The Hammer

How come *MY* tournament never makes the front page? We get that question often, and we're going to finally give you the answer....

First, let us assure you that prime placement is not according to the size or "importance" of a tournament (who are we to determine if one tournament is more important than another?).

As soon as we go to press with one issue, we start working on the next one. That's the way it goes in the world of publishing and deadlines are a must; otherwise, we'd never get to press! We set the copy in the order we receive the reports. If we receive more than one in a day, we go according to the dates the events occurred.

We always get a few reports that come in after we've "closed." They go into a file for the next month, again in the order they're received. This month's front page Tourney Talk tournament is a good example. The results of the North American Championships came in time for the September issue; the photos arrived the day after we had gone to press. That put them first in line for the October issue. While we strongly urge that photos are sent along with reports, there were an extraordinary number of "new faces" in the winner's circle of this particular event and we know a lot of those winners were just waiting to see their photos (some sent their subscriptions in to make sure they got that issue to show family and friends they were "in the news.").

The best "rule of thumb" is to send your results in as soon as possible after your event. You tournament directors/sponsors/reporters just can't believe what it means to participants to see their names and/or photos published. Don't disappoint them! It's to your benefit because they're likely to try for "national exposure" again and be at your next event.

Actually, prime placement in *The Board Talk* is no big deal. Readers tell us they read it from cover to cover and what's on Page 20 or 24 is just as important to them as what's on Page 1 or anywhere in between.

When we look back at our initial 4-pager, when we didn't have any "in between," that makes us realize how far we've come, thanks to you!



Bobby Williams (right) of Texas took top honors in the Division I Singles.





News and Views from The World of Shuffleboard

A Salute to John; A Reminder of Shuffler Responsibilities; -- and Another Great Idea from Louise Freer

It was with pleasure that I read John McDermott's recent editorial (July 1994 Shuffleboard Federation column) about giving shuffleboard lessons on a weekly basis to new shooters. My hat is off to you, John, for taking the time to share your hard-won knowledge and experience with others. Perhaps their road to greatness will be a little bit shorter than yours.

It was also good to see this in print -- it serves as a reminder to all of us that each of us can and should play a part in the growth of shuffleboard. By teaching other people to play, we can assure the future of shuffleboard.

Many players don't feel that way. "Don't show anybody what you know because then they'll beat you" is what I have often heard. When this attitude is the rule, rather than the exception, shuffleboard players' numbers are bound to diminish rather than increase.

Thankfully, it is clear that many people do not feel that way. They are quietly, without fanfare, doing their part in helping other people learn to play and love the game.

It was uncharacteristic of John McDermott to give himself what may have appeared to be a public "pat on the back." Instead, John was being his usual diplomatic self by presenting a subtle reminder to the great players of this game that success has certain responsibilities that cannot be ignored if there is to be a future in shuffleboard. The message, however, is to all of us. Thanks for the reminder, John.

Wouldn't it be great to read about some of those "unsung heroes" -- the people who have taken the time to give the gift of their knowledge as well as their time to up and coming shooters? I suggest starting a column, sort of a "Mentor Mugshots" column, where we

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could all write in and tell about the person who had the most influence on us and why. If there is a picture of you (the player and the "mentor"), all the better! Please send them to me at my home address (189 Barry Ave., Lansdale, PA 19446) so I can organize and prepare the information for George and Donna to publish. Let's give these people some well-deserved praise.

Thank you, Louise, for recognizing the message that John is attempting to deliver -- that all pros like him have a responsibility to teach others if the game is to survive. If they do not, the sport will surely go the route it did in the '50s, when it almost "died." We are confident that there is a much broader recognition of that responsibility today than there was back then. In anticipation that one day soon we can write the history of shuffleboard, we interviewed some up-and-coming young players during our Washington trip who are certain to make their mark in The World of Shuffleboard, and each of them credits some idol, mentor, someone they respected and wanted to emulate, for helping them reach their current level of competiveness.

And that responsibility goes beyond our limited ranks of pros; it extends to every -- what shall we call them -- "established player" who knows the game. There are a lot more of those than there are "pros," and they must not forget the influence they can wield on the future of shuffleboard. We salute all those tournament directors who have pro/am and other events that offer the opportunity for beginners to play with veterans. What those beginners learn from those experiences is immeasurable and the experience is unforgettable.

We love your idea for a "Mentor Mugshuts" column and thank you for offering to author it. We encourage shufflers to respond to your invitation to give recognition to their "teacher."

We salute you, Louise, for taking a leadership role in keeping the sport of shuffleboard alive and well!

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


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
In Memoriam

Sept. 16, 1994 -- As we were wrapping up this issue of *The Board Talk*, we received a call from our friend, Bill Lally of Pennsylvania, with the news that another good friend, Mickey Mickens of New Jersey, had passed away. We join others in The World of Shuffleboard who pay tribute to a legendary player who helped write the history of shuffleboard.

When we first met Mickey, we'd already heard a lot of stories about his escapades, but he didn't immediately make our list of favorites. He was a bit boisterous and unorthodox (when he pounded his weight on the newly-refinished board in Howell, Michigan, at our Board Talk Shufflers' Reunion, George nearly had a stroke!). But, once we got to know him, we found him to be a sensitive person, totally devoted to the sport of shuffleboard and to his wife and family. He was past his "prime" by then, but as one of the original "hustlers" of the '50s and '60s, he had many stories to tell that we wish we had an opportunity to record. He literally spanned the generations of shuffleboard and even though he had suffered from ill health the past few years, he never gave up. Indeed, he was playing in a local tournament when he was stricken for the last time.

By the time you receive this issue, Mickey's funeral will already have been held. But it's not too late to let his wife Claire know that you care. Send your messages of sympathy to:





A Bit of History....

It all started with the resounding success of the 6th Annual Board Talk Shufflers' Reunion Tournament in 1990, held at Skip's Lounge and the Northway Lounge in Houghton Lake, Michigan. Despite the fact that shufflers had to shuffle across the M-55/US 27 intersection throughout the long weekend, they liked the area and they liked the hospitality of Skip's Lounge. While the Board Talk Reunion grew beyond the boundaries of the state of Michigan, so did the demand for a return to Houghton Lake.

In response to that demand, George and Donna from *The Board Talk* and Skip and Carole of Skip's Lounge decided to stage an annual tournament in that popular location. They set an objective: it would be an opportunity for lesser experienced players to draw pros and more experienced players in a draw partner event, along with an open singles. For four years, that format has met that objective with new faces in the winners' circle every year:

1991: 15 teams in the draw; 16 in the singles. Winners of the draw -- Tom Meagher and Betty Parrish (which is the pro?); 2nd, pro Cheryl Collins and Paul Oster; 3rd, pro Gordie Collins and our bracketeer Rob Kern. Gordie Collins won the singles title, with Sonny Morgan in second and Bjerne Sunde in third.

1992: There were 50 players in the draw and 25 in the singles, vying for a pot of \$6540. Tournament host Skip Sliwa and partner Frank Parrish took first with Frank's dad, Slick, and his partner, Bjerne Sunde in second. J.R. Lopez of Lansing and local Jerry Cooley took third, with Houghton Laker Mike Kunik and Jackie Dunn in fourth. In his first "fly-in" from Indianapolis, Larry Creakbaum beat out local favorite Jim Podeski for first place in the singles. J.R. Lopez finished third, with John Myles in fourth place.

1993: There were 74 players in the draw and 24 in the singles, with a total pot of \$10,222. Pro Jim Long drew Norm Brown to take first place in the draw, with Ken Gay and Jim Rodgers in second; Bert Lowe and Eugene McLeod in third; and Chuck Marsh and Mark Holland in fourth. The Red Baron, Larry Creakbaum, successfully defended his singles title with John McDermott in second; Jim Long in third; Jeff Cottrell in fourth; Steve Blue and Dave Boaz, fifth and sixth.

1994: It seemed to bookkeeper Donna Wilber and



bracketeer Rob Kern that the 70 people who lined up to sign up for the draw partners had to be a record, but not so, according to last year's account. The singles sign-up, at 30, was a new record, and so was the total pot of \$10,165 for the weekend.

When we looked at our objective of teaming up pros with amateurs, and matched that with the involvement of pros during this past tournament and those before it, it's worthy of some recognition. From the very first tournament, when professional Cheryl Collins literally took a local Houghton Lake player out of the fields to first place, to our last tournament when those we determined were our top 12 players willingly nurtured amateurs to take them to new heights, that objective was reached.

A special salute to John Tischler, Larry Creakbaum, Jim Long, J.R. Lopez, Bjerne Sunde, Chris Passariello, and Dave Boaz, pros who have been part of this program since the beginning. And to pros new to this scene this year: Buddy Broka, Steve Wilson, Chris Danke, Steve Hart, and Bobby Voorhis. These people know, when they sign up, that they might draw a beginning shuffler who will not help them win the "big money." Yet, they take the time and the care to counsel, guide, direct, teach...and we salute them for this investment in the future of shuffleboard.




