The Hammer

Nothing creates more agony for us than to accept advertising dollars to promote a tournament that is "borderline" in terms of reaching the target audience before it happens. Too many promoters believe that if a tournament is scheduled for April, notice in that issue is soon enough.

Not always so! With our bulk mailing permit, it can take two, three, sometimes even four weeks to deliver. And, even though we're paying much more to deliver each newsletter today than we did 10 years ago, there's not a darn thing we can do to speed up that delivery.

Some subscribers say: "I'm willing to pay first-class to get it sooner." Nice thought, but not possible. Why? The March issue sent first class cost 87 cents, compared to the \$.233 we pay for bulk rate. The April issue, because it weighed more, cost us \$1.16 to mail first-class. We don't know from issue to issue what the number of pages and inserts will be. If the "average" was 20 pages and five inserts, the postage cost alone would be \$14 per year and that wouldn't cover the printing and other expenses involved. Going first-class would put us out of business in about two months.

So, what's the alternative? First -- plan ahead! Six months or more, put your event on the calendar (that doesn't cost you a cent!). Three months in advance of your event, place your advertising flyer or space. This is particularly important for those who encourage advance registration. Note the past several issues. The Shuffleboard Federation's North American Championships and the Whistling Oyster Grand Masters Plus/Board Talk Reunion (and PCSA before them) had flyers well in advance of their events. They've found that pays off (and necessary) to gain the greatest participation.

We don't expect some of your events to be advertised in every issue six months in advance like those major events. However, we strongly advise that your flyer be placed at least two to three months in advance to ensure that your target audience is reached in a timely fashion.

What else can you do? Your Board Talk, in the bulk rate category, is considered "junk mail," a lot of which you wouldn't care if your mail carrier delivered. Tell him or her that you do care about receiving this publication. (continued on Page 6)



Saturday morning's women's singles presented a new dilemma -- about an even split between veteran former winners and a group of relatively inexperienced tournament players (most never before). The Shuffleboard Federation is donating an award that will be presented by his peers in an induction ceremony in Reno, at the 1994 North American Championships. Any players who know Bob and would like to participate in the presentation are welcome. We sincerely hope Bob is willing and able to receive his award in person. If he cannot, or does not wish to, the presentation will be video taped and sent to him.

Porter White and Hal Perry offered their help and support in organizing this and we're sure other friends of Bob would like to participate.

Hal also suggested that there should be a committee established to induct new members on an annual basis.

We strongly believe such a committee should be established, and that it should be completely independent of The Shuffleboard Federation or any other organization.

A Hall of Fame belongs to the game it honors and we feel it would not be proper for us to serve on such a committee or participate in the selection process.

If this committee becomes a reality, we would certainly lend assistance if asked. Furthermore, we would hope that all members of the shuffleboard community would support it as well.





Frisco Eddie's Revenge: The Return

A series by Balboa Ron Schweikert Las Vegas, Nevada

(Editor's Note: In the November, December 1993 and January 1944 issues, we reprinted Balboa Ron's short stories about a shuffler named Frisco Eddie, originally published in The Board Talk back in 1985. In February, we were pleased to continue that series with "The Return." Last month, Eddie's girlfriend, Shelli, showed up just after he had been beaten by Long Beach Lil.)

When Eddie turned to face his girlfriend Shelli, she had said, "What are we getting into here, Eddie?" Lil was standing by his side, and he said, "This is what we're getting into here, Honey," as he placed a \$100 bill into Lil's waiting hand. Then he gave her a hug and said, "Honey, this here is Lil; Lil, this is my gal Shelli." The two didn't shake -- as Lil kept the money in her right hand. The stares they gave each other were less than friendly.

Eddie broke the ice by saying: "Lil here thinks she can beat me at this game," as he gave Lil a snide look. Shelli countered with, "It looks like she just did a pretty good job of it, 'Slick." Eddie smiled at her and then led her to a seat. He told her, "I'll tear her up before this thing is over -- you just check it out." "I really want to believe that, Eddie," was her reply.

Eddie's confidence level went up a little now that Shelli was there. He won the next two games, but Lil came back and won the next one. They began to trade games on into the night. Finally (after it looked like the quarter-drop was going to be the only real winner), Lil said to Eddie, "It looks like we're not getting anywhere here. Could we all sit down and have a drink....and talk about what I REALLY came here for, Eddie?" Eddie said, "Well, O.K., I guess -- if that's what YOU want (he was kind of relieved actually; but he felt he could have outshot her if they had continued).

Eddie motioned to Bob, the owner of the Blue Moon, and he joined Eddie, Shelli, and Lil at a table. The shift had changed and Bob ordered a round of drinks. Bob was an old-timer. He had seen a lot of the big-time "hustlers" come and go, and he also had a lot of first-hand knowledge about the history of the game. Lil knew many of the players (and old stories also) and before she had a chance to get to her point with Eddie, Bob began to weave some tales about the "good old days" of shuffleboard. The area around their table quieted down as Bob began to tell some classic stories about the time the "East" met the "West" back in the early '50s. The main characters were a fellow called "L.A. Larry" and a man out of New Jersey whose handle was "Kid Spooks."

Bob began his saga: "Now, Kid Spooks' first appearance of note in the West was in 1950, at a place called the Stage 10 in Hollywood. At that time, you know, and during a period starting during World War II, shuffleboard was very big among the movie stars in and around the Hollywood area. In fact, many of the stars had private boards in their homes. You see, Spooks was a man of high standing -- and also the one who originated the 'Jersey' style of shooting. Of course, it's called that because that's where he was from. On this occasion, Spooks was waiting for an opponent in the bar. It was a Halloween night, and when the stage was set, in walked a man in full costume!. He called himself the 'Masked


I would like to say one thing about the Hall of Fame. I sure would hate to see anyone's name ahead of Bob's. To me, he was the #1 player!


