"There is one rule that we have at this tournament that we would like to let everyone know about," says tournament director Fritzi Broka. "If you are using your own weights, you do not have to let the opposing team use your other four weights. You paid for your weights, so why would you want to let someone else wear them out?"

AN UPDATE ON THE NORTH AMERICAN CHAMPIONSHIPS™

With thirteen events on the schedule, there has been some confusion as to who is eligible for what. Here's a breakdown:

There are singles and doubles events for amateurs and pros.

All players are given a rating between "-1" & "5", which determines what events they are eligible for. Pros are rated -1 and amateurs are rated "0" through "5".

Division I is for players with a rating of "0" or "1", no pros allowed.

Division II/III is for players with a rating of "2" through "5", no pros or Division I players allowed.

Amateur players are rated as follows:

THE TOP 5% OF ALL AMATEUR PLAYERS ARE RATED "O" THE NEXT 15% OF ALL AMATEUR PLAYERS ARE RATED "1" THE NEXT 20% OF ALL AMATEUR PLAYERS ARE RATED "2" THE NEXT 20% OF ALL AMATEUR PLAYERS ARE RATED "3" THE NEXT 20% OF ALL AMATEUR PLAYERS ARE RATED "4" THE BOTTOM 20% OF ALL AMATEUR PLAYERS ARE RATED "5"

Pro players are eligible for: A - B Draw, Pro Singles, Pro Doubles and DEUCES WILD $^{\mathbb{M}}$ Draw.

Division I players are eligible for: A - B Draw, Division I Singles, Division I Doubles, DEUCES WILD[™] Draw, and the N.A.S.L.[™] Team Event.

Division II/III players are eligible for: A - B Draw, Division II/III Singles, Division II/III Doubles, DEUCES WILD^M Draw, and the N.A.S.L.^M Team Event.

By popular demand, because our tournament participants feel strongly that they should have the chance to play against better competition if they so desire, we are going to make a change in policy for our upcoming tournament in Reno.

This year, for the first time, players can to jump to a higher division for singles events. For doubles events, Division I and Division II/III players can play together but would have to play in Division I. Pros can partner up with Division I players in the Pro Doubles.

DEUCES WILD™

Our new game makes it's debut in Reno, and we are very happy with the response so far. Although details on how to play DEUCES WILD^M have not yet been released, every registration form we have received so far has included a DEUCES WILD^M entry.

Our original plan was to wait until the tournament to tell everybody how the game is played. Upon further consideration we have decided to release that information early.

When a player sends in a registration form, we send them a written confirmation of the events they are entered in. Beginning August 13, all confirmation letters will include an explanation of how to play DEUCES WILD^M. People who were sent confirmation letters prior to that date will be mailed the DEUCES WILD^M information separately. That information will also appear in the next issue of The Board Talk.

\$5,000 PRO TEAM CHALLENGE

We have been informed that a team from west of the Rockies has accepted the challenge from a team east of the Rockies to play a best five out of nine match for \$5,000 (see enclosed flyer). The match takes place on Wednesday, November 10. Many of the people who call to ask questions about the Reno tourney have asked about this match so it should be a real crowd pleaser.

Joe Muniz, of the P.C.S.A., told us that they are going to give the losers a chance to challenge the winners in a rematch to be played at their 1994 tournament. They feel as we do, that this is good for the game. We hope everyone reading this goes to both tournaments to watch the action.

GOING FOR A SELLOUT

Based on the way entries are coming in, we are very optimistic about our chances of filling up the tournament. Although we are used to selling out the singles, doubles and draw partner events, the record for the N.A.S.L.^M Team Event is twenty four teams. This year our goal is to surpass that number and fill the Team Event with thirty two teams.

As you probably know, the Sands Regency, which is hosting the tournament for the third year in a row, is adding \$7,500 to the prize money, <u>guaranteed</u>. If we fill the Team Event, they will add an additional \$10,000, for a total of \$17,500. Here's a breakdown of the added money if that happens:
