





"FRIENDSHIP THROUGH COMPETITION"

About Those Pros

As final preparations for the 1991 NORTH AMERICAN SHUFFLEBOARD CHAMPIONSHIPS take place, we would like to comment on the cancellation of the pro events at this and other tournaments, as well as the probability that there will be none in 1992.

This should be one of the brightest moments in the history of this game for the pro players. At the beginning of the year, letters of invitation to participate in our 1991 pro events were sent to more than 30 players. We did not mince any words in this letter, feeling that the best way to approach these people was to tell them exactly how we felt, what kind of opportunities were available for them, and what we expected them to do for the game in return.

With a percentage of the purse for each of the first three Grand Slam pro events going into the entry money for the pro singles in Reno, the \$2,500 which was going to be added by the tournament sponsor, the Sands Regency Hotel & Casino, and the opportunity to get another \$2,500 from the hotel based on attendance, the pro singles could have had more than \$10,000 in added money.

Now we are hearing that the entry fee for the pro events was too high. Many of the pros were asked last year what they thought about having less tournaments and raising the entry fee. It was because of their positive response to this idea that we went with that plan to begin with.

Keep in mind that in 1984, a singles tournament with an entry fee of \$800 per player was run in Las Vegas by Billy Mays. All 32 spots in the tournament were sold out in advance and there was a waiting list of people hoping someone would drop out so we are not sure that the entry fee is what held people back.

In fact, there were players who complained about having a limit of 16 players for the pro singles in Reno and thought that we should open up the tournament to anyone who wanted to play. We responded to that concern in a letter dated August 10, 1991, stating that if we had 16 players signed up by registration deadline, we would consider opening it up.

When the registration deadline arrived, we had deposits from Bobby Voorhis, Bill Melton, Sam Summers, Eric Waldman, David Williams, and John McDermott, a total of only six players.

Some of the pros have told us that they resent having to help us conduct instructional clinics and play in pro am events so that we can develop the amateur players. The justification for this line of thinking was that they came up the hard way and the present day novices should have to do the same. The only problem with that line of thinking is that coming up the hard way has only produced about 30 pro players in the last 25 years.

Some of the pros were pouting because of the tone of the letter of invitation. Our answer to this is that we have been trying to get through to these players for the last four years.

During that time, they had our undivided attention, both in terms of time and dollars.

We seemed to have very little success in communicating with them and in establishing a cooperative working relationship. When we sent the information about this year's events, we wanted to make sure they understood exactly how things were going to be done.

When the pro players go to a tournament, it is business. Every one of them is there to make money. If they suggest otherwise, don't believe it.

Well, as we have been telling people right from the beginning, this is a business for us. Because of the fact that others have tried to promote the game before us -- collecting money without delivering what the players were supposed to get in return -- we made a commitment to deliver first and charge later.

We promoted more than 20 tournaments in 1987, 1988, and 1989 without charging the players a dime for our services. The only money collected, which was a percentage of entry and auction money, went into the point standings pot and to pay the tournament officials.

We have proved through our acts and deeds our honorable intentions to promote the growth of our sport. The attendance at the 1991 Grand Slam events proves that we are on the right track. As more people are exposed to our handicap system and our statistical information continues to grow, the N.A.S.L. team events are going to grow to a level never seen before in this game.

Our sponsor for the 1991 Grand Slam, Dynamo Corporation, which has a worldwide distribution network for their other coin-operated games, is going to introduce shuffleboard to many new people and places. This is another important step in achieving international popularity for our sport. This was a goal of ours from day one and continues to be.

Whether the existing pros share in what we are doing is up to them. In Glen Davidson's letter in the October 1991 issue of The Board Talk, he states that, "As everyone knows, the push is on to rid the game of the pro ranks." That is a ridiculous suggestion which we find offensive. The pro players are responsible for their current situation and, if that situation is to improve, they will be responsible for that as well

The two founders of The Shuffleboard Federation, Inc., Phil Skover and John McDermott, have an obvious personal interest in seeing a successful pro circuit, but business comes before pleasure.

When we started the pro tour, many top local players entered the tournaments to see how they would measure up against the top players in the world. As they found out, there is a big gap between the group at the top and the rest of the shuffleboard community. In time, fewer players were willing to continue to compete in these events.

The semi pros and amateurs have not destroyed the pros; they are the saviors of the sport in terms of us being able to continue to promote major tournaments in the fashion we have for the last five years.

Now that the only players who are going to be involved in pro events are world beaters, and there are no longer 10-12 players in the field that all of the pros know they can beat, it seems that many of the pros no longer want to play.

We would love to have successful pro events as part of our 1992 schedule. Therefore, we challenge the pros to communicate with each other, put their politics to the side, and tell us what kind of events, at what entry fees, that you will support. If there is no organized response to this request, then it will be clear to everyone who it was that rid the game of the pro ranks.
