



## Mickey Mickens Remembered at Board Talk's 11th Annual Shufflers' Reunion

The title of this event -- "11th Annual Board Talk Shufflers' Reunion/Mickey Mickens Memorial Tournament" -- may well be the longest in shuffleboard history. But even though they couldn't say it without pausing for a breath, shufflers from 14 states gathered at Harvey's Place in Street, Maryland, June 12-18, for the "reunion" and to honor the memory of the late, great Mickey Mickens.



There were a few in the crowd who remember Mickey at this tender age when his love of shuffleboard started and never waned throughout his lifetime.

A printed program, which contained a listing of winners of the past 10 Board Talk Shufflers' Reunions (Mickey's name is listed seven times!), also featured tributes from many of Mickey's scores of friends and admirers, along with photos of him in winning situations.....

He's pictured with Darrol Nelson, Bill Lally, Len Dell, Milt Benedict, Bobby Voorhis, Jerry Warr, Beef Camp, and Dick Gorman. But most important, he's pictured with his No. 1 fan, Claire Mickens.....



Most people on the East Coast and those who attended previous Board Talk "reunions" remember Mickey like this, with his constant companion, wife Claire.

In an emotional memorial presentation on Saturday, attended by wife Claire, his family, friends, fellow shufflers from the past and present, others who knew him only by his reputation, and companies that service The World of Shuffleboard (Sol Lipkin representing the American International Shuffleboard Corp.; Joe Markert Jr., Phila-American Shuffleboard Co.; John McDermott, The Shuffleboard Federation, Inc.; Dick Gorman, Triple Crown and Playfair), Mickey Mickens was remembered. M.C. Dick Gorman, along with Judy Gartland, Nelson Renzo and Bill Young, all gave spoken tributes. Two trophies earned by Mickey and left behind ("Mickey never left any money behind, but he did sometimes leave his trophies," said Dick) were presented to Claire.

Then came the big moment when Chairman Glen Davidson inducted Mickey into the newly-formed National Shuffleboard Hall of Fame. M.C. Dick Gorman closed the ceremony by reciting a poem written by Bill Lally, former partner and opponent of Pennsylvania, who ended his tribute with these words: "This great game won't be the same without ya, A great champion we'll always call ya, May The Good Lord be with ya, Love ya!"

## Shotze's 1st Everett Invitational Gets Rave Reviews





## "Best of Philly" Series -- TIGHT



Yes, folks, there really is a town called Funkstown and it's located in Maryland, home of Glenn's Tavern, which hosted its first tournament of the season on May 19-2().




Lonzo Knight and Dave Shrewbridge took first place honors in Friday night's draw partner event.




Wanda Farris and Roy Shriver drew each other and took second place at Glenn's Tavern first-of-theseason draw partner event on May 19-20.

## Warning: PCSA Extravaganzas in Jeopardy! Your Help Needed:

This is probably the toughest letter I have ever had to write, but -- here goes....

When we got back from our last tournament and it came time to do the paperwork (no job is done until the paperwork is completed), our euphoria at having staged another great tournament quickly turned to disappointment as it become apparent that we would again have to come up with "out of pocket" money to cover tournament costs.

After the paperwork was finished (out of pocket costs totaled several hundred dollars) and the sad news was digested, we had a meeting -- Paul, Karl, and myself. I was ready to dissolve the PCSA. However, after a lengthy discussion, Paul talked me into giving it one more try. So, we have signed a contract with the Aladdin for 1996. But, there will be some changes....

The players -- ALL players -- simply must understand that the rooms purchased by the PCSA are what pay for the tournament. So, if players in our tournament stay at some other hotel or stay at the Aladdin but do not register through the PCSA, we do not receive credit for those rooms and the PCSA's efforts to stage a quality tournament are put in serious jeopardy.

I know some of you, because of your play at the gaming tables, may have earned complimentary rooms at the Aladdin or some other hotel/casino. I know many of you travel a great distance to come to our tournament and try to minimize costs by arrangements through travel agencies offering tour packages. I know some of you may stay with friends in Las Vagas. I also know that if players do not reserve their rooms through the PCSA, there will be no more PCSA shuffleboard extravaganzas!

For the 1996 tournament, each player MUST reserve a room for at least two (2) nights THROUGH THE PCSA. And those two nights must be paid for through the PCSA by each player before playing in any event. No prize money will be paid out to a player/players who have failed or refused to reserve a room for at least two nights through the PCSA.

PCSA stands ready to continue to contribute to, or participate in, worthwhile benefit fund raisers. To do those things, we need the support of all players -- not just some or most players -- we must have the support of all players!




Susan D (left), hostess of Jerry D's, gives Michelle Klein a congratulatory hug for winning the Top Beaver award for 1995.







## Frisco Eddie's Revenge: The Return

(In last month's episode, after Eddie and Lil had lost four games to one to the Texas Kid and Fat Max, Lil arranged for Eddie to take on the Kid in a best 3 out of 5 singles for \$2500. The Kid's backer, Money Man, was certain he had a winner.)

The best 3 out of 5 series for \$2500 began with Eddie calling "heads" and winning the hammer. He felt a lot more comfortable now because he could go "all-out," including his lag. It wasn't easy to get the lag back, however, after he had purposely been "choking" or lagging off the board. As a result, the Texas Kid won the first game 15 to 10. The score was 14-12 in Eddie's favor in the second game. The Kid lagged a miracle three with his hammer, against two of Eddie's weights.

Lil had a little conference with Eddie then. She said, "That last shot was pure luck, Champ. You've got to win the next three games or we're out of here. Just settle down now; you're far better than this guy."

Dollar Dan, the Money Man, had a look of pure pleasure on his face as the third (and what he thought would be the final) game began. Eddie started to smooth out and his lag began to improve. He beat the Kid the third and fourth games by a narrow margin. The look of pure pleasure on Dollar Dan's face had now turned to one of major concern. His "paid help," the Ape Man, who was stationed near the entrance door, was on the alert now and seriously taking in all the action.

The final game went basically weight-for-weight, until Eddie broke things open with a three lag. The score was 13-11 then, in Eddie's favor. The Kid tied things up with a deuce lag. On the next frame, he gave Eddie a very short deuce (a left cross) to shoot against with his final weight. This was the exact shot that Lil had pointed out to Eddie in the practice session before the action began -where you could ride the rail with the left cross, if you hit on just the right spot. Eddie sized up the weight, knowing that this would be the last shot of the game. He sprinkled a little wax on the left rail before his shot, and then let it good. His weight caught just the right spot and gently nudged the Kid's weight off the board, and then slid into a short three. The game -- and the match -- were over!

There were no cheers from the crowd as Lil went over to collect the bet. Dollar Dan had a very angry look on his face, but he reluctantly allowed Lil to pick up the \$5,000 stake from the bar. She told him: "Thanks for the bet, Dan; that was too close for comfort."

Lil went back down the bar then to congratulate Eddie, and also to give the Money Man and the Kid a chance to figure out their strategy. She gave Eddie a hug and told him: "You played it just right, Champ! I think it was close enough to where Texas Kid's pride and the Money Man's anger at losing will push them into another series. I'm goin' back over there now and help them make up their minds."

As Lil approached, they were in a heated dialogue, trying to figure out how to deal with their loss and get their money back. At the right moment, Lil made a comment: "That series was pretty close and I feel fortunate that my man won. We'd be happy to walk right on out of here as winners -- but just to be fair, we're willing to continue the action here.....if that's what's on your minds."

Now the Texas Kid had just about convinced Dollar Dan that he could "take him" if a second series was played. The question now was the money management strategy. Dollar Dan looked into Lil's eyes then and said: "This may sound unwise, after my man has just lost, but the deal I'm going to make is this. We double the stake and let them go for another 3 out of 5 series. How about that, Lady?"

Lil took her time in responding. She was laughing inside, but had a very concerned look on her face when she gave her reply: "My policy is to let the opponents try to get their money back -- the same way I won it. If I allow you to keep doubling, for sure your man will win one and clean me out." She "checked his temperature" then and set the hook by saying: "Here's what I'm willing to do, Dan. I'll put my \$5,000 up on the bar and you match it. The players get one more series, but win or lose -- one of us picks up the \$10,000 and that's it, and that's that. What I'm saying here is that this will be a 'one-shotdeal' -- end of story, O.K.?"

The Money Man didn't say a word as he peeled off \$5,000 and placed it next to him on the bar. Lil said: "Well, I guess the negotiations are over, Dan," as she placed their \$5,000 next to his.

The crowd had grown now and a lot of side-talk was brewing about who was going to win. All this would turn into a dead silence once the games began. The board was wiped down and then spray-waxed and polished. The powdered wax was then applied. Lil and Eddie noticed that they had switched to the white "Super Lightning Flash" wax this time. Lil gave Eddie another little pep talk then: "This is the game we came here for, Champ. Don't worry about making it close now. Just pull out all the stops, and let them see some real shuffleboard!"

Dollar Dan gave the Texas Kid some "side-bar" advice by saying: "Now, you go out there and shoot your

damndest to beat him, O.K.? Winning would be the best, but either way, they can forget about walking out of here






