I still remember that feeling of awe standing at the opposite end of the board, as his partner, when he shot. Mickey's dream was to shoot against Darrol Nelson and Diana Hagen in a mixed doubles tourney. Hc considered them the best.

Anyone who ever mick Mick will never forget him. We all know that he is "Up There" with Art (Ware) and Scratch (Todd) playing shuffleboard with the "Big Man," yelling, ""Father, Son and Holy Spirit to the baseline."



Q.: How come it takes so long for my Board Talk to get delivered, sometimes as long as three weeks?

A.: It's because of our bulk rate permit, which allows us an affordable rate, and the Post Office to take longer to deliver. With bulk rate mailings, if the mail carriers have a heavy load one day, they can let it sit in the Post Office until the next day, or even the next. If we went to a different rate, we would have to charge you more for your subscription, something we have tried hard to avoid. For example, if we went first-class, the last issue would cost us over \$1 to send that single issue -- and that wouldn't include the printing and other expenses.

Q.: The results of my tournament were only a few days after your 15th deadline. Why wasn't it included in that issue?

A.: After we "close" on the 15th of each month, we still have to set the late copy, get it to the printer, and allow him a week's turnaround time. There's still the stuffing, stapling, addressing, and bagging to do before it's on its way to subscribers. There are oftentimes information in that issue that needs to get to subscribers in a timely manner. Any time we hold up an issue to report results of a tournament, that means an upcoming tournament pays the price, which is not fair. As we've said many times before, the best policy is to report the results of your tournament as soon as possible after it happens, and to promote your upcoming events well in advance.

Q: I sent my renewal in response to my red check, and yet I got another in this most recent issue. Why?

A.: That happens many times because your renewal

was received after we had mailed the latest issue, which we explained can take up to three weeks to deliver. As long as you know you sent in your renewal, just ignore that red check -- we will!

Q.: How come you didn't print the photos I sent with my tournament report?

A.: Mostly because they would have been just a big, black blob! And who wants that? Not you; not us! We met with our printer recently to talk about that very issue and here are some tips:

(1) Polaroids, unless they are unusually sharp, just don't make it!

(2) Use a light background when taking photos;

(3) Red drives the photo reproducer wild! If your winner is wearing a red shirt, drap a white cloth over him/her.

We're just as guilty as you are. Here are some examples from our Houghton Lake tournament.

Our first mistake was trying to get more than we should have in one picture; i.e. the banner, as well as the hosts. Consequently, Carol and Skip are too small; the red door makes for a black blob.





Because Bobby and Chuck are against a white background, they come out sharp and clear...



.....While winners Bjerne, John and Jeff are victims of the "black blob" because even though the photos are taken in the same location, the background is dark and they're wearing red shirts.

We hope these helpful hints will be useful to you; they certainly will to us!

It costs the same amount of money to print a good photo as it does to print one where you can barely distinguish who the subjects are. We're going to be a bit "pickier" about the photos we print in the future. So, if we don't use the ones you send us, it's because they just wouldn't reproduce well -- or we've simply run out of room, which happens occasionally.

We were surprised -- and delighted -- to have some unexpected visitors drop in recently: Fritzi Broka and Chris Danke from Indiana! Fritzi got a chance to see the beautiful hand-tooled leather clock she gave us proudly displayed on our kitchen wall and Chris is looking like Hoosier Country suits her well:

We received a number of phone calls (as we're sure Steve Hart, director of the Indiana Open, did as well) regarding whether the Michigan Open was, indeed, open only to Michigan residents. The answer from both Steve and us was a firm "yes." The reason we're encouraging these types of state events is that we hope that someday, every state in our network will do the same, and then we can have a real national playoff. Unless we keep those state events "pure," that won't happen.

These state championship events are not to be confused with others which have the word "Open" as part of their titles (i.e.: the Florida Open, scheduled for March 24-25). The difference is those events are clearly promoted as being "open" to everyone, not just those within their state. There's a difference; keep that in mind and don't make a tournament director of a strictly state event uncomfortable by having to turn you away.


Nelson/Buhl Do It Again at Shamrock!




