Another Fun Shufflin' Adventure with the Crazy Canucks!

It was another fun-filled week at the AN & AF Club in Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada, where shufflers started gathering on the Monday before Labor Day for the 5th Annual Crazy Canucks Tournament.

The actual tournament action was launched on Thursday night with the "Winston Jim" draw doubles, which attracted 44 entries vying for a share of the \$880 pot. Taking first place honors in the "luck of the draw" were Doug Buhl of Oregon and Mike Thorpe of Washington. Mike Waters of Washington and John Mull of Oregon finished second, with Winston Jim himself of Oregon and Tony Lilly of Canada in third. Jim Buhl and Steve Fisher of Oregon took fourth place.

"It was the first time up here for some players, such as Jim Buhl, Jim Watson, John and Mindy Mull (who were honeymooning), Tina Olsen and her daughter and friend, Chucky Boustead from Van. Island, Tom and Janet Henry, Mike Kinney, Doug Pruit, Jerry Mattson, and Desi Guches," said director Marg Okum. "It was the first time the Oregon players outnumbered Washington!"

Friday night's singles drew 27 entries and total prize money of \$1850.

"It was a tough battle for Mike," said Marg. "He went all the way in the winner's bracket to meet Chuck,

who came back to beat Mike three straight games for first place."


It was the famous Winston Jim who took third place, with Nick Billings and Brian Burchysky of Canada in 4th and 5th, and Tom Henry in 6th place.

There were 16 teams in Saturday's open doubles competing for a pot of \$2940. "There was some great action in this event, with spectators at every table," Marg reports.

STATE CHAMPIONSHIPS SET FOR THANKSGIVING WEEKEND

Three states -- Florida, Indiana, and Michigan -- will hold events over the Thanksgiving weekend to determine 1995 shuffleboard champions. All are restricted to residents of those respective states.

It will be a first for Florida, where four scheduled events will be held in Titusville at Sam's Place and Our Place Saloon. Those four events include a women's singles on Friday at Sam's Place; a men's singles at Our Place, also on Friday; an open doubles on Saturday and a mixed doubles on Sunday, both at Our Place. All events are \$10 per person, and sponsor sales will be held for the men's singles and open doubles. Two additional shuffleboard establishments will be held in reserve and a shuttle service will be available on an "if needed" basis. The 7th Annual State of Indiana Championships will be hosted by Chances R in Muncie. Events include an open singles on Friday, \$20 entry; open doubles on Saturday, \$50 entry; mixed doubles, \$30 entry, and women's singles, \$15 entry, both on Sunday. Chances R is located at 3421 S. The 10th Annual State of Michigan Championships will be held at the Wetlands Bar & Grill in Royal Oak. Events will include a mixed doubles on Friday, \$30 per team; a "B" singles, \$20 entry, a ladies' singles, \$15 entry, and an open singles, \$40 entry, on Saturday; and a bring partner event on Sunday, \$40 per team entry. Sponsor sales for ALL events will be held at 1 p.m. on Friday. The Hartfield Lanes will host some of the competition if the turnout is too large for Wetlands to accommodate. Mational Shuffleboard Hall of Fame

Contining with our "profiles" of the National Shuffleboard Hall of Fame Board of Directors, Hal Perry, vice president, has been around forever, and now he has a son, Steve, who is winning tournaments and looking like a chip off the old block. Hal has also been on shuffleboard committees before the P.S.A. that I formed in the early '80s and then for The Shuffleboard Federation. He and Bob Hunt are the two who pushed to form the Shuffleboard Hall of Fame. I met Hal in the '60s around San Jose and Sacramento. He was the top player in California at that time. He has won tourneys with Fred Thumann, Don Cox, PeeWee Ramos, Jim Allis and many more. He also captured some singles along the way.

The thing that stuck in my craw about Hal Perry was he didn't know what quit or defeat were. Hal and I went on a trip in the early '70s. We went to a place in East L.A. called Easy Pickins -- and it was. They picked us clean in six hours! I left my camera for what we owed. We went from there on to San Diego. Hal was walking the board against a player called Sheep at the Rodeo Run in Lemon Grove. We were down to nothing again, Hal played for six hours trying to win two in a row. We left there and went back to the Little Dixie in Pomona or out in the Carbon Canyon road where they all played from the L.A. area every weekend. Sally ran this place for many years. She had one good board and food and stayed open 24 hours. There were big trees out in the country, coves, horses, farms... They came out there to stay for the weekend -- travel trailers, camper shells and just plain cars. They played non-stop from Friday to Monday morning. I saw A.Z. Turnbo walking the board there barefooted on cement floor for 16-18 hours. He would step on a lit cigarette and not even flinch -- just shake his foot and keep walking. A.Z. was also a great player at that time.

Hal and I finally got it together for the first time on this trip, with Hal lagging those 3's and 4's. We played Friday night, all day Saturday and sometime Sunday. We had them all busted! So we went back to the Easy Pickens, picked up my camera and headed back to Sacramento.

That was quite a trip. That is just one story about

Hal, who has been around for 40 years, so the stories and the games get better with age.

Hal has always been a great supporter of the game. If there was a game or a tourney in the area, Hal was there -- just just local, but everywhere -- Michigan, Oklahoma, Texas, Arizona, Washington, Oregon. If you're looking for someone who has played more, travelled more, or knows more about the game, or who was a better player, you're wasting your time. Hal is a Hall of Famer in his own right, a legend in his own time and never had to have an edge to play anyone, any time, on any board. I feel real proud to sit on the Board of Directors with Hal Perry.

As for me, I'm healing and should be good as new in 45 to 60 days. They took 1/4 of my lung out, benign tumor, no cancer. I've quit smoking for good, so you haven't gotten rid of me yet.

We will have our Hall of Fame Tournament at Bourbon, Indiana, next May. Fritzi Broka and NSHF Director Larry Creakbraum will work together to raise money for the Hall of Fame. This tournament is the longest-running tournament in shuffleboard history and I think it only fitting, especially since they asked, to have it there. So far, I haven't heard from anyone else. Does that tell you anything? It does me!






That fun-loving Irish canary, Joannie Millar, and her partner, Tina Olson, took sixth place in the open doubles.



Voorhis/Orsi Team Up to Take Top Honors at Bourbon Fall Tourney

The 28th Annual Fall Tournament at the American Legion Post 424 in Bourbon, Indiana, on Oct. 7 was not a mixed doubles, but the top-ranking finishers were "mixed." First place was captured by Bobby Voorhis of Indiana and Gwynette Orsi of Nebraska (Gwynette joins Fritzi Broka as the only two women to ever take first at a Bourbon tournament), with Terry Dowell of Indiana and Diana Hagen of Texas taking second place honors.

There were 33 teams that battled for a chance at the \$8500 pot. Out of those 33 teams, nine states were represented: Indiana, Ohio, Michigan, Illinois, Nebraska, Oklahoma, Texas, Florida, and Colorado.

Lou Records a Touching Tournament Moment....

Some readers may recall that several months ago I mentioned imminent retirement, my intent to move to New Mexico, and a desire to contribute more articles to The Board Talk. Well, I am retired -- sort of -- and I live in Fort Lupton, a small farming community 26 miles north of Denver and several light years away from Los Angeles.

On Oct. 13-15, the Balloon Inn hosted its annual mixed doubles-bring your partner tournament. Numbered among the many entrants was the lovely Candy Lepore. Several months prior to the tournament, Ron Hurney, one of Denver's better players, asked Candy to be his partner. She was ecstatic. Oh, she had partnered up before with some of Denver's finest players (anything can happen in a \$5 blind draw event), but none had ever asked her to be their partner. None, that is, until Ron.

Off to practice she went. Night after night, she threw weight after weight. She'd throw a hundred weights and then she'd throw a hundred more. She was determined to play for Ron as she had never played before.

Then, a few short weeks before the tournament, Ron Hurney, age 45, died of an aneurism. After paying her respects, back to the boards she went. Night after night, she threw weight after weight. 


All in a Day's Work....

The Khan's beautifully-landscaped acreage, including a river where George claims Bobby tried to dump him, provided some challenges for the crew.






With the afternoon sun casting beams through the trees surrounding the Khan home, the trailer is loaded for its next stop.





Weber/Brennan/Jones Winners at Dixie Belle's Marathan


The Dixie Belle, Downey, California, hosted a "Marathan" tournament recently.


