The Thanksgiving Shootout was the first of five weekend tournaments scheduled for Harvey's Place in Street, Maryland, Nov. 20-22. "The economy is really hitting hard among the shufflers in this area," reports Dick Gorman. "We are hoping for a near-term recovery and a return to sell-out in advance tournaments. We did have two brand-new traveling competitors, Nick Lopatin and Ken Missimer from Pennsville, New Jersey, join us and they threatened to be back again. We hope so; nice guys!"

Friday night was the draw partner event and, even though the pot was down, the enthusiasm was high. When the night ended, the winners were Len Dell, Bellcamp, Md., and Bob Morrel, Philadelphia, Pa. Giving up hard were second place finishers Butch Kelly, Springfield, Pa., and Dick Gorman, Wilmington, Del. Third place was taken by the co-ed team of Brenda Wallace, Port Deposit, Md., and Wayne Nichols, Conowingo, Md.

In Saturday morning's women's singles, Judy Iseman of Chestertown, Md., led the way to the winner's table, placing first over second place finisher Rusti McCarty of Cumberland, Md. Finishing in third place was first time money winner Wendy Davis of Elsmsere, Del.. On Saturday night, Mickey Mickens of Mt. Laurel, New Jersey, and Bob Morrel of Philadelphia, led the parade to the winner's circle to collect top honors in the bring partner event. Second place went to a tough team, Len Dell of Bellcamp and Chuck King of Dover, Del. Third went to Johnny Gardner, Greensboro, Md., and Butch "Hollywood" Kelly, Springfield, Pa. "Honorable mention has to go to the fourth place finishers, Connie King of Northeast and Brenda Wallace of Port Deposit," reports Dick. "They both gave formidable competition to everyone all day and evening long."

A round robin mixed doubles on Sunday was won by Judy Iseman and Len Dell, with second going to Rusti McCarty and Chuck King. Third place went to Brenda Wallace and Bob Overbay of Street.

The next scheduled tournament at Harvey's Place is on Jan. 15-17 with draw partners on Friday, women's singles and bring partner on Saturday and mixed doubles on Sunday. Dick Gorman says a new inovation in prizes will be introduced which will be interesting to most players.

and Becki Boudout and their efficent crew dished out great drinks, food, service, atmosphere and hospitality. The new format was the addition of a "first flight" to attract new players who had the desire to compete but, because of their lack of experience, had little chance to beat the reigning "champs" for the crowns that would be awarded.

As it turned out in the seven tournament, four board, nearly \$6,000 total pot event, it was the first flight participants who made the weekend a memorable landmark in shuffleboard history in Michigan. While the "champs" involvement in the yearly shootout was minimal, new players in first-time tournament experience were in abundance, and served notice that it wouldn't be their last.

The 1992 State of Michigan champions are: Doubles, Ken Gay of Waterford and Jerry Hershmann of Utica (Bjerne Sunde of Madison Heights and John Tischler of Detroit finished second); Men's Singles, John McDermott, Northville (Bjerne Sunde finished second and Saginaw's Sonny Morgan came in third); Mixed Doubles, Sonny Morgan and Linda Mitchell of Saginaw. (Cassie Kern of Pontiac and Bjerne Sunde finished second, with Sher Blessing of Rochester and Frank Parrish of Auburn Hills in third.) Last year's Women's Singles Champ, Sher Blessing, showed up to defend her crown, but Cassie Kern was her only challenger so that event was cancelled. Therefore, Sher retains her title and will be the one to try to beat next year.

In first flight action, Shirley Carpenter of Walled Lake showed she had the stuff upcoming champs are made of when she beat the formidable Linda Mitchell in the Women's Singles. Betty Kuebler ("We're too big to be the cookie dwarfs.") of Saginaw came in third in the 13player field of contenders.

In the first flight men's singles, it was the impressive play of Garry Young, Pontiac, that beat Frank Parrish of Auburn Hills (whose demonstrated skill moved him up to the championship flight in the mixed doubles). Another member of the "cookie" Kueblers, Dan of Saginaw, finished third, with Steve Auten (watch out for this new, young, second generation player) of Pontiac in fourth place in a field of 22 contenders.

It was a "family affair" as natives Linda Mitchell and Bonnie Morgan beat the tough guys in the first flight open doubles. They proved that shuffleboard was a nonsexist sport as they defeathed second-place finishers Frank Parrish and Reggie Surfus of Commerce. A team from Lansing, Carl Daly and Mark Holland, took third place honors.

Another Lansing team, Jeni Coscarelli and Mark Holland took first place in the first flight mixed doubles event, beating second place finishers, hosts Dave Willett and Becki Boudout. Tournament directors George and Donna Wilber extend special thanks to Dave and Becki and their crew, to Betty Parrish who filled in as chief bookkeeper (no small job, especially when you have seven events and seven sponsor sales) when Donna broke her ankle, to Rob Kern, John Tischler and Chris Passariello (who are always there when we need them), to John and Mary Holmes from Luther who blazed new trails for us in the Northern Michigan area, and all the participants of the 1992 State of Michigan Championships.

As we begin a new year it seems an appropriate time to reflect on where we have been and where we hope to go. When The Shuffleboard Federation, Inc. was founded in 1987 we knew what a great game shuffleboard was and believed that there were big sponsorship dollars available and we hoped to help bring some of them to our sport.

Five years later we are convinced that shuffleboard can attract major sponsorship dollars, but have come to realize that if shuffleboard is ever going to reap the benefits of outside sponsorship it is going to happen through leagues, not tournaments.

It is ironic that in 1993, as we further scale back tournament promotion that many people still think that running big tournaments is very lucrative. If in fact there was big money to be made in tournament promotion, we would be running more of them not less.

As we have mentioned in previous articles, there are literally millions of sponsorship dollars going into pool and dart leagues. This money comes from a number of different places but primarily three sources - manufacturers of pool and dart equipment, beer companies, and vending companies. The last group, vending companies, own and operate the majority of all coin operated equipment in this country. Their association, the AMOA, which has been a longtime supporter of pool and dart leagues have recently added pinball to their list.

Why has shuffleboard not been able to obtain support from these people. The answer is easy - dollars and cents. These other games are fast, an average of less than 15 minutes, and therefore earn a lot more money than shuffleboard where an average game is more than twice as long. This was not always the case.

Shuffleboard was far more popular than any other coin operated game during the forties and fifties, when the game was played using a "frames" format instead of the 21 point format that replaced frames. Of course in recent years, 15 point games have replaced 21 point games as the most popular, and now there is a growing interest in 11 point games, especially for leagues and round robins.

Sol Lipkin, who has sixty years of service to our sport was recently honored at the North American Championships. He has often told us that if shuffleboard had stayed with the frames format we would all be sitting pretty right now. For those readers who aren't familiar with frames, the following is a brief explanation.

A frame consists of one round of eight weights, shot in the same fashion as a regular game. The length of the game is a predetermined number of frames, 8, 10 or 12 (there are always an even number). The player with the highest score at the end of the designated number of frames is the winner. If the score is tied at the end of the game, two more frames are played. This process is continued until a winner has been determined.

Currently, the average nine game league match, with 15 point games, takes four to six hours. Using a ten frame format, an average match is less than three hours.

For those of you who are involved in bowling leagues, imagine how much less fun it would be if the game went to a points format instead of ten frames. Bowling would not be nearly as popular if the winner was the first player to 300. Furthermore, bowling leagues wouldn't enjoy the tremendous popularity they do without their handicap system.

One of the things we have heard most often about our league program, the N.A.S.L.^M, is that our handicap system is too complicated and is tough to apply to league play. With that in mind we are introducing a new system which is so simple that even someone with no previous experience can understand it and we think it will create a lot of new interest in the program. Look for more information in upcoming issues of The Board Talk.

With the development of the N.A.S.L.^M being at the top of our priority list for this year, we feel it is important to address some misconceptions about the Program. One of the biggest myths regarding The Shuffleboard Federation and the N.A.S.L.^M program is that we want to run your league and/or tell you how to play. Nothing could be further from the truth. Leagues which are members of the N.A.S.L.^M elect their own officers, make their own rules, and have complete control of their own finances.

In order to have a realistic chance of attracting a major sponsor, shuffleboard leagues across the country need to be able to present a united front. In other words, it will take all of us pulling together. The N.A.S.L.^{\square} gives leagues from around the country a common thread even though the leagues themselves are very different, with formats ranging from conventional, to frames, to Horse Collar. So regardless of how your league operates, we would like to add you to the N.A.S.L.^{\square} family.

In an effort to draw some interest from the AMOA, we are starting another program specifically geared to their members. It will include the frames format as well as the new handicap system, play will begin in the fall of 1993.

Our league rules are meant to be a starting point, not the final word. Leagues are encouraged to make whatever changes they feel are necessary. It is those changes that help us to continually improve. Many of the rules included in our League & Tournament Rule Book were added and/or modified as a result of player suggestion.

In the November issue of The Board Talk we ran an article entitled "Why Leagues Fail". Since that time, many people have told us that it really hit home. Because of that response and the fact that it is very pertinent to the rest of this article, a large portion of it has been reprinted on the following page. Our belief is that the back bone of shuffleboard, as well as any other sport, is the average player. These people, who represent 80-90% of a league's total membership, play because they love the game and spending time with their friends. Even though they seldom win, they still come to play every week.

The unfortunate pattern for leagues is that sooner or later the better players take the fun out of league play by loading up the top couple of teams who then compete for first place, while the rest of the teams are out of the running by mid season. Eventually the average players get tired of being dominated by the better players and quit.

In professional sports, the proven, successful method is to give the teams at the bottom the best chance to improve by giving them the top draft picks. Their success has come by establishing parody and giving every team a chance.

There is a league which we are familiar with that is now on the verge of folding after nearly twenty years. In the beginning, the top players were spread out among all the bars in the league. But every new season saw a few more of the better players leaving their original teams to play for one of the top couple of teams in the league. This is a common occurrence which plagues many leagues.

The league began to discuss handicap systems at their annual organizational meetings. While it was obvious something had to be done, league meetings are usually attended heavily by the top players who influenced the less knowledgeable players. Therefore, when a handicap system was finally introduced, it was not structured in such a way that the less talented teams really had any better chance of winning.

Five years ago, when the league was at its strongest, with nearly five hundred players, a few teams dropped out and formed their own league. Because it was a small league, the better players did not join, preferring instead to stay where they were.

Meanwhile, the original league was raising the weekly dues, and then voting to pay fewer places. We feel very strongly, and consequently have included the idea in our N.A.S.L. program, that every team should get back something at the end of the season.

Leagues to be successful should have the emphasis on having fun, not playing for money. Players whose primary interest is playing for money should concentrate on tournament play.

Eventually, the new league grew while the original league dwindled. Now all that is left in the original league are a couple of bars, while the new league has become strong. We hope that the new league maintains the control that they have and do not allow the short sighted way of thinking that doomed the other league. The issue in a nutshell is that we need to think about the future and not just think about today; otherwise, we have no future. We believe giving every team a chance to win is a necessary ingredient if a league is to grow and flourish; and, that leagues which are not using some form of handicap system, be it ours or their own, will eventually fold. Some form of handicapping is the only way to guarantee that every team will have a chance.

The shuffleboard community can learn a great deal from the successes enjoyed by pool and dart leagues. There are several major league programs for each of these two sports. Their combined membership is more than 500,000 players. We have incorporated some of their proven ideas into our the N.A.S.L.^M format, and intend to continue to use these programs as a model.

You will be reading more about new developments and revisions in the N.A.S.L.^m program over the next few months. Our goal, which is a major sponsorship contract for the program, is attainable if the entire shuffleboard community takes the attitude that as shuffleboard players we deserve it and are going to work together until it happens.

We are asking for your support. That means more than just becoming a member, it means that if you agree with what is being said here, you need to help us to get the message out. The entire shuffleboard community has a stake in this effort and if it works everybody wins.

As we continue to promote our ideas we ask only one thing from you, that you keep an open mind and take an objective look at what we come up with. As always, your comments, criticisms, and ideas are always welcome.

We are very interested in hearing opinions on a number of different questions, starting with the concept of using the frames format for league play. What kind of format does your league follow - how many games, how many players, singles or doubles, 11 or 15 points, is the league mixed, do you have a handicap system, and if yes, how does it work.

In return for your help and support, we pledge to work hard on the behalf of every league member. We will submit a sponsorship proposal on behalf of your league to your local beer distributors as well as include your league in all efforts to secure a national sponsor.

We believe that this is a critical time for our sport. Is the shuffleboard community ready and willing to stand together with the common goal of getting the recognition our sport deserves; or are we going to allow ourselves to be an also ran to pool, darts or even pinball.
