



Tie A Yellow Ribbon 'Round Our Hearts

The terrorist whose actions had taken beloved family members and friends from us and placed them in a desert far from home certainly didn't single out the PCSA's Shuffleboard Extravaganza III as one of his major targets. But his presence was felt in the big ballroom on the second floor of the Showboat in Las Vegas, Nevada, on Jan. 29-Feb. 2. Even this make-believe tinsel town, the ideal escape from the

real world, wasn't immune from the fear that Saddam Hussein had struck in the hearts of those who had come to take their freedoms for granted.

It seemed unreal to us that our grandsons (who could be called to serve in that desert if this war lasts as long as the Vietnam conflict) would beg us not to board the plane that would take us to an event that we'd been looking forward to since Extravaganza II. Hussein's threats of terrorist activity in the U.S., particularly airports, had not gone unheeded by the two young men who mean more to us than life itself. We ourselves had some second thoughts about flying, as did others.

But would succumbing to the fear that Hussein hoped would immobilize America have sent the right message to our grandsons? We didn't think so. We went, we enjoyed, we came back home thankful we hadn't missed the opportunity to enjoy the comradarie of shufflers throughout the U.S.A. and Canada.

On the front page of our local newspaper recently was this article: "Employees of Disneyland are being told not to display yellow ribbons lest the reminder of war spoil patrons' fun. Disneyland workers and employees at Knott's Berry Farm in California were told not to wear yellow ribbons, flags or anything that would remind patrons of the war. Knott's later decided to issue yellow ribbons to employees who wanted them. 'We're a place where people go to escape the real world, "Knott's spokesman Stuart Zanville said. 'It's a very difficult and emotional issue.'"

Without question, Las Vegas is a place where people go to escape the real world, and its economy is suffering because some people are being intimidated by Hussein's threats of terrorism. But that didn't stop the people there, or the airlines that took us there and back home again, from proudly display-

Casula/McDaniel Winners at Lafayette Inn



P.C.S.A. Shuffleboard Extravaganza III

P.C.S.A. Shuffleboard Extravaganza III is now a part of shuffleboard history. Those of you who met or traded with Jim won't meet a nicer, more generous gentleman than this man.

They came from Ohio, Nevada, Texas and Oklahoma. They came by ones, by twos, by eights, and in droves. 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
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

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

Ask the Pros

Question: Do you believe it is important for a player to learn multiple grips and releases and why?

John McDermott: I believe it more than important to have a variety of grips and releases, it is essential. Basically, you need to try and take what the board will give you, and the more weapons you have, the easier the game will be.

Because no two boards are alike, there are certain types of releases or span shots that will make some shots easy that are tough to hit and virtually impossible to stick shooting off the rails.

An example of this would be shooting rail shots on a high centered board. Rather than struggle trying to keep your weights from falling off the side, you may find that shooting the weight straight out using a small span shot makes the difference between a treacherous shot and one that is a natural stick.

Having a variety of releases also will allow you to hit weights sometimes that are blocked for rail and cross board shots.

Also, lagging with a span or free hand shot will allow you to deliver your weight in an area of the board that gets less traffic and is generally more consistent speed wise, resulting in more consistent lagging.



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Extravaganza III Makes Everyone a Winner in Vegas By George & Donna Wilber

We all know, some from painful experience, that not everyone comes home from Las Vegas as a winner. But we believe that everyone who came to Vegas for the PCSA's Extravaganza III at the Showboat on Jan. 29-Feb. 2 did go home a winner. Not to diminish, in any way, the dedicated efforts of the PCSA to stage yet another successful tournament (and we appreciate how much effort was invested) or the exciting play on the boards. It was watching the jubilation of the relative unknowns meeting and beating the "biggies." It was feeling good about the PCSA and The Shuffleboard Federation shared the podium as each passed out their awards.

To us personally, it was getting to know some of the names we publish in The Board Talk: Joanie Swenson of California, who thinks we ought to consider charging for Tourney Talk promotions of tournaments that don't buy advertising space if that's what is needed to stay in business; that "Crazy Irish" Joanie Millar of Canada, whose letters have given us so much enjoyment; Don "Mitch" Mitchell of Washington, who has a goal of getting his photo in The Board Talk, with or without his clothes on; Carolyn Jones of Oklahoma, who showed us why she went so high in the sponsor sale and will be a force to be reckoned with on the tournament trail, plus so many others who touched our lives and our hearts.

We'd like to share all of their stories and maybe someday will have the opportunity to do so. In the meantime, here are a

few we got to know, each of whom is playing a key role in making the sport of shuffleboard stronger, each in their own special way...

Bellfower Bruce: A Generous Gentleman

Take any ordinary shuffleboard tournament and add one ingredient -- Bellflower Bruce Hale -- and it becomes extraordinary. We'd heard the name, but it wasn't until March of 1988 that we got to meet him. It was at the 1st Great Arizona Open, staged at Dunes II in Phoenix, a shuffleboard bar like many of us play in for league action or open games. Compared to the PCSA Shuffleboard Extravaganza III in the huge ballroom at the Showboat in Las Vegas, it was an ordinary tournament -- until roses were delivered to every lady in the house -- courtesy of Bellflower Bruce.

Since then, we've recorded many instances of how the generosity of this one gentleman has turned the ordinary into the extraordinary. What's the motivation behind the gallant gestures of this modest, generous man? We tried to find out during the tournament that now featured the first Bellfower Bruce Mixed Doubles event.

Bruce first became acquainted with the game in 1957 when he was in Boston, Massachusetts, going to college and working, and dropping in occasionally at a bar where there was a shuffleboard. He was "mildly interested" and when he returned to California in 1959, he found there were others in Long Beach and Bellflower who shared that interest.

One night in 1964, he challenged the board and was told by his intimidating opponent that his name was "Long Beach Jerry," to which Bruce responded, "Well, I'm Bellflower Bruce." Hence, his shuffleboard name was born and the two opponents became best friends.


For the past 23 years, Bruce has operated his Newport Plastics Company which specializes in molded plastic products including shuffleboard caps (you can order them in your own color and design). He's a very successful businessman and he shares the fruits of his labors to make shuffleboard a sport that will grow in the years to come.

"I love the game and the people who play it," says Bruce.
"I've never met a player I haven't liked, as long as he (or she)
doesn't beat me too badly. It's a game of skill, but most of all,
it's a sport of comradarie. They are such great people, always
ready to help one another. Today, it's like a national fraternity."

Bruce thinks the major changes he's seen over the years are the level of competition and the quality of the game. The change from 21 to 15 points was a major breakthrough, he believes, but the one big change for the sport, he generously points out, is The Board Talk.

"Without The Board Talk -- and I want you to print this -- this game would have died. We wouldn't be holding this tournament with its great participation without the efforts of George and Donna," he said.

What of the future? Bruce fully supports the neighborhood bars like the ones where he started and the leagues that keep bringing new blood into the game, but he strongly believes that major tournaments, such as those the PCSA and The Shuffleboard Federation stage, must be held in hotels and resorts that provide family entertainment. Places that have easy access to attractions for members of the family who don't play will keep shuffleboard a family affair, he maintains.




Bellflower Bruce presents a generous check to Lisa Taylor to add to the pot for the mixed doubles event at the PCSA's Extravaganza III.

Bruce was pleased when the PCSA and The Shuffleboard Federation shared the podium to hand out plaques and money envelopes for Extravaganza III and The Federation's top players of 1990. "It's going to take all of us working together toward a common goal to ensure the future of the sport we all love," he said.

Bruce didn't collect any of the PCSA Extravanganza III trophies, nor did he hop up to the podium to accept the money envelopes for The Federation's top players of the year. But there was no person in that huge audience who could say to themselves with more sincerity: "This sport will be better tomorrow because I gave more to it than I took from it." Bruce, of course, wouldn't think of saying that. He's much too modest. So, on behalf of the hundreds of people in The World of Shuffleboard who have been touched in some way by his generosity, we'll say it for him.

Glenn Lindberg: A Believer in TLC of the Boards

The Club Tavern in Springfield, Oregon, is billed as "A Friendly Place," and once you've met owner Glenn Lindberg, it's easy to see why it is. He was there to watch the action at Extravaganza III while his wife, Lisa, stayed home to carry on the business. You could tell he would have liked to have her there at the Showboat with him.

Glenn retired as plant manager for the Pepsi Company after 35 years of service. When he and Lisa bought the Club Tavern, it was a long, narrow facility, hardly the site for a shuffleboard center of action. When a second-hand store next

door became available, they purchased it and after a lot of hard work (and some surprises at what they discovered in the renovation of the old building), the Club Tavern expanded to a 3,000 square foot facility with room for three shuffleboards.

Glenn is a great believer in the value of tender, loving care for his boards. He sees them as valuable pieces of furniture that should be treated accordingly. Each night, the boards are wiped down and covered. Few board owners cover their boards anymore, but Glenn says you have only to see the residue on the covers from the smoke and grease that all establishments have, to know just what "naked" boards suffer. Each morning, he uncovers and dresses them for the day's play.

Having seen the neglect and abuse that some boards receive -- never cleaned, never dressed, allowed to be used as a place to put unfinished drinks, empty beer cases, and dropping ashes from a shuffler's cigarette -- we have gained a very high regard for board owners who give the kind of care that Glenn does. It's those who don't who wonder why their board doesn't get any play.

The Club Tavern not only features its three fine boards, it also has what Glenn calls a "modest" food menu. But he admits that Lisa's hamburgers are anything but modest! Her philosophy: "Our customers are more than dollar signs to us; they're human beings," and Glenn agrees.


The Lindberg's tavern is one of several within a hundred mile radius of Springfield that are part of a travelling tournament circuit, each enjoying and supporting the events of the other.

Glenn and Lisa and others like them are an important component in the "secret" formula to make shuffleboard grow. We look forward to visiting The Club Tavern some time in the future and getting to know them better.

The Quigleys: Investing in the Future

It's not as though Roxie and Rick Quigley don't have enough to do with their time. They're a nice young couple with children and job responsibilities and are already involved in other sports. So why should they worry about shuffleboard?

Like a lot of us, they're "hooked" on shuffleboard. But they want to do more than just participate. They want the sport to grow and recognize that to realize that goal, "new blood" is required. And they know that the new blood can only come through a healthy league.

There are countless boards in Vegas, yet attempts to form an active league have been less than successful. The reason has been that all the strong players have gravitated to the same teams, discouraging those with less ability. With no chance for the top spot, or even a chance to compete for it, it's easy to get discouraged and opt for sports where the odds are more even.

The Quigleys were looking for some kind of "parity" system they could introduce that would attract and maintain par-


ticipation in league play. They asked us how our league operated and we hope the information we shared with them about the handicap system will help.




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
