### **Blue/Brown Win at Deer Park Tavern**



### **A Eulogy for Pat Porter**

On June 18, 1992, we were all saddened by the news of Pat Porter's untimely death. Many kind words have been said about Pat and he will be missed by all of us forever.

His ever-present smile, his great sense of humor, his sincere caring, his always kind and helpful ways, and his unending generosity were always there, no matter what. Just like that other famous humorist, Pat, too, never met a stranger he didn't try to like. In 1990, at the National Satellite Dealers Convention, Pat was honored as the Ambassador of the Year, probably the most prestigious award the SDC can bestow. Here is a quote from the president of the SDC: "In the year we have known Pat Porter, he's demonstrated a combination of qualities that are rarely seen in one of the players on the human stage: humility, good humor, broad-ranging intellect, courage, insight, eloquence, openness, graciousness and gentleness. When we think of Pat Porter, we can't help but compare him to Will Rogers. Pat is a first rate human being and we're blessed to have him in the industry."

Pat was my best pal for almost 40 years. We shared a lot of dreams and chased a lot of rainbows together, from the souped-up cars of the '50s to record-holding race cars (Moore Bros. & Porter Dragster, 1962) to go-cart racing to promoting pro shuffleboard for the last six or eight years. Travelling thousands of miles each year for these promotions, not counting his travel to cook-offs and of course, his regular job, too. He was a life member of the Aces Auto Club, a life member of the U.S. Shuffleboard Association. He probably promoted Big Spring, Texas, more than anything else. We never went to a convenion, drag race, shuffleboard tourney, or any other event, that he didn't make sure everyone there knew we were from Big Spring, Texas. People would ask us if Big Spring was desert (flat land and no trees) and Pat always answered, "We can stand on a tuna fish can in my front yard and see South America."

May I suggest we pay tribute to him with a moment of silence or with a plaque or marker or to rename the downtown area "Pat Porter Plaza" or rename a street "Pat Porter Drive," or have Coy Joe do a bust of Pat.

Thank you for the memories, my old pal, and thank you, Big Spring, for letting me talk about him. I bid you peace now and forever.

### PCSA's Extravaganza V "Best Yet" for Participants, Spectators!

It was a new location for the Pacific Coast Shuffleboard Association's Extravaganza V -- the Alladin Hotel & Casino in Las Vegas on Feb. 2-7. There were some new events on the schedule, like the exciting pro team event. And there were some new faces in the crowd of players and spectators -- the "new, young blood that the future of shuffleboard depends upon," as veteran Glen Davidson described them.

But some things hadn't changed from previous Extraganzas, like the same crew of hard-working supporters that invested so many long hours to make the event run smoothly, the big total pot of over \$80,000, and the hold-your-breath-and-pray drama of the Saturday night crap game that has become a tradition for this event.

From start to finish, it was an event that held the interest of the large gallery of spectators, most of who sat watching the action on the boards for more hours than they did sitting at the slot machines. For those who don't think shuffleboard is a spectator sport, you should have witnessed a row of "hustlers" from the past, like Al Stewart, Porter White, Leroy Waggoner, Balboa Ron and others, and listened to them comment on the action and reminisce about their incredible activities during the '50s.

#### **Oklahoma Pro Team Shows Prowess**

In a first-time event, six 6-member teams invested \$1200 each to prove that they were the best in the U.S.A. -- California, Texas, Oklahoma, Washington, Oregon, and Nebraska. It was planned to be a "winner-take-all" event with no sponsor sale, but participants voted to award the second-place team their entry money back.

When the wax settled, it was Oklahoma -- Sam Summers, Glen Davidson, Bud Hillburn, Mark Foust, Bill Melton, and Frank Blade -- that claimed top honors. The second place Oregon team gave them a real run for their money. "We beat them by the skin of our teeth," said Glen Davidson. "It was a pleasure playing them and to beat them was even more of a pleasure!"

PCSA officials were pleased with the sign-up for this first pro team event and feel confident more will want to be in on the challenge next year.

#### Broka/Hendrix Tops in A/B Draw

There were 32 teams in the A/B Draw event, which was marked by outstanding performances. In fact, nobody looked like a "B," perhaps because there was such a caring sharing between the A's and B's. The A's willingly shared their expertise and experience with their partners. The B's respectfully listened and followed through to the best of their abilities. It was a treat to watch. As George Wilber of Michigan remarked about his partner, Don Cox of California, "It was a great experience playing with Donny. He never once allowed me to get 'down' after a bad frame; it was always 'we can do it next time,' which is a characteristic of a professional."

In a tough finals match, it was Buddy Broka of Indiana and Tom Hendrix of Oklahoma against George Ostrom of Colorado and Mike Thorpe of Washington, with Buddy and Tom taking the hard-fought battle.

Keeping it "in the family," Fritzi Broka of Indiana and Eric Waldman of Montana took third place honors, with Gregg McFarland of California and Gaiul Schultz of Michigan in fourth place. Sharing fifth and sixth places were David Williams of Texas and Shirley Geriets of Oklahoma, and Don Cox of California and George Wilber of Michigan. Placing seventh and eighth were Mark Foust and Sandy Swift of Oklahoma, and Fred Thuman of California and Rena Hendrix of Oklahoma.

### Hagen Claims Women's Crown; Melton Earns Pro Singles Title

If it hadn't been for the big galleries the amateur teams always attract, the Alladin's big ballroom would have waned to one side, as the crowds gathered to watch the finals of the women's singles and pro singles finals. Some had to make the tough choice or travel back and forth between the two ends of the shuffleboard room.

An indication of how times have changed, fans were treated to a show featuring the men in pink and the women in black and white!

After a grueling six games, it was Diana Hagen of Texas who prevailed in the women's singles. She beat the



### **RENO TOURNEY**

After much discussion about whether we would promote any tournaments in 1993, we have decided to go ahead with the North American Championships. The Sands Regency Hotel Casino in Reno, Nevada will once again host the Tournament. The dates for the North American Championships<sup>M</sup> are November 8-14. We had hoped to move the tournament into the summer, but no such dates were available for 1993.

The tentative schedule of events include Draw Partner, Singles, and Doubles events for Divisions I, II, & III; Ladies Singles; Pro Singles & Doubles; Legends & Consolation Draws; and the main event, the N.A.S.L.<sup>™</sup> Team Event.

One of the big highlights for last two North American Championships has been the added money from the Sands Regency, which totaled \$18,000 for the 1991 & 1992 tourneys. Details on the added money for the 1993 Tournament will be in the April or May issue of The Board Talk.

Congratulations to the P.C.S.A. on the 5th anniversary of their Shuffleboard Extravaganza, which was held last month at the Aladdin Hotel in Las Vegas. We have decided to follow their lead and will take 5% of the prize money to cover a portion of our expenses for the Reno Tournament.

This is not an idea we are totally comfortable with, but reality dictates our decision in this case. We pledge to our participants to continue to spare no effort in making sure that the tournament is well staffed and run as professionally as they have come to expect.

### LEAGUES

Work continues on the revision of the National Amateur Shuffleboard League Program. While we are pleased with the amount of interest the N.A.S.L.<sup> $\square$ </sup> has received over the last few months, we will have to ask those waiting on information to wait a little longer for specific details. Much of the information we provided in the past about the N.A.S.L.<sup> $\square$ </sup> was used by people who chose to take our ideas and use them without joining the program. Consequently, no details about the new program will be made public until after we have secured copyright and other legal protection for our system.

As mentioned in previous articles, we have studied the national dart and pool league programs to learn from their successes. One of the most important elements in the surge in popularity of electronic darts has been the joint support of the National Dart Association (NDA) by the three main manufacturers of those games, Arachnid, Valley Recreation Products, and Merit Industries. We are submitting proposals to the three major shuffleboard manufacturers, American International, Dynamo, and Playfair in an effort to try and secure the same type of support for the N.A.S.L.<sup> $\infty$ </sup>. We are asking for their collective backing, which will include participation by all three companies in the North American Championships. Stay tuned to The Board Talk for the results of these efforts.

One of our goals for the N.A.S.L.™ is a national league championship for member leagues, hopefully for 1994. The Team Event at North American Championships will eventually become the League Championship Tournament.

The key for the continued growth of shuffleboard is leagues and team work. Support from the shuffleboard manufacturers is very important, but equally important is unity among the players in the shuffleboard community. There are enough shuffleboard players to attract sponsorship dollars to our sport, but only if we all work together.

Players tend to forget that the shuffleboard community is not limited to places that run tournaments and appear in The Board Talk. Shuffleboard is played in all fifty states as well as a number of foreign countries. According to an industry survey, shuffleboards and shuffle alleys, took in more than 17,000,000.00 (that's right 17 million dollars) in quarters last year. The shuffleboard community will find that they have a lot of clout if we can all work together.

Joining the N.A.S.L.<sup> $\mathbb{N}$ </sup> gives you an opportunity to be part of the future. You need to decide if you are happy and/or satisfied that shuffleboard players sit on the side lines while other tavern games enjoy the benefits that sponsorship bring, or whether you are going to help secure that type of long overdue recognition for shuffleboard.

Articles we have recently written about leagues have mentioned the frames format for league play. This has not been a very popular idea as of yet, but we believe that it will grow in popularity as people become familiar with it and see some of the benefits.

It is important to mention once again that leagues which are members of the N.A.S.L.<sup> $\square$ </sup> make their own decisions regarding what format they use. Although there are some leagues that like the idea of the frames, you do not have to use that format in order to join the N.A.S.L.<sup> $\square$ </sup> family.

In fact, although the electronic darts manufacturers provide joint support of the NDA, each of them is also involved in their own tournaments and league programs. In other words, the shuffleboard community can take advantage of the benefits that team work will provide our sport, while still maintaining their individuality.

The bottom line is that the success of the N.A.S.L.<sup> $\square$ </sup> will benefit everyone associated with the game - from the manufacturers right down to the average player - help us to help you.
