MORE ABOUT DEUCES WILD™

It has certainly been a pleasant surprise to have received so many phone calls about our new game in the few weeks since the July issue of The Board Talk came out. As we mentioned in our article from that issue, DEUCES WILD^M will be introduced in a draw partner format at the 1993 North American Championships^M. To make it even more interesting, \$2,000.00 is being added to the pot for this event. Everyone who attends the North American Championships^M is eligible for the DEUCES WILD^N event.

If you have been reading our articles in the last few issues, then you already know that DEUCES WILD^M Leagues will be run by independent league operators, either a vending company directly, or someone they hire for that purpose.

There have been inquiries from people who are interested in the possibility of starting a DEUCES WILD^M league in their area. It has been very difficult to tell them that at this time we are running DEUCES WILD^M Leagues only in cooperation with selected vending companies. We are however still encouraging leagues that want to use their own format to join and be sanctioned by the N.A.S.L.^M.

We have some very important reasons for following the course of action we have chosen for the development of DEUCES WILD^{\mathbb{N}} Leagues. As you probably know, it has always been our goal to secure a major national sponsor for shuffleboard. This has certainly been a frustrating process at times. The good part is that we have learned a lot about the coin operated game industry and, most important, what kind of things are attractive to the most likely potential sponsors.

DEUCES WILD^{\mathbb{N}} is a fast, easy to learn game, that is tailor made for league play. We believe that a national sponsor is possible for DEUCES WILD^{\mathbb{N}} in the not too distant future. Because of our sponsorship goals, we are proceeding very deliberately.

The most important thing to us is to retain as many of the players as possible that join the DEUCES WILD^M League in the first year. A decade long survey of the bowling industry in the 1980's revealed that 80% of first year bowlers do not return for a second season. The survey also gave an in depth picture of why this happens. We have made every effort to take those factors which can also be applied to shuffleboard into consideration in the course of developing the DEUCES WILD^M format.

Therefore, the vending companies that are being approached to start DEUCES WILD^M Leagues are companies which are very experienced in operating leagues. Most of these companies have a person whose job it is to handle their league operations. The experience these people have gives us an excellent chance to get DEUCES WILD^M off to a big start and establish momentum for the 1994 season.

Another very important part of our marketing strategy is to expand the shuffleboard community in order to make our sport more attractive to potential national sponsors. That is why we are targeting states which are not widely known to have a lot of organized shuffleboard activity. Among the states we are either already active in, or expect to be are: Florida, Iowa, Minnesota, Nevada, North Carolina, Ohio, Wisconsin and Wyoming.

In order to keep you up to date on the progress of the DEUCES WILD^M League Program and our sponsorship efforts, we will continue to include information in our monthly article in The Board Talk.

The 1993 North American Championships[™] is expected to be the biggest ever in both attendance and prize money. The Sands Regency Hotel Casino, our host/sponsor is adding at least \$7,000.00 to the tournament. Of course our goal is to fill the N.A.S.L.[™] Team Event with 32 teams.
