

### A Tribute to Dale Friend

"Dale Friend was not a big name in the shuffleboard tournament world, although his name did grace the pages of The Board Talk on several occasions. He was a better than average local player and competitor, but that was not his major contribution to the shuffleboard world. First, he was a friend (as his name indicates) and he was always friendly to all players; big names and no names, it didn't make any difference to him. He always spoke even though he lost his voice to cancer several years ago. He still made his sounds and he still welcomed you. He was always there at the league matches and tournaments at Harvey's, doing the extra things that made things go smoothly -- cleaning and waxing boards and generally making things go well.

"Dale was also a fighter. When the cancer came after him, he fought and still wanted to be active. And he did come to the league matches and tournaments, and play if he could, or be a spectator if he wasn't up to it. Dale lost his battle with cancer this winter and we lost a good friend of shuffleboard," Dick said.

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### How Sweet It Is!

We are very excited about something we have seen in the last few issues of The Board Talk. The letters written by a number of people, in particular A.Z. Turnbo, represent real progress for our sport.

While we did not agree with some of what he said, we think it is very good for the sport of shuffleboard that people have an opportunity to air their views and that they take advantage of the opportunity given to them by The Board Talk to share their thoughts and ideas.

One of the most frustrating and non-productive things that can happen to a promoter is when a person attends an event, sees something they don't like, but tells everyone but the promoter. For years, we've been telling people that if they don't agree with something that was done at one of our events, they should tell us. What normally happens is that they go home and complain to their friends. This is fine, and it probably makes them feel better to get it off their chest, but the problem is that if they don't tell the promoter of the event, then the next time they go back to that tournament, they are liable to have the same problem.

So if something happens at a tournament that you don't like, or if there is a rule you don't agree with, or if you have an idea you think will improve the tournament, it's okay to tell your friends; just make sure you also bring it to the attention of the people with the ability to fix it.

Of course, if you have something good to say about a tournament, promoters like to hear that kind of feedback as well. And while we are on the subject of positive feedback, we want to thank the people who are continuing to say good things about last year's tournament in Reno and to let everyone know that the 1992 tournament will be bigger and better.

We want to thank Bill Lally from Philadelphia for the nice letter he sent us recently. Bill expressed his opinion regarding a format change that we asked for feedback on in the February issue of The Board Talk (more on this issue later on in this column).

We want to thank Dottie Bastanchury from Southern California for letting us know that she and her partner, Janice Devitt from Bremerton, Washington, finished third in the amateur draw at the Reno Tournament. 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
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# Vegas Diary

Who unpacked? He flipped the channels on the TV looking for his first choice -- 1940's cowbow and Indians movie or those other kind that cost money -- while I un-


Freshened up. Then went to the shuffleboard room on the second floor and met good friend Al Stewart, who was leveling and making adjustments on the 12 boards he had set



There was over \$72,000 in the total pot, down a little from last year.



# Shuffleboard Alive and Well in Deleware County, Indiana

This game is as good as the people who promote it and play it!

Shuffleboard in Deleware County, Indiana, has been a long-standing form of competition. When Papa Lou Coulter (Red Dog Saloon), Rudy Parris (Sportsman's Lounge), Steve Mason (Oasis Bar & Grill) and Arnold Cross (Mississinewa Tavern) decided to start the Deleware County League, it was to accommodate those players who had been around for years, but really had no organized shuffleboard competition. In the last four years, the league has become a forum for beginners and young players to compete against seasoned players from around East Central Indiana. It's a draw partner event every other Saturday starting in November and ending in March. Twelve tournaments, four taverns, three times at each location.

There is also a final tournament at the end of the season that each player must earn qualification for. A player must play at each location at least one time, plus two more of their choice, for a total of six tournaments. There is no calcutta, just entry fee of \$10 plus \$2 held back for the year-end tournament. This format is fun for the seasoned players, but more important, the beginners and young players who want to improve their game.

The one aspect that sets this league apart from other leagues is the number of women who participate. At present, there are 52 active players in the league, 17 of which are women. Jonna Reece (pictured), league register and organizer, says an average of 34 people play every other Saturday through the fall and winter season.

The four impressive players who I feel play real well are pictured -- Carolyn Holton, Jeri Dickson, Jonna Reece, and Cheryl Cockrill. I call them the Four Horseman. All four participate in three to four round robins a week and travel to surrounding cities for calcuttas and round robins. They play as good as anyone.

The one comment I want to emphasize is the fact that this league is well organized for all types of players. I am real happy to see more women playing the game and hopefully it will inspire more to play in the future.

Since the failure of the Central Indiana Shuffleboard League in 1987 (C.I.S.L.), which went for six years in Central Indiana, the Deleware County League has picked up the slack to keep the sport alive and well, as well as growing for all players.

Having the format of every other week gives the places on off Saturdays the opportunity to host the calcuttas, which included one on Feb. 22-23 at the Red Dog Saloon, open doubles, two boards, double elimination, and an open singles, double elimination. On March 21, The Hog House in Ingalls, Indiana, will host an open doubles, single elimination. In April, the Mississinewa Tavern, Eaton, Ind., is going to have a doubles tournament, single elimination. More on that later.

One last thought, Indiana has always been strong in shuffleboard. I think we have been a little lax in the past few years in promoting this game, including myself. We are going to try to remedy that and keep you informed.

My hat's off to Deleware County for their great efforts to the continued growth of shuffleboard. I give Jonna my applause, plus the other people involved in this league. They have done a marvelous job.

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
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
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
