# Grand Masters PLUS, PLUS!

What a tournament -- with 94 players signed up to try and get part of the \$21,000 cash monies offered to the first six places in four main events during the Whistling Oyster's Grand Masters Plus in Quilcene, Washington, on Aug. 2-6.

They started arriving seven days prior to Wednesday afternoon's mixed doubles. We started our practice sessions on July 30 in the form of round robins, which kept on going until Aug. 2, with a total of over 24 first-place winners, with the likes of (just to name a few): Darrol Nelson, Tommy Campbell, Jim Foran, Gary George, Steve Wilson, Chris Danke, Doug Buhl, Bubba Warren, Dave Cowan -- the list goes on and on. By Wednesday, the "pit" in the back was full and local motels and hotels had to hang out their "no vacancy" signs. And the games began.....

#### **Buhl/Danke Take Mixed Doubles**

By noon on Wednesday, Aug. 2, we had 20 women and over 30 men signed up to play in our first-ever mixed doubles draw. The only fair way to let all the men have a chance to play was to have a hat draw and take out the first 20 to even up the field. The "excess" players had a couple of \$25 round robin draws on Board 5. On the front four boards the action began and 12 hours later (real good time, by the way), we had our 4th, 5th and 6th place winners. Two hours later, it was over, with Doug Buhl and Chris Danke emerging the victors.

Second place team was Dan Hitt and Kim Boyd, with John Lahtala and Jeanette Henry in third. Other winners in this event were: Paul Parks and Linda Steffenson, 4th; John Hyatt and Thais Svetich, 5th; and Gary George and Jackie Anderson, 6th.

#### **Nelson Takes Singles Title**

Thursday came too soon! By 1 p.m., we had 32 singles, signed and paid, to vie for a piece of the \$8000 plus monies offered. To nobody's surprise, it was Darrol Nelson of Oregon who came out on top, with Loren Lampley of Washington in a strong second place.




Darrol Nelson (left) takes the singles trophy, while Loren Lampley settled for a not-too-skinny second-place win.



# National Shuffleboard Fall of Fame

Ever since the National Shuffleboard Hall of Fame was officially formed in early February 1995, the board members have been begging the shuffleboard community for their input, both in person and with written invitations in the columns printed in *The Board Talk*. To date, the board's pleas for input have been largely ignored with the exception of the letters addressed to *The Board Talk* (not the NSHF Board members, as requested) from Ed Galke (6/95) and Nancy Rice (8/95), and it has occurred to me that there just might be a communications problem. Before addressing this problem, let me briefly respond to Ed and Nancy.

If the National Shuffleboard Hall of Fame is to ever be an organization that is taken seriously, it must remain fair, impartial, and be reflective of the wishes and beliefs of the entire shuffleboard community. It is not an effort on the board's part to form a "good ol' boy" network." (If it were, how do I, being a female playing the game less than 5 years, fit in?)

The rules that are currently in place are a beginning guideline for nominations. To all shuffleboard players: please feel free to direct your suggestions for better guidelines to the board and we will be glad to consider them and possibly vote them into the by-laws. Also, as George and Donna noted after Nancy's letter in the August 1995 issue, if you would like to nominate a player into the National Shuffleboard Hall of Fame, all you have to do is gather a petition with at least 20 names on it, provide a history of the player's career (of course, the more detailed, the better), and list the reason(s) you feel this person should be nominated. I know this may sound like a lot of work, but the history and the reason for the nomination in particular are particularly important. The board has anticipated the time in which a nominated player, though worthy of the nomination, may not be especially well-known. In addition, one of the National Shuffleboard Hall of Fame's goals is to be responsible for the collection and archiving of shuffleboard information.

The "at least 20 names" rule should provide at least an indication that the person nominated is, indeed, well thought of and deserving of the honor of being nominated. To that effect, self-nominations ae not usually as well-regarded as those that originate from a person's admiring peers. And while there is considerable honor

# J & C's First on the Fourth a Long Weekend!

On Friday night, June 30, a mixed draw partner event started the weekend on the two in-house boards. At 2 a.m., the winners were finally able to collect their winnings as Mike Kennedy and Rita Yank outlasted the field to take first place honors. Second place went to Louise Freer and Butch Kelly, with Keith Lazos and Diane Dale taking the third spot.

By noon on Saturday, July 1, the shooters were back and ready for the open bring partners. This field was held down as the "B" bring partners was scheduled for the next day. The "B" shooters did not wish to lose their rating before that tournament so they came to cheer their favorite. When the smoke cleared at 8 p.m. that night, Mike Kennedy once again found himself in the winner's circle with Jim Yank Sr. Second place honors went to the team of Jim Yank Jr. and Ed Malano. Third place was taken by Nick Coop and Ed Hammon.

Sunday is called the "Day of Rest," and that is exactly what the "A" shooters did -- resting on the bar stools and cheering the "B" shooters, who were ready to strut their stuff. When the final weights stopped moving, John Hummel and Ben Evens Jr. walked away with the first place cash. Ron Ness and Aimee Clark, first time tourney participants, came in second, with Nick Coop and Chris Stilwell (another first-timer) taking the last money spot.

Monday, the 3rd, was a work day for some people. Time was a factor, so the schedule called for an open draw partner event without a sponsor sale. Once again, the shufflers shot late into the night with John Hummel and Louise Freer taking all the prize money. With the Orfanelli family adding some cash, Ed Hammon and Jim Yank Sr. at least doubled their money for taking second place.

On Tuesday, the 4th of July, the outside fireworks were not the only ones scheduled for the City of Brotherly Love. The singles event was a tough field and the incentive of added money started the action to heat up early. Most of the the favorites hit the loser's bracket in the opening round and it looked to be anyone's tournament. By the time the city's skyline started lighting up, the boards at J & C's were doing the same. When it was all over, Jim Yank Sr. had come all the way through the loser's bracket to take first place. Steve (Ski) Lacinski took second place and Jim Wolf picked up the remaining cash for third place.

Tournament director Jim Yank Sr. thanks the Orfanellis once again, especially Joe Sr. and wife Carol for all they did for the shooters over the long weekend. Joe Jr., also

doing his share, helped to maintain the boards and keep the wax cans filled.

They have also added more than \$30,000 to the prize money in the last four years, and are contributing at least \$6,000 to the 1995 tournament. There are two major format changes -- in the AMATEUR TEAM EVENT and the PRO/DIVISION I DOUBLES. We are very excited about both of them and believe that the result will be substantially bigger events in both cases.

In a move that puts an end to all the stress that went with trying to rate players for the team event, we have gone to a draft style format. This method gives every team a chance to win, which has always been one of our goals. It also results in much bigger pots. The Sands will add money to this event based on the number of teams. The breakdown is as follows: less than 24 teams -- none; 24 to 27 teams, \$4,000; 28 to 31 teams, \$5,500; 32 teams, \$7,000.

The other major format change combines the Division I and Pro Doubles. There are several reasons for this. Instead of two medium size events, there will be one big one. The Division I players who have wanted a 2 out of 3 format will get one for this event, and still be finished in time to play in the Amateur Team Event, if they so desire.

We would have not made this change unless we felt it could be done in such a way that a substantial number of Division I players would have a legitimate chance to win. After considering a number of different ideas, we came to a decision that we hoped the players would be as excited about as we were. The response has been overwhelmingly positive.

Under the new format, players who are winners of the pro singles or doubles at the **NORTH AMERICAN CHAM-PIONSHIPS** or the P.C.S.A. Extravaganzas can not be partners. Those players are: Jim Allis, Rick Boyer, Doug Buhl, Billy Chiles, Glen Davidson, Billy Mays, John McDermott, Bill Melton, Billy Melton, Darrol Nelson, Sam Summers, Fred Thumann, David Williams, and Bobby Voorhis. We would like to thank the many pros who have personally offered their support for this idea. It could not have worked without you.

As a result of this change, the Pro/Division I Doubles should become a huge, highly-competitive event -- both in terms of the number of teams and the prize money. Anytime that you have 10-15 teams with a solid chance to win instead of 2 or 3, a much bigger and better event is inevitable.

ion to the Hall of Fame. A proper physical edifice will be more of a problem and could be the undoing of it all. I believe that it is important that the committee limit themselves to The Hall of Fame only -- and not try to appease by branching out to other areas of recognition or authority -- so as not to dilute their efforts or credibility. Time factor and contribution are already becoming controversial -- 25 years or 20 years, local, regional or national participation. We all are aware that written records of shuffleboard results and history are at a minimum sketchy. The Baseball Hall of Fame is now going through the throes of former restrictions, i.e., non-recognition of former black baseball players. This example is meant to be a caution that is worth thinking about -- any hard, fast rule may have repercussions later.

Financing is going to be difficult. Hopefully, it can be raised on a volunteer basis and not a charge basis, i.e., \$10 per tournament, \$1 per player. That is not much, but it should be donated on a desire basis -- not mandatory; that always causes controversy.

I give my full support to the present committee with the wish that all individuals correspond with them about their personal ideas. Let the committee have the time to design a program and announce their findings and results. Let us not confuse the issue with debates about what should or should not be until they announce their results.

and prestige in being nominated for induction by others, to my knowledge there is currently nothing in the by-laws that expressly prohibits self-nomination.

In regard to the communication problem, it has been suggested to me that the shuffleboard community may be wary of expressing their opinions directly to the NSHF Board because they feel that their suggestions may be ignored or "buried" if they are sent directly to them rather than the very public forum of *The Board Talk*.

If this is the cause of anyone's hesitation to let us know what they think, rest assured that every bit of input, both large and small, will be seriously considered by the entire board. As secretary, it is my duty to share all such input with the other board members so that they can give it their full consideration. And, according to the by-laws of the National Shuffleboard Hall of Fame, the board members are obligated to meet on a periodic basis -- currently a minimum of one time per year -- to discuss all issues pertaining to the NSHF (of course, to date it looks like it will be a very fast meeting). 

Rita Traux, shown here with husband Fred (right) and Dale Law, shared first -place winnings in both round robins.






Diana Hagen flashes a winning smile after earning top honors in the Texas Open qualifier at Time Out #2 Sports Bar.



Lenard "Pee Wee" Ramos was a great shuffleboard player and one of the early leaders of the game (author of the widely-accepted Ramos Rules). He came from the days of the 20-30 hour money games. The tournaments in the early days were just a way to get everybody together to play their money matches (I won my first big tournament with Pee Wee, beating Billy Mays and Tommy Gavin.) There was a handful of people in the country who could stand up to the dreaded road players and, believe me, Pee Wee was one of them. No one worked harder and no one played harder. He was the smartest player and had the best right hand I ever saw. And when the game was on the line, he could get out as well as anyone.

This old friend belongs in the National Shuffleboard Hall of Fame.



But a trust is being earned by all the facets of our support system and shuffleboard will be the winner as they are accordingly rewarded for what they supply/contribute.

Occasionally, we have to look back to see how far we (not the editorial we, but the game) have come. In our first issue, January 1984, we had 3 upcoming tournaments (48 in this issue), no tournament flyers (8 in this issue), and no service ads (9 in this issue).

Yes, we've come a long way, Baby! Thanks for reminding us, Doc!


