The Hammer

Everybody knows about the federal budget deficit and the numerous ways Congress has decided to solve that problem (which we all want solved because it impacts our children and their children). One of the ways, they've decided in their infinite wisdom, is to raise (dramatically) the rate of postage for people like us who depend upon the mail for their existence. Despite the wallop we received in February, we've resisted passing along that added business expense by raising our subscription and advertising rates. However, that postage increase (and the one they're planning for the near future) means we must come up with some creative alternatives if we are to continue running a viable business.

The first adjustment we're going to make is this: Ordinarilly, we grant subscribers a 3-month "grace period," assuming that they will extend their subscription eventually. Not so in too many cases. Consequently, we send the delinquent subscribers 3 months worth of The Board Talk at no cost, only to have them drop their subscriptions. That might not seem like a lot, but when you multiply it by the number of subscribers, it adds up to a sizeable chunk of change. Henceforth, the "red check" on page 2 will mean that your subscription has expired and you won't get another issue until you've paid. Once we retire, we will send individual reminder letters, but until then, we'll use this procedure.

Second, we get many requests every month to send the last issue to a new subcriber (usually because their name is in it). We've done that gladly but it does cost us about 75 percent more than our regular bulk rate to do so. From now on, if a subscription is received after the 15th of the month, we will either make their subscription effective with the next mailing or charge \$1 for mailing a previous issue.

Third, we're going to pare down our complimentary mailing list. When we first started publishing, there was good reason for that list. That reason no longer exists and those who are on that list will be receiving a "red check."

For us, the role of being the "good guys" is really more comfortable, but not economically feasible. We'd like to be here for a long time yet to serve as the voice of shuffleboard and that sometimes necessitates being tough. We hope you understand and support our actions.

Dew Drop Inn Tourney Draws Big Field of Contenders

The Dew Drop Inn, Waterloo, New York, hosted its largest national tournament yet as over 80 players from six states came to the beautiful Finger Lakes Region in upstate New York on June 14-16 to shoot for over \$7,000 in prize money and other awards. Pabst Blue Ribbon sponsored this three-day event and provided jackets plus trophies for all winners.

The open singles on Friday was a sellout with Steve Bennett, Sherburne, New York, taking home the major cash, a jacket and trophy. Another good portion of the \$2,000 pot was taken by second place finisher Dick Losee of Poolville, N.Y. Marv Smith from Hackettstown, New Jersey, earned third place, and cashing in fourth spot was Dave Fridley, Romulus, N.Y.



Saturday morning brought nine "shufflerettes" taking aim at the top prizes in the ladies' singles. Mary Wagner from Delaware came out of the loser's bracket to avenge her only loss and win this event. Mary won over half of the \$800 prize money plus a trophy and jacket. "It was a pleasure having Mary come to shoot in our tournament," said host Doug Fridley Jr. Turned back to second spot after shooting tough all day long was local Waterloo player, Theresa Gibson. Winning third place was Barb Kuehl from Wolcott, N.Y., a lady who hasn't been playing all that long, but shows some real fine ability.

Saturday afternoon saw the draw partner event get underway with over 30 players vying for the near \$2,000 pot. It was the favorites, Don Perry from Cortland, N.Y., and Doug Fridley Jr. from Waterloo teaming up to go undefeated and take the first place prizes. Stealing the show, but not the trophy, was none other than Poncho Prevento from Perryville, Md. and his partner, the "ambassador of shuffleboard," Jimmy (the cop) Kumpula from Michigan and Florida. Earning third place was the surprise team of Marv Smith and Jane Johnson (best free-hand on the East Coast) from Jordan, N.Y.

Oh, how glad we are you asked, Jim! We call your attention to an accompanying article regarding the climb of Washington from near the bottom to near the top. Our Top Three featured on our indetia panel is the number of subscribers we have in each state -- not the number of shuffleboard establishments, even though they're counted in the totals.

We've visited many of the shuffleboard bars on our map because we appreciate so much their support. While there, we've witnessed the "freeloaders" who read the bar's Board Talk and make notes about upcoming tournaments they want to enter. They seem to think that's the extent of their responsibility to keep our sport a viable one. We have to remember that this sport died once and all shufflers have a responsibility to make sure it doesn't die again.

Very frankly, we couldn't exist with the 200 or so shuffleboard establishments that are on our map because only a small percentage of them advertise their tournaments. The \$15 subscription fee barely covers the mailing costs and then most of them share their Board Talk with everyone who plays



at their establishment. If each of those they share with would buy their own subscription, we'd be in good shape.

We'd like you and others on the map to help us solve this problem. A few years ago, we ran a promotion that gave people an opportunity to earn a new set of weights by signing up 25 new subscribers. What happened was that active shufflers who really wanted their own weights signed up all their non-playing relatives and friends, very few of whom renewed their subscriptions a year later. That was an exercise in futility for us.

What would it take as an incentive for shuffleboard establishments to sign up their players as Board Talk subscribers? A set of house weights? A full page ad? Free listing in the Directory? We don't know. Maybe you can give us some ideas.

In the meantime, thanks to you and other promoters who are using our publication to advertise your action.

She fell in love with the game and the players and will be at the upcoming Reno tournament. She's given up plans to go to Nova Scotia to be there, so please extend your hand of fellowship to her.

Speaking of the Reno tournament, we encourage you to take advantage of this breakthrough in shuffleboard. The big money added is a "first," and how you respond to this opportunity will determine whether we have another. We'll be there. Hope you will, too.





QUALIFIERS

Over the past few years, qualifiers to sponsor a player in an upcoming major tournament has become a popular idea. We fully support that type of promotion and in fact have made the suggestion to many bar owners that they consider running that type of event.

Recently, however, there have been some problems related to qualifiers -- bars running a qualifier for a ladies' singles at the U.S. Open when, in fact, there was no ladies' singles at that tournament. Other instances have occurred when a qualifier has been run for an event that is already full.

Because of these and other problems, we will no longer accept entries for any of our tournaments that are won through a qualifying tournament unless that qualifier is run through us.

We are currently finalizing plans for our 1992 schedule and will be contacting a number of taverns in different parts of the country to determine their interest in participating in qualifiers for those events. If you are interested in hosting a qualifier for one or more of our national events, please feel free to contact us.

DIVISION III EVENTS TO MAKE DEBUT IN 1992

As we mentioned in the July 1991 issue of The Board Talk, we are renaming the Pro and Semi Pro classes of competition to Division I and Division II, respectively, as well as adding a new class of competition -- Division III for the less experienced players.

All of the events on our 1992 schedule will include Division III singles and doubles events, which will be open to players that have an N.A.S.L. rating of 3, 4, or 5.

Based on the enthusiastic response to the Semi Pro (Division II) events on this year's Grand Slam National Tour, we expect the Division III events to fill up well in advance, so we recommend that you get your entries in early.

TOURNAMENT REGISTRATION FORMS

Because of the wide assortment of errors and inaccuracies, which are too numerous to mention, that have become commonplace on the registration forms for our tournaments, we find it necessary to change the way we process these registrations.

We will not hold a spot in the tournament for anyone who does not turn in a properly filled out registration form and, effective immediately, any form that is not filled out completely and correctly will be returned, along with the check, to the person who sent it.

This means that the membership and registration fees must be included and you must mark the events you are entering because we are not mind readers.

If you have any questions on how to fill out your registration form, please contact us before you send it in and we will be happy to assist you.

PRO-AM AND SEMI-PRO DRAWS

Although we have mentioned this in previous issues of The Board Talk, there still seems to be some confusion over the eligibility for these events.

The only players who may play in the Pro-Am Draw Partner events are Division III players (those players with an N.A.S.L. of 3, 4, or 5). Players with a rating of 1 or 2 (Division II) may play in the Semi-Pro Draw Partners. No one may play in both of these events.




