Shuffleboard's "Big Man" is Gone

Our big man, Walter W. "Scratch" Todd succumbed to a heart attack on Dec. 16 at 57 years of age. For those of you who had the privilege of knowing Scratch here on the East Coast as well as those of you who met him at some of the national tournaments in the Midwest and Nevada, you will remember Scratch as the big man with a lot of inches and pounds, for he nearly was a giant physically.

The World of Shuffleboard knew him as one of the better players, winning more than his share as a competitor, captain of the first-place Greenwood Tavern team in the Eastern Shore Shuffleboard League, previous officer of two leagues, and contributor to league committees and as a director of many fine tournaments -- the last of which he directed the weekend before his death at the Harrington (Delaware) Moose Lodge. We will remember him for all of this.

But that is not why Scratch was a big man. As one regular shuffler said, "Scratch was always big enough to bend down to help anbody -- no matter with what -but always to help another player or human being." Always willing with a suggestion, never said no -maybe "I don't think so," but never "no."

One of the many trophies Scratch collected during his illustrious shuffleboard career was this one at the 7th Annual-Board Talk Shufflers' Reunion in Kulpsville, Pa., over the 4th of July weekend in 1991.

I, like Scratch, ran a few tournaments -- and we didn't always agree on everything. But he never said, "that's not the way to do it;" he always said, "that is another way to do it." When I had what I thought were some tough calls (or vice versa) on an event that may have happened at a tournament and it called for an on-the-spot decision, I often went to Scratch for his counsel because I respected his opinion highly. Scratch was undoubtedly one of the finest gentlemen in the sport, possessing the qualities of equality, fairness, honesty and respect -- always. He brought the quality of integrity to our game which we all know we need.

We, friends of shuffleboard, say thanks for having known Scratch Todd and so long and God be with you.

Scratch participated in several of our Board Talk Shufflers' Reunion Tournaments (see photo), but the one we remember the most vividly was the 6th annual in 1990. An unprecedented 120 players turned out for this event held at Skip's Lounge and Northway Lanes in Houghton Lake, Michigan. Back and forth across the busy intersection the players trooped between the two locations all weekend long with hardly a word of complaint, even though they may have just ordered a drink -- certainly no complaints from Scratch. We believe he made friends with every one of those 120 players. His great sportsmanship and gentle nature made him a winner on and off the boards. That year, he tied for 7th and 8th in a field of 44 contenders in the men's singles, and his team of Judy Iseman, JoAnn Ware and Len Dell took third in the fourperson team event. We're sure his team mates will file that weekend along with many other fond memories shared with this "gentle giant."

Now that you have the use of the hoist, you unload the truck and in order to take the hoist up, you have to turn the boards on edge to get them from the hoist into the building, down the hallway on edge into the set-up room. You have six or eight guys putting out a lot of very hard labor.

Now that everything is over and everyone has gone back home, you and I and the other workers can go to work taking everything down that one outside hoist. At the Aladdin, if you looked at the south end of the building where the boards are, you can see a 20-foot door. We pull the truck up the ramp and inside the building, unload onto the dolly and take them anyplace in the room.

In 1993, it was raining so when we were loading (my trailer and A.Z.'s), it was nice to be able to load and tie down and cover the load without getting wet. You might not know it was raining. You (and others) were home, on your way home, or in your outhouse sleeping.

It would be nice if people would show just a little consideration for what others go through to set up all the boards for them to enjoy.

Von and I were very happy with our rooms in both Las Vegas and Reno.
