
The Hammer



As we prepared for our retirement from our regular jobs and looked forward to spending fulltime on *The Board Talk*, it seemed like a good time to clean the office. That meant methodically filing in three-ring binders all our previous issues since Vol. 1, No. 1, dated January 1984. We couldn't help . compare that issue with Vol. 11, No. 10.

In that first issue, we had three tournaments listed on the Upcoming Events; last month, we had 34! That calendar of events was first published to serve as kind of a "clearing house," so tournament directors wouldn't be competing against each other. It still serves that purpose and we encourage you to list your event well in advance. While we've found, over the years, that The World of Shuffleboard can, and will, support several events in several parts of the country on the same dates, scheduling tournaments at the same time of others in your vicinity can dilute your participation. While we certainly encourage tournament sites to advertise their events via ads and flyers, it does not cost a cent to appear on the calendar. We must receive the information by the 15th of the month to appear in the following month's calendar.

In our first Shuffleboard Directory, we had eight businesses listed (and to most of those we gave the space just to get it going), and in last month's issue, we had 14 *paying* listings. From phone calls we've received this month, it appears that we may have to expand that full page Directory! For those of you who may be considering this avenue to promote your shuffleboard support, it only costs \$100 a year (12 months listing) for a single space and \$150 for a double space.

In August of 1985, we published our first contribution from "Balboa Ron" Schweikert of Las Vegas about Frisco Eddie and his dreams of being a force to be reckoned with on boards across the country. Eddie was a janitor at the Blue Moon Lounge then and couldn't even make the establishment's league team. But he had his dreams and today, Eddie is all grown up, a partner in the Blue Moon, and has an invitation from Long Beach Lil to go "on the road" with her.

We appreciate Ron's unpaid contributions of both the Frisco Eddie series and his cartoons. When you see him at the PCSA Extravaganza in Las Vegas, please tell him YOU appreciate them, too!

In February of 1986, we published our first "Play Your Way Across the U.S.A." listing of shuffleboard sites that were subscribers. There were 13 states represented by 38 locations in a modest half-page listing. In this issue, we have a special 4-page pullout section for travelling shufflers that gives them information on hundreds of shuffleboard locations in 20 states, plus Canada!

Is your favorite shuffleboard site on this listing? If not, why not? What does it cost? A \$15 a year subscription gives them a FREE listing four times a year -- a pretty small investment for the business it brings in!

You'll note in this issue that we have two states --Indiana and Michigan -- that hold their own state championship tournaments. We encourage other states to do the same. If they did, then the winners of the state tournaments could meet head to head in a national tournament. We think that's a step in the right direction. Think about it, and get something going in your state!

Christmas is just around the corner and if you're agonizing over what to get your favorite shufflers, how about a subscription to *The Board Talk*? We'll send appropriate Christmas greetings along with their first issue, indicating it's from you! It's a gift they'll enjoy all year long....

And -- if you're tired of addressing, signing, stuffing, and paying postage on all the Christmas cards you send to your shuffler friends, consider buying an ad in *The Board Talk* to deliver Holiday Greetings to them all. 
From Friday through Monday, the remaining events, played on nine boards, began assuring everything that a great tournament was certain.

As a player, Mickey had few, if any, equals. For over 40 years, he devoted himself to the game of shuffleboard, and for those 40 years plus, his name was synonymous with shuffleboard.




