Lots of Action in Indiana!



Thanks for the update on Portland Eddie, Glen. We hope receiving The Board Talk in his mail once a month has kept him in touch with The World of Shuffleboard and a little less lonely. The first time we met Eddie was at the very first major national tournament we covered for The Board Talk. It was the World Championship Tournament at the Showboat in Las Vegas in January of 1984, where he earned second place honors (Darrol Nelson was first; Doug Buhl was third; and K.D. Makarounis "Mac the Greek" was fourth). We were impressed then and hope to see him compete again during our tenure.

We appreciate, more than we can say, your continued efforts to make The Board Talk a nationwide communications network for shufflers. As you promised, here is your partner Doc Khan's ideas to make that happen....

Doc Khan: "I Have A Dream" (A Long-Term Agenda for the Board Talk Revival)

I have a dream that one day we will mobilize dozens, if not hundreds, of Shuffleboard Ambassadors, spread throughout the length and breadth of these United States promoting the game and The Board Talk.

I want to present some ideas for the consideration of all those who love this game and feel it in their blood. Please do not mock my grandoise ideas and show some indulgence as every success story starts with a dream which has a chance to become reality with methodical planning, sincerity of effort, and sheer persistence and diligence.

Lessons Learned from Revival Effort

As I travelled to different states and was running around all over Hell and Creation trying to spread the gospel of The Board Talk (I covered some 10,000 miles and signed up people and taverns from Florida to California, and from North Carolina to Wyoming, in addition to covering a large part of Michigan), I found things that sometimes amazed me, sometimes saddened me, and most of the time disgusted me.

The positive thing is that there are literally hundreds upon hundreds of boards out there.

<u>Condition of the Boards -- Promotion Through</u> <u>Friendship</u>

In every bar, sure enough, there were players, but no one was playing. The reason? The boards were in terrible shape -- scratched up, rough, and almost unplayable. Instead of getting an attitude, I volunteered to fix it. I brought in silicone spray -- you should have seen their faces after a couple of treatments with that Magic Spray. I told them about mixing ultra-speed with brown or white lightning, how to use the wrench to even out the surface (but not too much 'cause Travis Anderson used to say, Doc, we don't want no rail-riders).

The point is that if the good shuffleboard players in every town and city took a little time to visit the neglected bars with terrible boards and gently helped them straighten out their situation, you will not only make a lot of friends, but increase the number of boards you can play on. If all the good players only congregated in their special bar, to *(continued on Page 10)*



RENO TOURNEY

Look for a flyer and entry form for the 1993 NORTH AMERICAN SHUFFLEBOARD CHAMPIONSHIPS[™] in the May issue of The Board Talk. The tournament will have a couple of events that we did not have last year, including a Ladies Singles.

As many of you are aware, we have developed a new game that can be played on a shuffleboard table which is specifically designed for league play and also works very well in a tournament format. It is a fast exciting game which you will be able to try first hand at the Reno tourney. We will be running a special draw partner event using the new game, you can expect some added money for this event to spice things up a little. More about the "new game" and the accompanying league program later in this article.

NEW PROS FOR 1993

A number of players who have distinguished themselves in the Division I play in the past two years will be making the jump to the pro ranks for the North American Championships. Join us in congratulating our new pros - Johnny Ballard, Denny Busch, Gordy Collins, Diana Hagen, Dale Koteras, John Lukas, Billy Melton, Bob Shaw and Don Valk.

There will also be a change in the distribution of prize money for pro events. Based on player feedback, these changes may be instituted in the other divisions. We will be expanding the number of places to be paid on the entry fee money as well as any money that may be added to the event, auction money payout will remain the same.

At the recent P.C.S.A. tourney the pro team event was very enjoyable for the spectators and we assume for the players as well. If there is sufficient interest, we will add one to the Reno tournament. If any of you pros are interested in playing, or if you have any suggestions on format (4 out of 7 or 5 out of 9; single or double elimination; 11 or 15 point games) let us know. We need to make a decision on whether or not to go ahead with this event by June 30.

LEAGUE PROGRAM BREAKING NEW GROUND

Over the last few months we have outlined some of the details on a league program as well as some background information on the workings of the coin operated game industry, the national league programs for the other tavern sports, and how those two relate to each other. The new league program we have started for vending companies is getting an enthusiastic response within the industry. We are excited to announce that major vending companies in six states Illinois Michigan, Ohio, Minnesota, Nevada and Texas are starting new leagues under the program. We expect the new program to be active in fifteen states by this fall.

In the March issue of The Board Talk we reported that we were asking the three major shuffleboard manufacturers, American International, Dynamo Home Products and The Playfair Group - to support our league promotion.

Each of these companies has expressed interest and asked for more details. We recently sent additional information to each of them and will be discussing the subject in further detail with them soon. The electronic dart manufacturers provide joint support for the national league programs and the results have been fantastic. More information about this in the next issue of The Board Talk.

THE NEW GAME

The interest of the manufacturers in the league program is based on the fact that it is structured so that it is attractive for their customers, which are vending companies. One of the reasons leagues fail is that politics can ruin the fun for the players. With most leagues being run by players and bar owners it is nearly impossible to keep the politics out.

We believe that one of the biggest reasons why the national dart, pinball and pool league programs have grown so large so fast is the involvement of the vending companies. The financial backing provided by the vendors association has been a big boost, but just as important has been their ability to eliminate a lot of the normal league politics.

Computer programs now exist that will do all of the administrative work of running a league, including scheduling, standings, team and player handicapping, etc. With the vending company taking over the administration it leaves the players free to play and have fun.

Furthermore, the fact that the vendors are in their locations every week to make collections, insures that the league standings and schedules get posted. The vendor is completely neutral, each of the bars is a customer, and therefore they want everyone to do well.

The new game we have for shuffleboard is the focal point of the league program for the vending companies. It is fast and exciting which make it appealing for players. The fact that the game is fast helps the vendor because two to three times as many games can be played in a night and that makes the shuffleboard table a little more profitable. We believe that this is the right direction for shuffleboard to go in order to attract a major sponsor. Don't be left out of the action, join the N.A.S.L.^M family.

the point of neglecting others, this game is not going to spread and expand as it could.

Once you have won over these new places and helped them with playing techniques, I always try to help a free hand shooter with the rail-shot technique instead of what Billy Mays used to say: "Doc, a guy who passes the puck and is a free-hand shooter should be taken outside and shot in public."

I have used this technique of improving people's tables in at least 20 bars in Michigan and I can play there anytime and I am not only welcomed, but their players have quadrupled.

Of course, when this has been accomplished, you can also sign them up for The Board Talk.

If Board Talk Ambassadors started doing this just in their own neighborshoods and towns, we will be able to show significant results.

Would it then be possible to sign up 40 new members in every state, thus getting 1,000 new subscribers? You bet! If it is done with love and friendship and sincerity, without bragging and intimidation and encouraging the young, the new, the novice to have better boards and play better games.

Annual Recognition Awards

Revival should be a continuing crusade with annual recognition of all who have toiled. This ceremony can be held in Las Vegas every year.

Imagine an ordinary, regular tavern who gets one of these guys to come in and work on their board and help their players. The numbers of great players are nearly endless. I give you a few examples.

Buddy Brammer, Billy Chiles, Billy Mays, Dick Gorman, Butch Kelly, Sam Summers, Bubba Warren, Bjernie Sunde, Diane Hagen, Don Cox, Steve Wilson, Brenda Moore, Travis Anderson, Cheryl Collins, Chuck Norris, Jerry Siebert, Jody Slack, Bellflower Bruce, Joe Nino, George Ostrum, Doug Buhl, Darrol Nelson, One-Arm John Myles, Jolene Lembke, Al Stewart, Madge Goff, Don Valk, Morrie Estes, Harvey Comer, Butch Kelly, John McDermott, Ted Z, and on and on and on, the list is endless.

If each of these great players took it upon themselves to help other lesser known players, encouraged them, and taught them and got them going, they will all be burying their noses in The Board Talk just to see their names or a picture. The people I signed up got so excited when they saw the name of their tavern in the "Play Your Way Across the U.S.A." They were showing it to everybody. "Doc put us in there and we are now known all over this country."

If these shuffleboard celebrities -- and believe me, some of these are giants in the game -- did a little autograph signing and attracted crowds, this game can spread like wildfire.

I have also discovered a delightful new bar in Lake Odessa, Michigan, near Grand Rapids. It's the Pump Room, 16 miles southwest of Ionia off I-96. They are Board Talk subscribers and have started to use the silicone spray with great improvement in their board. They have many good players and have been holding regular tournaments (mixed doubles on Saturday).
