For the past 10 years, it has been our privilege to cover a lot of shuffleboard action. Most of those tournaments haven't been as "glamorous" as the one we just returned from -- the PCSA's Extravaganza VI in Las Vegas -- but each has been unique whether the facility was a swanky casino or a modest neighborhood bar. The one common denominator has been the great people who make up The World of Shuffleboard and each time we go home with a new appreciation for them.

In Vol. 1, No. 2 of *The Board Talk* in February of 1984, we had a feature on "Women in Shuffleboard -- From Sidelines to Center Stage" with interviews from a mixed doubles tournament at the Wagon Wheel in Lake Orion, Michigan (Cheryl Collins and John McDermott were the winners). One of the interviewees for that feature was 81-year-old Elsia Lile who was playing in her first tournament and said that she loved the game because of the people -- and because it was good therapy for her arthritis.

And in that same issue, we reported that Darrol Nelson of Oregon had won the "first official world championship shuffleboard tournament" at the Showboat in Las Vegas. We well remember that first Vegas tournament, organized by Billy Mays and the U.S.S.A. We were operating on a very thin shoestring, with no subscribers and no advertisers at that point in time. The trip took all of our savings and we had no quarters for the slots once we got there! But we felt an "obligation" to be there to accompany our Michigan shuffler, Lee McDonald, who had won his entry in the "world championship" at A.J.'s Saloon in Pontiac the month before (our intent then was to be a state publication). Had we known that Lee was terrified of flying and would sit on George's lap all the way there, we may have saved the price of a seat!

We thought Lee would be a "shoo-in," but even though he beat shuffleboard legend Billy Mays, he didn't place. Second-place honors went to Ed Graves (Portland Eddy) of Oklahoma, with Doug Buhl of Washington in third, and K.D. (Mac the Greek) Makarounis of Oregon in fourth. We were awed by the skill displayed by these winners. Little did we know then that we would still be awed by some of the same players 10 years later!

NORTH AMERICAN SHUFFLEBOARD CHAMPIONSHIPS

July 25-31, 1994

Sands Regency Hotel Casino, Reno, Nevada

If the early reaction to the new dates for the North American Championships is any inication, this year's tournament should be by far the biggest we have ever had. On behalf of our sponsors, American International Shuffleboard and the Sands Regency Hotel Casino, we want to thank those who attended last year's tournament and welcome the new participants who will be coming this year.

Along with the traditionally strong amateur turnout, we anticipate a very good showing for the pro events. The number of pros coming to Reno has been increasing, and therefore, we will be adding money to the pro singles and pro doubles.

Changing the dates to the end of July put our tournament and the PCSA Extravaganza, which is held the first week of February, almost exactly six months apart. This should be good for both tournaments. Some exciting changes will be featured at the 1994 North American Championships, including a complete overhaul of the format for the N.A.S.L. Team Event.

Our goal in using a rating system for team competition was to provide a format that would give every team a chance to win. We had no idea how difficult, not to mention controversial that would turn out to be. Teams that came to the tournament usually felt their team was rated too tough, and the rest of the teams were rated too easy. Also, other players did not come at all because the team they wanted to bring did not qualify under the handicap guidelines. Many people think that everybody should just bring their best team and go for it. Well, that is exactly how we are going to do it.

However, the past success of the Reno tournament has been the result of the large number of average players who filled the Division II/III events, as well as representing the majority of players in the N.A.S.L. Team Event. So the changes we are making will not come at their expense.

As our past participants know, we put out comment forms during the tournament. We take the suggestions on them very seriously and our decisions reflect that. The consensus among Division II/III players is that they would like to have their own team event and, therefore, they are going to get it. Also, because the largest number of singles and doubles have been in the Division II/III events, they will have the highest limit on the number of players for singles and doubles.

Here is a quick outline of how the N.A.S.L. Team Events will work. Both will use six-person teams, with at least two ladies (but not more than four) per team, and play best five out of nine using the popular three-board format. For Division I, you can bring anyone you want who is not a pro. For Division II/III, no pros or Division I players allowed; other than that, bring whomever you want.

DUECES WILD, a definite crowd-pleaser last year, will be back, with a small change based on feedback from last year's participants. The four-person teams will still be determined by random draw, but all the pros and Division I players will be distributed evenly among the teams. Ideally, each team will end up with one pro, one Division I player, and two Division II/III players.

The flyers for the tournament were not ready by the deadline for this issue but will be in the April issue of *The Board Talk* and have been sent directly to all past participants and N.A.S.L. members.

If you have never been to the Reno tourney but are thinking about coming, we guarantee you a very well-run tournament in an excellent hotel. Anyone who has been to the tournament before will verify that. 



players!) was the Acme Tavern of Washington -- Rosa White, Earl Cole, Bob Shirley, Steve Kalamanski, Doug DeBois, Michelle Foran, Dick Heflin, Billy Powell and Chris Danke. (Check out the list of winners! Did we choose the right state for our 10th Annual Board Talk Shufflers' Reunion?)


The Oklahoma Friends, who lost to the 50/50 team from Michigan, Ohio and Indiana last year, finished second again this year. 

Frisco Eddie's Revenge: The Return

(Editor's Note: In the November, December 1993 and January 1944 issues, we reprinted Balboa Ron's short stories about a shuffler named Frisco Eddie, originally published in The Board Talk back in 1985. In February, we were pleased to continue that series with "The Return." Last month, Eddie had just met Long Beach Lil, who had challenged him to a game....)

Eddie had lost the toss (his mind was so messed up he called "tails" instead of "heads"), and he tested-out his lag on the first shot with a left cross. It was a deep duece. Lil kind-of smiled, and then stuck it with a perfect left-hand "jersey" shot. She knew that if she followed her oppenents' shots, shooting the same shot they did, and "sticking" for a few frames, they'd soon get the notion that she could do everything THEY could -- and more. This proved to be the case here, and as Eddie looked into those steel-blue eyes, they were telling him somethingsomething he wasn't really sure he wanted to know.


After a few frames, Eddie saw Lil shoot everything in the book -- the jersey, the "expanded-thumb," and the freehand, to name a few. She was cold and calculating as she worked the board. She was silent then, letting her weights do the talking. Her concentration put Eddie on edge a little, and he even blew a couple of weights. Lil kind-of smirked at him then. It was as though she had called his shots for him.

The crowd had gathered now to watch the action. This put Eddie even a little more on edge because he was down. Lil kept the pressure on and the score was now 14 to 12 -- her favor, and Eddie's hammer. On her last shot, she placed her weight almost mid-board and centered. This essentially blocked Eddie's left and right cross lags. Eddie's mind was racing a mile-a-minute now. He was thinking, "Oh, man! This is a WOMAN I'm playing here; this is a nightmare!"

Eddie sprinkled some wax on the board as he planned his strategy. When he decided on his final shot, he took his No. 4 weight in his right hand, bent down to size up the board one more time -- and let it go! 




