Despite the disappointing turnout, those who did attend had a great time and we want to thank them for their support, especially the firsttime participants.

We very much appreciate the support of the three companies that supplied shuffleboard tables for the event: American International Shuffleboard, Gametime Corporation, and Bill Melton Shuffleboard Company. We also want to recognize and thank those whose efforts helped make the tournament possible. So, on behalf of all the participants, a big heartfelt thank you goes to Mike Melton, Bettye Brantley, Rob and Cassie Kern, Rick Boyer, Billy Melton, Bob Jacobsen, Larry Pearson and David Wells, Also, a big thank you to Lisa Melton for another outstanding job on the trophies.

This format could go a long way toward achieving something that has always been a goal of ours -- putting on an event which every team has a chance to win.

Player feedback regarding this idea so far has been very supportive. It provides an opportunity for players who come by themselves or in small groups to play in the Team Event, and also gives them a chance to play for several days with a top player. Let us know what you think.

Do oysters really whistle? We travelled 2500 miles to Quilcene, Washington, to find out and never did -- for sure. Some of the locals said: "but of course!" Others said, "well, if you listen hard enough," and a few said "nah!" While we were on this research expedition, we enjoyed the 5th Annual Grand Masters Plus/10th Annual Board Talk Shufflers' Reunion Tournament at the Whistling Oyster Tavern -- and what a great event it was, from beginning to end!

We left Lansing, Michigan, about midnight on Wednesday, July 27, drove 20+ hours to Deadwood, South Dakota, where we spent the night. Then, through the awesome (and sometimes intimidating) mountains to Butte, Montana, our next overnight stop. By Friday afternoon, we had crossed the Washington state line, and arrived in Seattle that evening to take the Ferry across Puget Sound to Bremerton. There, we stopped to pay a visit to a new subscriber tavern, the Fuzzy Navel. Owner Patty Stultz was out of town on business, but Debbie gave us directions to nearby Port Orchard, home of a long-time subscriber tavern, the Blue Goose.

A highlight of the North American Championships, held at the Sands Regency Hotel Casino, Reno, Nevada, on July 25-31, was a presentation by The Shuffleboard Federation, honoring Bob Miles as the first inductee in the Shuffleboard Hall of Fame.
