"J & C's Tavern" is not a household word to most people in the Philadelphia area. But to shufflers in Delaware County and West Philly, it is where shuffle-board began. And it is still going strong. At one time, according to Anthony "Conch," there were approximately 40 strong shooters who made up their two league teams.


Currently, there are three generations of shuffle-board shooters who are from J & C's Tavern. There are the ones who have been shooting 15 years and longer, as well as those who have been playing slightly less than 15 years. These shooters have become known as the "dinosaurs." The third generation of shooters are the players who have several years of experience or less. They are known as "the eggs."

Well, the eggs, as eggs are wont to do, challenged the older and wiser (!) dinosaurs to a match to see who would rule the turf. "Dinosaurs will become extinct," predicted the eggs. In turn, the dinosaurs promised to crush the eggs.

So, on Saturday, December 17, 1994, J & C's Tavern was again the site of history in the making with the "Dinosaurs vs. The Eggs" match taking place that evening.



# "DÉTROIT JIM" AND "JIM THE COP" -- ONE AND SAME?

I have had my shuffleboard for a year now and I've been getting *The Board Talk* for a year. I'm glad Al Stewart turned me on to your publication.

Back in 1978, I learned how to play shuffleboard from a character called "California Carl." I used to go to lunch at a place called 10 D's Pub in Port Richey, Florida. It was located on U.S. Highway 19 across the street from a big mall they were building. I think it was called the Suncoast Plaza.

Carl taught me how to shoot and I eventually ended up putting together a pub of my own in Dunedin, Florida, approximately 25 miles south of Port Richey. I liked the game a lot so I found a vendor who had a board and did a 50/50 split with him (boy, those days are gone forever!). About a year after I opened my place, I got a visitor from the north -- California Carl. He said he had heard I was the top dog in this area and he had driven down in his VW bus to "shoot me down."

Walter and son Craig, owners of 10 D's Pub, had been down to my place a couple of times and Craig's younger brother was the Budweiser driver who delivered to my pub, so Carl had a pipeline of information. I think someone had been busting his chops -- you know, "the student can whip the teacher now" type of ribbing.

To say that Carl was full of himself was putting it mildly. Like I said, he was a character. That day I was a lot better than he was and I put a pretty good whippin' on the old man. We even went over to another pub where they had a pool table and played four of five games of pool. He had it in his mind to beat me at something and he knew he wasn't going to do it at shuffleboard. The only problem was, I was a much better pool player than I was a shuffler, so poor old California Carl just had a bad day all around.

About a week or two later, Carl called me up and

asked me if I was going to be around for awhile. I told him to come on down and bring his best game with him because I was shooting 3's at will.

Carl arrived with two strangers in tow, a tall, raw-boned man with an accent from the deep south, and a shorter man called "Detroit Jim." Jim was built stocky, reminded me of Jack Demsey and, boy, could he shoot shuffleboard! I had some really good games with him, but he beat me fair and square on "my" table." I sure knew there were guys like him out there, but he was the first one I'd ever run into who was that good. He really could do it all. It was like watching Mosconi shoot pool. The guy was a magician to me.

I keep seeing and reading about this guy, Jim "The Cop" Kumpula, in your publication and I think he kind of looks like that old magician. Is there any chance you can pass this on to him or find out if he's the same guy? I heard 10 D's Pub was sold and I guess the name was probably changed, too, but I can't believe they don't still shoot board there. It was a senior citizens hangout and shuffleboard was the only game in the house. I've looked in your "Play Your Way Across the U.S.A." for a place in Port Richey, Florida, but none is ever there, nor any mention of one in your paper.

I sure would like to know if the "Detroit Jim" I was run over by is Jim "The Cop" Kumpula.


### Board Talk Reunion/Mickey Mickens Memorial Tourney Set for June 12-18, Harvey's Place, Street, Maryland

Harvey's Place in Street, Maryland, will be the site of the Board Talk's 11th Annual Shufflers Reunion and Mickey Mickens Memorial Tournament on June 12-18. It will be a week of fun, fellowship, and competition on Harvey's six boards for pros, amateurs, and those in between!

The tentative schedule for the week's activities (entry fees large enough to make it worth the trip for pros and small enough to make the experience affordable for non-pros and amateurs) starts with the pro singles on Monday, \$127 entry, and a "second chance" (everyone plays at least three games) draw partners, \$12 entry, for non pros.

On Tuesday, everybody gathered for the Shufflers' Reunion can participate in a "second chance" pro-am draw partner event, \$12 entry.

Wednesday will be an action-packed day with the prodoubles, \$204 per team; the legends doubles (come on out of retirement, guys and gals!), \$12 per person; and a "second chance" draw partner event, \$12 entry, for those who don't qualify for the first two.

Something new on the agenda for Thursday will be a pro singles round robin, \$102 entry, with everybody entered playing everybody else, and total score determining the winner (open to anyone who dares!); a women's singles, \$22 entry; and all other singles, \$22 entry, that don't fit those categories.

Something old, as far as Board Talk Shufflers' Reunions are concerned, is on the schedule for Friday. It's George's dreaded, lots-of-fun 4-person team event, \$58 per team. No more than one pro, at least one woman, and no substitutes. If you haven't tried it -- do so -- you'll like it!

Saturday will be a day of bring partner events -- one for non-pros, another for amateurs (with no sale), and one open competition for pros.

The week will wrap up on Sunday with a draft team event, \$12 per person entry, introduced by Ron Huddleston in Oklahoma and successfully used in other parts of the country. It's a competitive fun event that involves everybody, no matter what their level of expertise!

Events are still tentative, and the entry fees include \$2 for prizes, with no registration or other fees.

As far as lodging is concerned, Harvey is currently negotiating with nearby motels for the best prices for travelling shufflers (watch for announcement next month). For you RV travelers -- no problem. Harvey will provide "rough" camping facilities, which includes dumping station and water (no water hook-ups) FREE of charge on Harvey's farm, right next to Harvey Jr.'s, less than a mile from Harvey's (the tournament will be played on six, maybe seven, boards in both locations).

If you're flying in, Harvey's Place is within 15 minutes of the Baltimore BWI Airport and less than an hour from the Philadelphia International Airport.

As with all previous Shufflers' Reunion tournaments, door prizes will be awarded, courtesy of national and local businesses.

# "The Time is Now"

The shuffleboard community has lost another champion with the passing of Earl Kelly. In 1989, I had the privilege of playing in my only tournament with him, in Springfield, Illinois. Although Earl was steady as usual, I played miserably and we got beat early.

With the exception of that particular tournament, I had been playing very well that year and know that Earl must have expected me to play much better than I did. As disappointed with my shooting performance as Earl had to be, he never showed it. Instead, he flashed his sly grin and shrugged his shoulders as if to say, "hey, it happens." He was a man who earned respect with both his shooting and the way he conducted himself. In the heat of competition, many of us have done or said things we immediately regretted. Earl never did. He was always a gentleman. He will be missed.

The recent losses in the shuffleboard community, as well as the death of my father, have made me particularly aware of that which we all know: Life is precious and our time on earth is relatively brief. Maybe we should all be more aware of that as the subject of a Shuffleboard Hall of Fame continues to receive attention.

Last year, at the urging of many of his peers, Bob Miles was recognized as the recipient of the first of the Hall of Fame awards. It is a shame that Earl Kelly and Mickey Mickens, to mention but a few, did not receive that type of recognition while they were alive.

Unless some lucky shuffleboard player wins the lottery and donates land and a building, there will not be a Hall of Fame in the traditional sense for a number of years. However, the shuffleboard community can and should honor those deserving individuals who have earned the right to be recognized as a member of the Hall of Fame. That show of appreciation and respect is much more important than any Hall of Fame building could ever be.

The fact is, there is an aging generation of great players in our sport who have paid their dues and deserve to be recognized. If we, the shuffleboard community, proscrastinate on this issue and do not pull together to do this, we are dishonoring them as well as ourselves and our sport.

It should be mentioned that the Hall of Fame should also honor people who were not necessarily great players, but have made significant other contributions. The late Art Ware is an excellent example of someone who, as a tavern owner, gave much more than he received from this game. There should certainly be an opportunity for people like him to be recognized as well.

We have long believed that shuffleboard needs and should have a national players' association, in addition to individual state associations. With regular elections for officers and committees to handle issues such as Hall of Fame nominations, rules, scheduling, etc., our sport can make a huge contribution to its own future.

Recent events have substantially improved the possibility of this happening. Congratulations to everyone in Florida who was involved in helping to start a state association. The Michigan Shuffleboard Association will promote shuffleboard in our state through league and tournament activity, including the continuance of the State of Michigan Championships, which celebrates its 10th anniversary this year.

In Washington, where there are at least 20 tournaments a year, the issue of scheduling has prompted players and tavern owners to talk about forming an association to address that concern, as well as other issues, including a state championship. We wish them luck in this venture and look forward to reading about their progress is *The Board Talk*.

On behalf of my fellow players in Florida, Michigan, Indiana, Oklahoma and Washington, we challenge the other major shuffleboard states to join us and form your own associations.

Regarding state championship tournaments, how about Thanksgiving weekend being "State Championship Weekend"? Indiana and Michigan are doing it already -- how about players in California, Texas and Washington that are already holding annual tournaments that weekend? Why not make that your state championship weekend as well? That just might provide the momentum needed to make this happen all over the country.

We hope these developments are just the beginning, and that the players will organize themselves before we lose any other members of the shuffleboard community. When I say the players need to organize themselves, it is because The Shuffleboard Federation is not going to be involved in running or financing this project. We have done our part. Elected officers need to be in charge and funding will have to come from membership dues.

We have always believed the game should be in the hands of the players. If our sport is going to continue to make progress, players must become more involved. Happily, that is starting to happen.

If a national association is to be a success, it needs to be as free from politics as possible. That means everyone, including The Shuffleboard Federation, must put aside their personal agenda. We call on *The Board Talk*, the P.C.S.A. and the shuffleboard manufacturers, to join us in doing so and in supporting these ideas.

Editor's Note: "Amen!" Let's make it happen!

We are at a "crossroads" and the prognosis is good. We are writing a chapter in the history of shuffleboard. What will it say about each of us?



The finale, an A-B Draw, was won by Tom French and Steve Luttrull, who had to overcome a great duo, Johnny Wayne and Johnny Ballard.


"A big thanks to all the participants, fans, and directors Ron and Debbie Bowers. Hope to see you all at our next tournament," said Don.

### ABOUT THOSE FRATERNITIES

In answer to your question about fraternal clubs and organizations promoting open shuffleboard tournaments, in Indiana, these organizations charge their members membership fees. They are non-profit and get their state license for \$350; my state license costs me \$1345 a year. These organization's doors are supposed to be locked and members have keys!

When I started in the tavern business in 1961, I scrounged up \$2500 and borrowed \$4000 (believe it or not at 29% interest -- take it or leave it). The American Legion in Fairmount also in 1961 opened a new home a block from the Palace Bar. They sold almost 100 guest cards to nonmembers for \$8 a year. Of course, all these non-military guest card members drank alcoholic beverages. They had whiskey, beer and wine; and I am working my butt off and had only beer and wine. It took me 10 years and enemies before I got my whiskey and could at least be equal and

As we reported in last month's issue, Florida shufflers are enthusiastic about the concept of holding state tournaments, culminating in a national event with the state winners competing against each other. And, as promised, here is the charter they have developed:

### STATE CHARTER FLORIDA TABLE SHUFFLEBOARD ASSN.

It is our intent and purpose to promote and communicate and govern the game of table shuffleboard within the state of Florida.

To promote a yearly state shuffleboard tournament to determine state champions in the following events: men's singles, women's singles, open partners, and mixed couples. Limited to state of Florida residents only.

To communicate with all known shuffleboard establishments within the state of Florida as to the tournament sites, dates, and time of each event, entry fees and lodging information.

To govern in accord with the national updated rules and regulations at all state tournaments and to serve as an advisory unit to all shuffleboard establishments within the state of Florida. The F.S.A. will initially appoint 10 committee members to represent and serve their districts and areas within the state.

Those 10 committee members have been appointed, along with a five-member subcommittee. We hope they will keep us updated on their progress.


Please note that the enclosed flyer for the 2nd Annual Florida Open is, indeed, OPEN to players from all states. It is not a STATE tournament, such as was held recently in Michigan, Indiana, and Oklahoma, which were restricted to residents within those states.

The biggest challenge that lies ahead is the lack of a national organization that can pull the various states and associations that now exist together in one unit in order to develop those "national updated rules and regulations" that the Florida charter calls for. Please share your ideas with readers of this publication.

\*\*\*\*\*

Back in 1950, shuffleboard came close to that ideal. Under the auspices of the American Shuffleboard Leagues, Inc. (financially supported by the American Shuffleboard Company), 14 states -- Arizona, Idaho, Illinois, Indiana, Kansas, Michigan, Missouri, New Jersey, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Texas, Utah, and Wisconsin -- held state tournaments with winners progressing to a national tournament.

The big event was held at the National Guard Armory in Peoria, Illinois, with 500 players on 45 teams participating on the 18 American 22-foot boards and four 12-foot cushion-rebound boards. The Jefferson Hotel in Peoria was the headquarters for players, sports writers, and dignitaries (including a National Shuffleboard Queen). According to the ASLI's official publication, *Shuffleboard World*, thousands of spectators paid 25-cents to watch the proceedings.



In May of 1950, 45 teams from 14 states competed in the U.S. Championship Tournament in Peoria, Illinois. Winners were: Rupsis Tavern, Schenectady, N.Y., men's longboard; Wayside Inn, La Crosse, Wis., women's longboard; I'm Inn, Overland, Mo., men's cushion board; and Chuck's Tiny Lodge, Midlothian, Ill., women's cushion board.

The Rupsis team took the biggest share of the pot, \$2,500 -- not a lot by today's standards, but you have to remember this was 45 years ago!

What we found most interesting as we reviewed these memories from the past was (1) three of those

14 states that participated in the U.S. Championship Tournament -- Idaho, Utah and Wisconsin -- are not to be found on our "Play Your Way Across the U.S.A." list (enclosed). Is shuffleboard "dead" now in those states? Or do we simply not know what and where the action is? Any information that will cast a light on that mystery will be appreciated.

(2) What did shuffleboard have back then that we don't have today that attracted spectators? During the state tournaments, it was reported that 500 spectators watched the 15-team Ohio event at the Greenwood Night Club in Toledo; "thousands" watched 35 teams competing in the Michigan tournament at the St. Clair Eagles Club; the VFW club in Fort Wayne was "filled to the rafters" to watch the Indiana tournament; at the Ing Ballroom in Peoria, 2,500 spectators were reported to be in the gallery during the Illinois tournament.

Today, we get good-sized galleries at the PCSA's Extravaganza in Las Vegas and The Shuffleboard Federation's North American Championships in Reno, but a majority of those are participating players. And in state tournaments, even during a closely-fought finals battle such as the one between two Michigan "giants" in the men's singles, the only "gallery" in the wee hours of the morning are loyal and supportive significant others, the tired host, and Board Talk editors. Could an Illinois state tournament attract 2,500 spectators today? What's the difference between 1950 and 1995? The competition of television? The fact that we don't charge an admittance fee? Let us know what you think.

This whole issue of state (note that Washington has joined the growing ranks) and national tournaments could make for some interesting dialogue! We'll be bringing this edition of *The Board Talk* to Vegas with us, along with a tape recorder. If you've got some insights to share, we'll be ready....

IN MEMORIAM

Our New Year opened on a sad note, when a phone call from Dee Ross notified us of the death of yet another shuffleboard great -- Earl Kelly of Dallas, Texas.


We first met Earl in January of 1984 at the U.S.S.A. world championship tournament in Las Vegas, our first big event as publishers of the newly-born *Board Talk*. He was one of the "helpers" to his long-time friend and shuffleboard partner Billy Mays, organizer (along with Bill Melton of Oklahoma and Doug Buhl of Oregon) of the event. He was a hard-working, shy, quiet, unassuming man (until he let one of those pucks barrel down the boards). At all the events where we had the pleasure of seeing Earl throughout the next decade, he was always a gentleman, a great ambassador for the sport he loved.

Our respect for him as a player, as well as an individual, was evidenced by the listing of his name in *The Board Talk's* Top Players in the USA for as long as it was published.

In April of 1994, an Earl Kelly Benefit was staged at the Gold Nugget Club in Arlington, Texas, hosted by Bill Brodie and directed by Bobby and David Williams. Earl had been diagnosed with a heart condition, along with other health problems, and had no insurance to cover his very expensive daily therapy sessions. That benefit netted over \$1500 and The World of Shuffleboard had high hopes that he would recover. He continued to play shuffleboard and won a few events despite his illness. We looked forward to maybe seeing him at the PCSA tournament in Vegas. But the Good Lord evidently had other plans for him (like maybe Mickey Mickens needed a partner?), and we join the many friends of Earl Kelly in mourning his passing.



## Frisco Eddie's Revenge: The Return

(In last month's episode, Eddie and Lil had boarded the plane for the first leg of their journey, with Texas as their destination. Lil had briefed Eddie on some "hustler" strategies they would be using.)

Eddie was beginning to wonder what was coming up next, after Lil had told him she was going to share some "hustling" secrets. They had finished their breakfast trays and were cruising along smoothly at 35,000 feet, headed for the Dallas/Ft. Worth Airport.

Lil began: "Now, Eddie, I want you to know that we will be running into several people who have the same notion as we do about winning at the game of shuffleboard. If we need to -- that is, HAVE TO, we can and WILL add some things that will put the odds in our favor."

She was checking his reaction as she continued: "There's one thing that works well if you're having trouble with the lag, Eddie. It's common table salt. When a small amount is secretly sprinkled on a pre-selected spot (like a few boards in -- and in the three-zone), the weight will stop very nicely, right on the spot! Of course, you have to be lagging pretty close to a three anyway, or it will be too obvious. I've done it before, Eddie, and it's been done to me, also."

She went on: "Now the 'double-bet,' or 'push-bet' goes this way. Say we pick a spot where I'm well known; O.K.? I select the 'mark,' someone you can beat. Someone who thinks I'm the greatest and won't think of playing me. You enter the place later, and we set up a game with the guy. I start making some side bets with you -- that he can beat you. Then you get the actual money bet from him! When he sees he's getting beat and tries to start quitting, I jump in and let him know about all the money I've invested in him, and convince him he can beat you. Trust me; the fish will leave the joint flat-broke."


She looked him directly in the eyes then and said: "Well, what do you think so far, Champ? And this is just the tip of the iceberg."





Let's hear from you on this issue.


### **DEADLINES ARE BUMMERS!**


