Unity -- A Lesson From the Geese

As each bird flaps its wings, it creates an "uplift" for the bird following. By flying in a "V" formation, the whole flock adds a 71 percent longer flying range than if each flew alone.

Lesson: People who share common direction and sense of community can get where they travel on the thrust of one another.

Whenever a goose falls out of formation, it suddenly feels the drag and resistance of trying to fly alone, and quickly gets back into formation to take advantage of the "lifting power" of the bird immediately in front.

Lesson: If we have as much sense as a goose, we will stay in formation with those who are headed where we want to go.

The geese in formation honk from behind to encourage those up front to keep up their speed.

Lesson: We need to make sure our honking from behind is encouraging -- not something less helpful.

When a goose gets sick or wounded or shot down, two geese drop out of formation and follow him down to help and protect him. They stay with him until he is either able to fly again or dies. Then they launch out on their own, either with another formation or to catch up with the original flock.

Lesson: If we have as much sense as the geese, we'll stand by each other like they do.

When a goose gets tired of leading the formation, he will retire to the rear to take advantage of the maximum lift (draft), while another goose moves forward to take a turn at leading formation.

Lesson: If we have as much sense as a goose, we will take a turn in the lead when the time comes.

Bourbon's American Legion Does It Again!

American Legion Post 424 has four permanent boards, and is the home of the "World's Biggest" one-day double elimination doubles tournament. Each Spring on the first Saturday of May, they host their annual Spring Doubles Tournament. Due to Indiana laws, they are not allowed to be open on Sunday, but so far that has not mattered. Somehow, they always manage to get done! Thanks to tournament director Mike Koontz, everything always goes smoothly. They also have cheap drinks, a chicken barbecue, many raffles, and this year a "one of a kind" t-shirt designed by Fritzi Broka.

The question is always asked, "How long has this been going on?" The closest that it can be narrowed down to is 18 to 25 years. The biggest participation so far was 64 teams a few years ago.

This year on May 2, 42 teams shot it out for a total of \$9380. Winners were:

5th and 6th: Charlie Thompson and Skip Jackson of Indiana, Jim Yard and Don K. of Indiana;


7th and 8th: Gordie Collins of Michigan and Fritzi Broka of Indiana, and George Wilber and Bruce Thomison of Michigan.

At the 7th annual mixed doubles tournament at the Old Edison Inn, Edison, Washington, on March 7-8, locals Larry Sawyer of Anacortes and Cindy Mehler of Bellingham went undefeated in the winner's bracket to take home the lion's share of nearly \$2,000 in prize money.

After some riveting, down-to-the-last-puck games, Jimmy Allis of Longview and Michelle Foran of Tacoma were second-place finishers, with locals Bob Jewett and Karen Robinson, both from Bayview, ending an impressive third. 

Friday night started out with a draw partner event that ended up with 32 shooters vying for nearly \$2,000. Second in line were Don Casula, Wilmington, Del., and Bobby Voorhis, Fairmount, Ind. Third place and final money spot went to Beef Camp, Hicksville, Ohio, and Joe Williams, Springfield, Pa.

Saturday morning's women's singles ended with Judy Gartland, Philadelphia, Pa., leading the way to the winner's table, with second place going to a tough challenger, Judy Iseman of Chestertown, Md. 

N.A.S.L.™ TEAM EVENT CHANGES

As the N.A.S.L. $^{\mathbb{N}}$ Team Events have become a bigger and more important part of our major tournaments, we have continued to fine tune the format.

Our goal has always been to get to the point where every team has a chance to win. Through the combination of our ideas and those of our participants, the format has evolved to the point that our lofty goals for these competitions are within our reach.

The switch from the best four out of seven, two board format to the best five out of nine, three board format which was used last year's NORTH AMERICAN SHUFFLEBOARD CHAMPIONSHIPS has been a major step in the right direction; as any of the participants in that tournament will tell you.

As our statistical information continues to increase, the competition in the N.A.S.L. $^{\mathbb{N}}$ Team Events gets better as Well. Of course as with all new things, there are growing pains. At this year's Michigan Open, we experienced some of these growing pains.

One of our primary concerns has been that the top group of amateur players was beginning to upset the balance in the N.A.S.L. Team Events. This was happening because there is a pretty significant difference in ability between the top group and the rest of the amateur players.

We thought we had an answer to that problem when we expanded the ratings to include a zero category. This rating is given to the top five percent of the amateur players.

There were however some unforseen drawbacks to this change. The players who were affected by the change are the same players who usually take the initiative in trying to get players together to form the teams that enter our tournaments.

In order for a team roster to pass the under the handicap guidelines, it was necessary to find several average players. The problem lies in the fact that a much smaller number of average players are willing to invest in these type of competitions and it was very difficult to find enough of them who would travel to makeup a team.

We are therefore lowering the team handicap requirement from 14 to 12. This will make it easier for people to assemble teams and should help us to keep the N.A.S.L. Team Events growing. This change is effective beginning with the U.S. Open, a flyer/registration for the U.S. Open can be found in this issue of The Board Talk.


