



"A lot of planning and preparation went into developing this suburb of Syracuce, New York, into a major tournament site," reports Dick Gorman. "Dan Henderson, his committee and the officers of the Moose Lodge were dedicated to making this a successful event. Floor space, facilities, and hospitality were some of the best I have seen. This place is a great settin and has major possibilities for the future. Imagine a bar room that easily accommodates four boards without crowding and a room next to it that will seat 450 at dining room tables!. All this is set in the village of Baldwinsville, about 10 miles outside of Syracuse, New York. The town is something to be remembered, with its quaint Victorian streets and houses. The first tournament is in the books and recorded as a success. It happened people had a good time and they will be back, despite some first-time obstacles that were overcome."

The format for this tournament, May 22-24, was typical of East Coast tournaments, with Friday night designated as a draw partner event. Taking first place was the team of Rick Belvey, Waverly, NY, and Roy Schreiber, sometimes Baldwinsville and sometimes Callotte, N.C., both of whom were first time winners of a major tournament. Second place went to the team of Ken VanZile Sr., now of Sydney, NY, and local Baldwinsville player Jack Wheeler. Third and final money spot went to Steve Bennett, traveler from Sherburne, NY, and his partner, John Camino of Baldwinsville.

Saturday was the designated day for the bring partner event. The talent arrived, but not in the abundance expected, so payoff was limited to three places instead of the normal six. Taking first plac were Marv Smith of Waterloo, NY, and his partner, Dick Gorman, Wilmington, Delaware. Losing hard and taking second place were John Canino and Roy Schrieber, both from Baldwins-ville. Taking third place money were Milt Benedict of Sherburne and Dick Losee of Poolville. (Milt was former owner of Benedict's Classic in Sherburne who brought major shuffleboard tournaments to upper New York state.)

On Sunday, the popular mixed doubles tourney was held, but with a little different twist. Instead of double elimination, a total points system was used, with a complete round robin with each team playing every other team. Each team kept their score and all points were totalled at the end of the tournament. "This idea was borrowed from The Board Talk Editor George Wilber and it was a rousing success," reports Dick Gorman. "Everybody got to play a lot of games, no two games and a party bracket. The crowd stayed until the end. The biggest and most prevalent comment was: this was the most fun I have ever had at a tournament event. The total points were surprisingly close."

Overall winners were Janet Kramer of Baldwinsville and Roy Schreiber, part-time New Yorker and part-time North Carolinian. Second place went to the husband and wife team of Sharon and John Cimino of Baldwinsville, with third place money going to host Dan Henderson and his wife Donna.

Overall point champion for the weekend was Roy Schreiber. "This was the first time you have heard about Baldwinsville Moose, but not the last," reports Dick Gorman. "They are already making plans for two tournaments next season, probably late September and May 1993, with hopes of going to five boards. 

Weekend Events and Sunday No-Shows

In the May issue of The Board Talk, the editors shared with their readers the following:

"We've been talking to a number of tournament directors lately and they seem to share a common concern: The overflowing crowds that show up for a weekend event on Friday night are greatly diminished by Sunday."

In addressing that issue, the editors posed six questions: (1) Are we having too many tournaments? (2) Is the economy an issue? (3) Are the tournaments too long? (4) Is the entry fee too much? too little? (5) Should we run singles and doubles the same weekend? (6) Should a tournament start Friday evening and be over by Saturday night? At the risk of being though impertinent, I submit that it is **none of the above.** "What is it then, you ask?" And, I answer, **Shuffleboard is not** a spectator sport!

For all that The Board Talk has done for shuffleboard, for all that the Shuffleboard Federation and the P.C.S.A. have done for the sport, for all that the many fine tournament directors have done or tried to do for the sport, for all of this -- NONE have succeeded in taking shuffleboard from what it is (a participatory sport) to what it isn't (a spectator sport). Plain and simple, shuffleboard is best enjoyed when "played" and enjoyed best when "played" well.

Yes, there are individuals who watch shuffleboard matches but to call husbands/wives, boyfriends/girlfriends, mothers/fathers, or sisters/ brothers SPECTATORS is to diminish existing relationships.

It is O.K., even considered American, to "watch" baseball, football, basketball, the Kentucky Derby, or the Summer Olympics. Ah, but one "plays" shuffleboard. One goes to "see" a movie, but one goes to "play" shuffleboard. One of the most popular features in The Board Talk is "Play Your Way Across the U.S.A.." PLAY is the message! If memory serves me well, almost every article in The Board Talk, for years on end, has encouraged individuals to become active in the sport through the simple expediency of "playing." That's right! Playing!

How, then, can one ask, "Where are the crowds on Sunday?" because the answer seems simple enough -- if they ain't playing, they ain't staying!






