to publish a newsletter. The same goes for letters we receive for Shufflers' Notebook and other features. As much as we appreciate and depend upon advertising revenue, we try not to discriminate against any establishments that opt not to advertise. We hope that those that do spread the word that "advertising does pay" in The Board Talk, and we hope subscribers show their appreciation, through participation, to those who do advertise. (Please read Joanie Swenson's letter in Notebook.)

If I write a letter to The Board Talk, will it be printed? We print all letters which will further the future of our sport. The only ones we do not print are those which directly attack a person, association, or product, and which we feel will not be beneficial to shuffleboard. Single board establishments abound in South Jersey and though tourney entries are held to eight teams, a new local circuit is beginning to take shape (the Jersey Devil Tour?). The first event was a singles shootout held March 3 at the Rarebird Saloon in beautiful downtown Blue Anchor. First place went to Butch "Hollywood" Kelly of Ridley Park, Pa., a veteran of Dick Gorman's Triple Crown circuit. Second place was taken by Rarebird shooter Skip Sink, with third going to Rarebird owner Grover Kauffman.

A doubles tourney held at the Rarebird on April 7 showed that Butch Kelly is no fluke in Jersey, when "Hollywood" teamed with his partner Joe Williams to once again take first place money. After cruising through the winner's bracket, "Hollywood" and Joe were pressed by the team of Grover Kauffman and Chuck Fiedler, who came from the loser's bracket to scare the winning team with a 15-4 win in the first game for the title. A doubles match is scheduled for April 14 at the Somerdale Bar on the White Horse Pike in Somerdale. Amateurs to Get \$5,000 in Reno

As we mentioned in our column in the May issue of The Board Talk, our main interest is in developing the pros of the future -- the amateurs and semipros of today.

Since incorporating in 1987, we have always asked people to judge The Shuffleboard Federation, Inc. by our acts and deeds. We are now applying those same standards to the pro players, and making our business decisions accordingly. The result is more money for amateur shuffleboard.

If you are not aware of how the \$7000 - \$14,000 in added money for the 1991 NORTH AMERICAN SHUFFLEBOARD CHAMPIONSHIPS works, please see the enclosed flyer.

Originally, the amateurs and pros were both getting \$2,500 to start with a chance to double that if the N.A.S.L. Team Event sells out. Based on their actions (or lack of action, as the case may be), the \$2,500 that was going to be added to the pro singles has been moved to the Team Event, for a total of \$5,000 in guaranteed added money.

If the Team Event does sell out (32 teams), we will add \$2,500 to the pros, but the amateurs will be the big winners on this one; for them a sell-out means \$7,500 of guaranteed added for the N.A.S.L. Team Event.

The Semi-Pro Singles and Doubles and Ladies' Singles will feature \$500 to \$1,000 in added money; again the amount is determined by the number of amateur teams.

Before going to the new format for the pro singles events, we approached a number of the pros to get their input and to find out whether they liked it and if they would support it. We got commitments from 10 players who said they would attend all four of this year's events. If we had not gotten those commitments, we would not have used that format (\$500 entry fee, a 16-player field -- which means no byes -- and playing on only four boards; less boards to learn gives them a chance to really display their skills).

But you know the saying about talk is cheap. When it came time to send in their entries for the first tournament, we found that, on the whole, their word means nothing. The result of these broken promises was a canceled pro event, and a lot of disappointed amaturs who sent in their money for the Pro- Am Draw months in advance.

The amateur players who were entered in the Pro-Am were invited to participate in a free instructional session conducted by Bobby Voorhis and John McDermott.

This is not to say that there are not some good people amongst the pros. A few of them (they know who they are) have supported us and always done their part in terms of giving back to the game and helping it to grow. But sadly, most of the pros are takers who are only interested in a free ride, and those days are over. Some of their comments have been to the effect that they resent being told they have to play in the Pro-Am and participate in the instructionals. Some of them even think they should be paid for their services.

By the time you read this, the pro events for the rest of the year may already be cancelled. The word is out that if we do not have at least 12 paid pro entries for The Board Talk Tournament by June 1, the pro events will be cancelled. If that happens, we may drop them completely so that we can continue to invest more of our time and money to our top priority -- the average shuffleboard player.

If "average" describes your playing ability, we are especially interested in what you think and in knowing what we can do to support you. If there are any types of events you would like to see us add to the tournaments, we would very much appreciate it if you would drop us a short letter and share your thoughts with us.

This is something we have asked the pros to do in the past and have gotten virtually no response. Do yourselves a favor and do not follow their example on this. We want to do a good job for you and make the game fun and we cannot do it without your input.
