

Davis/Macurdy/Ostrom Champs at Jerry D's



A.Z.'s Thoughts on Profit and Other Things

(Editor's Note: Because A.Z.'s letter contains a number of topics, we'll insert George's responses after each.)

I enjoy your editorial, "The Hammer."

I certainly do agree with you on profit. I have furnished shuffleboards for tournaments and never received a word of thanks, for the most part. It's no problem to drive 50 or 500 miles to furnish and set up a board for a tournament. I carry my boards in little tubes in my pocket. When I get to the tournament location, I just squeeze a tube and the board magically appears -- set up, leveled, and ready to play.

The first thing a consumer does is try to beat you down on your price -- refinish, supplies, service calls, etc. We're sup-

posed to do this for free because we love the game of shuffleboard. It's very discouraging when some members of the shuffleboard circle know of boards for sale, and either buy them for themselves and sell them to me for a profit; or, knowing where a board is for sale, not inform me, and then make a profit by selling that board to another location. I cannot stay in business and render services to shuffleboard under these nonprofitable circumstances.

George: Hey, A.Z., let's team up. With your non-profit business plus mine, it should work out great, assuming misery loves company. We can then be miserable together. I've been there, A.Z., and aware of every situation you describe. I don't know about you, but I don't have a large enough market to make much of a living on supplies, especially with everyone reclycling their powdered wax (maybe we can't blame them), which all vendors encourage because they furnish the wax for the boards they have in bars. Oh, and I've got a contact in Washington, D.C. Let's get a patent on those tubes!



A.Z. Turnbo may provide some laughs at tournaments, but he also has some serious concerns about what Doc Khan calls "Sweat Equity" and other factors that impact the future of shuffleboard.

Another serious thing that contributed to the demise of shuffleboard in decades past is still going on today. Pick up any Board Talk and see who's winning the tournaments. While two to four people take top honors in small tournaments and 70 percent to 80 percent of the money are the superplus players. If there are two or four of them at a small tournament, they team up and take the top money, while the lesser players are being used to contribute the money. I believe we need to broaden our handicap ratings and classifications. I believe there is a group of players that should be classified as "plus" handicap players. All these plus handicap players had a chance to play each other in Reno, but 90 percent didn't show or put their money in. They would rather team up at small tournaments with a guaranteed win than chance their own money by playing people of their own calibre.

My idea of rating is this, however it comes about, with cooperation of all the associations to rate pro-players in three categories. The average pro player with a zero handicap, and the top super guns have a plus one handicap. The lesser pros should have a -1. The smaller tournaments could use this to even out the competition and make it fairer for the lesser player, who is furnishing the lion's share of the money. (1) +1 play -1; .0 could play 0. Of course, any of these players could play down hill. It's possible that this could improve the calcutta sales in the small tournaments because you would have

more than one or two teams that stood a better chance of winning. This would give sponsors more incentive to bid on more teams.

George: This is what we've done, A.Z., to combat that problem. In September of 1991, we ran a tournament and lumped all the semi-pros together (there were no pros) and they drew the lesser-skilled players as partners. There was very little griping and the results were very satisfying because two players won who had never won a tournament before. Boy, were they happy! In March, we're running a handicap tournament, but we've got it set up a little different than you suggest. The pros are a -1, the semi-pros are 0, and the rest of the field will range as high as a + 3. While there will probably be very few +3s, if a pro plays one, they will give a 4 point spot, which will be rung up on the scoring machine when the game starts. The pro's and semi-pro's complaint is: we're the ones who account for the auction pot money being high, which is true. To ensure that a player or team doesn't get in for a little of nothing, our rule is that they must buy themselves for no less than the entry fee to be eligible for the auction dollars.

I believe shuffleboard needs a standard on weights. Weight, diameter, height of metal, and height of contact. Size of tops not to exceed the diameter of the very top of the weight. I believe American weights should be standard. They have been around the longest and the most played.


George: I wasn't aware we were having a problem with weights in regard to size and weight. I've checked the height, circumference, and weight of four different manufacturer's weights and found only one to be slightly different than the others. I don't have the proper instruments for close tolerance, but it appears to be about 1/64th inch higher and about 1/64th inch bigger in circumference and one ounce heavier, which doesn't seem severe. You have to allow for a tolerance, but I think a study committee should be appointed to decide on it and inform all manufacturers what it should be.

Shuffleboard took a progressive and needed step forward when it allowed the use of individually-owned weights. It took several steps backwards when it made rules that penalize the players for owning their own weights. The players must furnish eight weights -- four for you, and four for your opponent, if they want them. You can't change tops. Red and blue. All of us know it is a sizeable investment to have your own weights. You may have to have two or three sets to get four somewhere near the speed you want. There can be up to 5 feet difference in speed in the same set. After sizeable investment in weights, and hours and hours of speeding the weights out of two or three sets, and I have to furnish them to my opponent and they bang the bottoms together and nick my weights! One step backward.

George: In regard to the stand you take on the opponent not using your personal weights, I strongly disagree with you, A.Z. However, I might be in a minority. Apparently, we've created a monster and the only way to solve it may be to have everyone use the house weights until we come up with a popular solution. How do we know someone hasn't discovered a special dressing to put on their weights to complement board conditions? My point is, if an opponent is allowed to use your weights, then you would have to doctor them all because you wouldn't know what color you'd be throwing. It may be a far-fetched example, but there's more hanky-panky going on than a lot of us realize.


When you flip for the hammer and your opponent wins the hammer or choice of color, they can choose what color of your weights they want to shoot. You have lost control of

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Aiming to Please

Since we began promoting major tournaments, we have asked on a regular basis for written input from tournament participants so that we could do the best job possible and promote the type of events that players would enjoy.

It was very frustrating for us when we were receiving this input at the rate of about one letter per year. This is not to say that we were not getting verbal opinions and feedback while at the events.

While we often heard good ideas, they were just often forgotten by the time we got back to the office. There are just too many other things going on at the tournament for this method to be effective.

We are happy to report that there was a big change for the better in this regard over the past year and written suggestions have increased significantly.

The most common suggestion was that we should make the semi pro (Division I) events two out of three, double elimination as opposed to single game, double elimination.

We would like to satisfy our participants on this request, but there are some pretty tough obstacles we have to overcome. Our continued involvement in promoting major tournaments would not be possible without successful N.A.S.L.TM Team Events.

We do not think that these team events can be successful at this point in time unless the better players can play in them. In order for these better players to be eligible, the singles and doubles events they play in must be over by the time the team event starts.

Starting singles and doubles for the Division I players on Tuesday would allow us to be done with those events prior to the start of the N.A.S.L.TM Team Event, but we would have to start setting up on a Saturday in order for the boards to be properly polished, leveled and adjusted. This would simply be too expensive for us and we are not sure that there are enough players who could come that early anyway.

We have an idea which we think will allow us to go to the two out of three format without adding any additional days to the tournament and whether or not we incorporate it, will depend on the feedback we receive from those people who support our tournaments.

We are considering going to two out of three, double elimination, but playing 11 point games instead of 15. In order to eliminate any confusion, both players/teams would ring 4 points to start the game and then play to 15 as opposed to starting at 0 and playing to 11.

Using this format would allow the singles and doubles to be one day events so players could still compete in the team competition and not have to spend any extra days at the tournament.

We have no preference one way or the other on this, our only goal is to do the best job for the participants. We hope that you will respond by sending us a brief letter telling us how you feel about this issue as well as any other comments or suggestions on how we can continue to improve the quality of our events.

Thanks in advance for your help.

West Coast Classic Postponed

We regret to inform everyone who was looking forward to Southern California for the West Coast Classic, that due to some schedule and technical problems with the Bicycle Club which was to host this event, that we have had to postpone this tournament.

The Bicycle Club would still like to host a shuffleboard tournament this year and negotiations are under way to reschedule this event for a later date.

As we suffer through the worst winter storms in more than a decade, we are disappointed that a vacation/tournament in California next month will not happen for us snow bound northerners.

We were, however, not confident that we would promote this event in the fashion we think it deserves or provide the California players with the type of exciting, high quality event that they are accustomed to when Greg McFarland and Joan Swenson are involved.

Let's be Charitable

It makes us feel good just making this announcement and we hope that all of you who attend our tournaments this year will feel as strongly about this as we do. Beginning with the Michigan Open, we will be raising money at each of our 1992 Grand Slam Tournaments for the National Committee for the Prevention of Child Abuse (NCPCA).

This very worthy organization is active in all fifty states and although we will be coordinating these efforts with the National Committee, the money raised at each tournament will stay in that state. Details will be forthcoming in future issues of *The Board Talk*.

your weights. One step backward. When you flip for the hammer or choice of color and shoot your choice of color, they have the right or privilege of shooting your opposite color and changing the color the next game. One step backward.

I would like to see some serious thought given by the rules committees of all the shuffleboard associations on the follow-

ing suggestions:

(1) No double release shots. It should read "no excessive spin weights delivered in any manner."

George: What do we do with the player whose natural release spins and what is excessive?

(2) Once the color is chosen for the game or session, it cannot be changed.

George: I disagree.

(3) You do not have to furnish four weights to your opponent if you chose not to.

George: I disagree.

(4) You can change tops -- red, blue, green, or any neutral or non-offending color.

George: Sure, any combination of colors should be acceptable.

(5) If you find that the weights or weight is too fast or slow for the board, you can change tops to faster or slower weights between games, without loss of time.

George: I disagree.

Switching colors in the middle of a session is a ploy in the same class as claiming the score is wrong after a frame is over, or starting an argument with your opponent about the rules, or talking over your opponent when it is their turn to shoot. These are cheap little brain ploys. They are very little above the so-called proverbial bag of dirty tricks, if any. I believe the game should be played on your own skill and merits, and not what you can do to your opponent.

George: I have a problem understanding why switching of colors should upset anyone, assuming the bottom of the

weights are the same.

The next progressive step I would like to see in shuffleboard is the allowing of coaching during a match. A coach can observe the game and advise their players of strategy between frames or games. A coach cannot approach the board at any time after the session starts, or make themselves known vocally or physically to the opponents at any time.

George: A novel idea. I like it if it can be done without slowing a game up, which we're still trying to find ways to

make faster.

Rules are made to regulate the game and protect the innocent from the unscrupulous, but we must guard against too many rules, as was the case with amateur rules in the '50s and '60s. Too many rules leave the way open for infraction of the rules. We don't want to become like a group of lawyers trying to win a case by rule infractions, but we want to win on our own skill and merits.

George: I agree the fewer rules the better. However, we still have those players finding loopholes and pushing our existing rules beyond the limit. But we don't want to end up with rules as thick as a New York City phone book.

George: We thank A.Z. for his comments and opinions because addressing these problem areas is long overdue. Just be-

cause I don't agree on all his ideas doesn't make us enemies and I'm sure I speak for A.Z. and invite everyone's comments. Please write.

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



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
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
