

It Was a ''Perry'' Good Day at Blinky's!

Blinky's Sports Cafe in Santa Clara, California, was again the site of its annual Presidents' Day tournament. However, in the end, this would prove to be different than its predecessors. It is a true rarity in any sport that a father and son can compete at a high level, and shuffleboard is no exception. To compete at that level at the same time is something special. And those lucky enough to have attended this tournament witnessed an unsurpassed achievement.

With the doubles getting underway Saturday morning, the field was vying for just over \$5,000 in prize money. In third place was the team of Dan Mourgos and George Camara. The always dangerous Dan and the continued comeback effort by George proved to be formidable in falling just short. The two teams featured in the final displayed different styles, however, past success as partners is perhaps the biggest difference between them. John "Squirrel" Fisher and Rich "Bubba" Warren have prospered at Blinky's and other locations over the years. Considered one of the tougher teams in the state, they always get respect both on and off the board.



The father and son team of Steve and Hal Perry, emotional over their doubles win, went on to take 1-2 in the singles.

The team of Hal Perry and Steve Perry is another story entirely. Not a perennial doubles team and winners of just one tournament, they have been criticized for not being able to play together. Two things seemed to be different from their previous outings: the maturity of Steve's game, and they appeared to be more comfortable playing together. Breezing through the winner's bracket without a loss, they appeared to be on a mission. After John and Bubba fought through the loser's side, we had ourselves a final. When the hard-fought match was over, it was Hal and Steve prevailing 2-1. It was an emotional scene for two very emotional players.

The exciting doubles gave way to the singles and it would not disappoint. The field chasing just over \$6,000 in prize money was tough from top to bottom. Looking at the bracket board, there were four players left in the winner's side, Hal Perry set to play Karl Spickelmier and Steve Perry going against Bubba Warren.



Therefore, those who did not participate in the PCSA's Extravaganza VIII will not know what we're talking about here -- and that's just as well, because nothing constructive would result from its publication. We also often use our editorial privilege of refusing to print criticism against specific tournament sponsors, whether local or national, for the same reason. No one knows, better than we, that you cannot please all the people all the time -- and we do make mistakes and, like a majority of tournament sponsors, we welcome and encourage face-to-face challenges, so we can make it better next time. We certainly aren't going to sit in a judgement seat and determine whether the writer had some legitimate complaints, and doing so in a public forum does nothing to further the growth of our sport.

In last month's issue, John McDermott of The Shuffleboard Federation, Inc., had some good advice: "If an individual believes that a particular tournament is not being run in a professional and/or ethical basis, it seems the appropriate response is to approach the person in charge and voice your concerns. Their response will tell you all you need to know. If they do not respond to your satisfication (this does not necessarily mean agreeing with you), the most effective protest you can make is simply not to go to that tournament in the future......There is certainly no shortage of tournament action these days. It's a free country -- take your business elsewhere." That advice was published before the PCSA tournament, so it was not in response to the unsigned letter, making it all the more credible. We endorse that advice.

A View From the Bottom.....

A pragmatic, subjective, pessimistic view and look at the future of shuffleboard:

My early experience of growing up back East (Long Island, New York) fostered a lasting appreciation for the game because youngsters were permitted in taverns then with family adults. I can remember "messin" with weights at about the age of six, and played my first regulation game while still in High School (16-17 years old; we had fake I.D.s).

The point being that young people have to be introduced to the game early. They get "hooked" on pool, darts and video games long before they ever see a shuffleboard. I feel we need to encourage the placement of boards where adolescents congregate, like youth centers, pool halls, YMCAs, and even churches and *(continued on Page 9)*


Rick Pittman and Charlie Riley from the Pit Stop in Houston, Missouri, won this year's "bragging rights" by taking top honors in this annual event.



The Shuffleboard Federation's John McDermott Responds to Current Issues

We would like to address several issues brought up in the March issue by Ray Boyett, Ed Galke and George Wilber.

Regarding Ray's comments on extended shot guidelines: Ray, I am glad you remember bringing this question to my attention at the tournament. I am disappointed, however, that you do not remember the answer. You are incorrect in stating that there is no firm rule on this. There is a firm rule, and those rules were posted. It is Rule #16, which states: "The following criteria must be met for a shot to be a legal delivery: one foot must be on the ground and both feet must be behind the deuce line when the weight is delivered. Penalty for violation shall be the loss of that shot. Any weight(s) which have been knocked off or moved shall be replaced (in their original position)."

As far as your other suggestion that in my spare time I come up with a more comprehensive set of rules for player approval, we have always felt that the players should have the responsibility of determining the rules. This was the whole reason for the Player Policy Board. I would, however, love to hear from anyone who has suggestions on rules that need to be added or modified. I will put any such suggestions on paper and submit them to the players for their approval.

I could probably write a response to the issues raised by Ed Galke that would fill this entire issue. However, because space is limited, here is the condensed version of our thoughts on the following subjects:

Ratings: Back in 1991, we developed a rating system that works as follows: Pros-1, the top five percent in the amateur ranks are "0", the next fifteen percent are rated "1", the next twenty percent are rated "2", the next twenty percent are rated "3", the next twenty percent are rated "5". Several years ago, Ron and Debbie Bowers of Austin, Texas, organized a rating committee that used that criteria to rate players in the Texas/Oklahoma area. Since they began, both the size of the committee and the number of rated players have grown. They now have ratings on several hundred players from about a dozen states. We would love to see other parts of the country get involved and believe it would be very good for the game.

Demographics: Believe it or not, Ed, we are in total agreement with you on this one. Potential sponsors make decisions based on the make-up of the group, and as such, expect you to know the average age of the participatns, the percentage of men and women, how often they play, etc. Because of this, we periodically pass out questionnaires that ask these kind of questions to participants. There were several that you included that we have not. They will be added to our form the next time we do this. Because there was apparently not enough space in The Board Talk to include your form, I have not seen it and would appreciate it if you would send me a copy.

Bad Boards: Nothing hurts our sport more than the fact there is so much sub-par equipment out there. Unfortunately, there are no easy answers to this problem. The large majority of all the shuffleboard tables in this country are owned by vending companies, not by the bar owner. Sad to say, shuffleboards are not a very popular item with vending companies. The reasons are pretty simple. These companies have a limited amount of money to spend on new equipment. For the price of a new shuffleboard, they can have two pool tables or three electronic dart machines, both of which will take in more quarters.

Back when shuffleboard was played using a frames format instead of points, a game took only about a third of the time that it takes to play a 15-point game. Consequently, shuffleboard held its own very well in terms of earnings. Realistically speaking, shuffleboard is probably not going back to frames, which means that the only way we are going to see any substantial improvement is if shuffleboards become much more lucrative and can bring in the same type of revenues as the other coin-operated equipment.

For all the players who want better playing conditions, how many would be willing to see the price per game increased to \$2 to \$3 a game to make this possible? We are pretty sure we know the answer to this one already.

Board Speed and Lagging: We definitely agree with you on the fact that boards need to be laggable and fairly close in speed from both ends. In a bar tournament, there is no excuse for having one end that is twice as fast as the other. In a major tournament, in which the boards are all brought in for the event, that is going to happen sometimes.

Anyone who has spent any time leveleing shuffleboards can tell you that getting the speed consistent from both ends is a lot tougher than adjusting the side-to-side level. An interesting situation arose in Reno regarding my concerns on this subject. If you have a board that is downhill from one end, the person who has the hammer at that end is going to have an extremely tough time keeping up with the person lagging the other end. This turns the

motels/hotels. I know that many shufflers stay at motels/ hotels. Why not start making some subtle demands for a board in these establishments? I know for a fact that Port Orchard's (Washington) Holiday Inn during a recent tournament sure could have used a practice board that would have seen a lot of play. So, when you make a reservation, ask if they have a board. If not, ask if they would like one.

I know that some of us know where there are boards lying around that could be set up and used. A small interested group from each area/tavern could get involved in fostering the sport this way. BZ's has just such a plank that could possibly be set up in a local bowling alley, and local age group competition could be encouraged, with awards (trophies) presented from the play money received. A private group at the Fir Cone (Vern and D.J.) did a magnificent job recently on a "salvage" board and thanks to them and Mel, it's being played on.

How many good young players who have stayed with the game (gotten addicted) can you think of in the last five years. I can only think of one -- Dan Hitt. What's going to happen in the next five or 10 years when the good older guys quit? Who will you be playing with then -- yourself -- on video?

Ladies and gentlemen, you have to organize and actively promote this noble sport; otherwise:

The Present State: Good players hook up with other good players and rookies feel they don't have a snowball's chance; well, just maybe. Realistically, I'd have a heck of a time beating Dan and Darrol at the Fir Cone Masters. Just how many times do you think I'll put up \$30 for that opportunity? Well, you know what they say: I may be stupid, but I'm not dumb.

Many more (are there any?) A-B draws, handicap, and 5 point board formats must be used to equalize the competition, or are the good guys really afraid of being beaten by a rookie? Your answer is not to me, but rather to the sport and future of shuffleboard.

My most enjoyable and most equalized tournament occurred about six years ago at the Black Cat's Sweathog's event (handicap), and there has been nothing like it since, and I've never played a 5 point board. Also, I think seeding should be considered, and a novice team should not have to play a top team right out of the blocks.

I've been informed that California uses a novel approach to the equalization: they use an entry fee scale according to skill. And how about a couple of Rookie Tournaments (like state)? You good guys could get a weekend off sometime and get some much-needed rest. A.A.U. and N.C.A.A. both use a multi-division system.

As a closing thought, consider contacting a curling

(Canada), lawn bowling (N.W.), or bacci ball (East) club and hold a shuffleboard meet just for them. We just might encourage a religious convert and local TV may just cover some highlights. PR, PR, PR....

In reiteration then -- more A/B draws, handicaps, 5 point play, prorated entry on skill, seeding, and more boards for the youth of America (Clinton's midnight shuffleboard).

Unless more younger players are brought into the game and its future encouraged, I'm afraid it may go the way of the dinosaur.

Also, that not buying back your minimum calcutta rule is going to be tested soon. Think about it.

From the Secretary:

The second annual meeting of the NSHF took place during the PCSA Extravaganza in Las Vegas. There was a lot of ground to cover and many decisions to be made, but we feel considerable progress has been made. Highlights of that meeting are as follows:

The Board recognizes that there are many, many players who deserve recognition and induction into the NSHF. However, there are priorities that we have determinated that take precedence over all others. There are many "old time players" who need immediate recognition because they are either "not around" any more, or won't be around as long as the many fine, deserving, younger players. Therefore, the Board has adopted a temporary rule that only players over the age of 60 will be considered for induction into the NSHF. Once all those players have been recognized and inducted, this temporary rule will be dropped.

The Board resolved to compile a list of such players by each board member and move on them as quickly as possible, hopefully at our next meeting at the 1st Annual Hall of Fame Tournament in Bourbon, Indiana, in May. Since the members of the Board are so geographically diverse, it is hoped that we will be able to compile an accurate, complete list of deserving "old timers." If you would like to suggest someone, please contact me or the Board member in your part of the country.

Because of the amount of ground we needed to cover at the meeting, annual elections of board members were postponed until the May Hall of Fame Tournament in Bourbon.

A good amount of time was spent on the application process. One of the determinations made was that incomplete applications cannot be accepted for consideration for induction into NSHF. The required petition and complete history enables the board to determine qualifications of the player. Without either of the two components, the application will not be considered.

It is very easy for any individual to inform the NSHF of someone to induct. And, while we do not want to make it hard to nominate someone, there must be more effort put forth to indicate one's conviction that the nominated person truly deserves induction. If the nominated person is not worth the effort of gathering petition signatures and documenting complete history, then the belief is that person's nomination is not strong enough.

This may sound harsh or overbearing, but the burden of this nomination cannot (at this point) be placed soley on the Board of the NSHF. In addition, the NSHF has received some complaints about being petitioned to sign a player's nomination when, in fact, they do not wish to do so, but feel pressured to sign. The petition should be signed only by people who are convinced the nominated person truly deserves induction into the NSHF.

The Board strongly feels that this conviction is an important component of the application process. Upon completion of the induction of all worthy over-60 players, an application fee will be required as an accompaniment to the petition and history. This application fee serves two purposes. First, and most important, it is an indication of the conviction of the petitioners that they strongly believe a person should be nominated into the NSHF. Consider how easy it is to sign something you may or may not know what it is, versus making a small donation along with your signature. Obviously, one is more likely to be convinced someone is deserving of induction when willing to financially support it.

Second, the NSHF has a long-term goal of acquiring a permanent location to house its shuffleboard history. This requires money, and it is necessary to employ various methods of fund-raising to achieve that goal.

Lastly, the NSHF is in the process of designing an official logo. We look forward to sharing it with The Shuffleboard World shortly. In addition we will continue (continued on Page 19)

March -- The Shuffleboard Federation, Inc. announces the results of its point standings, based on event finishes, matches won and number of players participating in their Pro Tour tournament schedule. **Glen Davidson** of Oklahoma leads with **John McDermott** of Michigan, **Eric Waldman** of California, and **Howard Mouton** of Texas following. Board Talk editors travel to Arizona to lend support to their 1st Open in Phoenix, only to find out that support wasn't needed -- 38 in the singles and 19 teams in the doubles. Three lone women --**Chris Danke** of California, **Diana Hagen** of Texas, and **Peggy Richards** of Arizona -- compete with the best. **Bellflower Bruce** captures the hearts of all the women in attendance by presenting each with a red rose. April -- The Shuffleboard Federation announces that **Bill Melton** of Oklahoma will head its Player Policy Board to develop uniform rules and formats for tournaments. The Board Talk temporarily discontinues its Top Player Ratings because of critcism.

May -- The Board Talk announces that effective January of 1989, subscription fees will be raised to \$15 a year due to increased mailing and printing costs.

June -- The Top Player Ratings are back, with more player input. Top players were: **Mickey Mickens**, New Jersey, Atlantic Division; **Don Cox**, California, Pacific Division; **Glen Davidson**, Oklahoma, Midwest Division; **Glen Young**, Arkansas, Mideast Division; and **Diana Hagen**, Texas, Women's Division.

July -- A big attraction at the Board Talk's 4th Annual Shufflers' Reunion at Beef's Shamrock Bar in Waterloo, Indiana, is a 33 ft. 8 inch board, billed as the longest in existence. Special guest, **Al Stewart** of A & M Amusement Service, El Monte, California, recalled playing on a 32-footer in San Diego in 1949. The Shuffleboard Federation announces the selection of players to serve with chairman **Bill Melton** on the Player Policy Board: **Gail Crane**, Michigan; **Bob Lewis**, Arizona; **Brenda Moore**, Texas; **Howard Mouton**, Texas; **Hal Perry**, California; **Jody Slack**, Coloardo; **Karl Spickelmier**, California; **Bobby Voorhis**, Indiana.

September -- Results of a player evaluation of the Board Talks's Shufflers' Reunion are tablulated. Almost 100% of the respondents rated "strong competition, fellowship with old and new shuffleboard friends, good sportsmanship, well-organized events, and good hosts who made them feel welcome and didn't inflate drink prices" as reasons they liked the tourney.

December -- Beef and Marge Camp, owners of the Shamrock Bar in Waterloo, Indiana, and PeeWee Fleshman, a local player, and Brian Crowl, president of the Playfair Shuffleboard Company in Fort Wayne, Ind., host three Japanese visitors to show them how to play the game. They purchased three 16-foot boards from Playfair. Why 16-footers instead of the regulation 22foot boards? Simply because of space restrictions in Japan; space is a precious commodity in Japan. The World of Shuffleboard has now gone "international."



How about we play to see who pays for that dinner we're gonna' have later on?"

Before he made his first shot, Tim once again asked Eddie: "Are you really sure you want to go through with this?" Eddie laughingly said: "You better believe I do, Mr. Tim" (and gave Lil a little wink with his right eye as he said it).

On Tim's first weight, he shot a right-cross lag, which wrapped around Eddie's l into a short 3. Eddie hollered: "What a lucky shot; that's not going to happen again!" Eddie didn't think he had room to go around and follow Tim's weight, so he went for the combo. He caught his own weight on the right side -- it was a hitand-go. Eddie laughed again, then mumbled something about "that'll never happen again either."

On Tim's second weight, instead of covering up, he lagged a left-cross which rode the rail and was also a short 3. Eddie was getting a little baffled now. He slammed down another shot of scotch before he approached the board. He announced: "I'm gonna' stick that left cross, my man, and give you something to shoot at!" He sized it up and then gently shot the left-cross. It looked good at first, but he barely missed the spot where the rail carried straight, and the drift took it to the left -and he was off the board!

Now Tim had two 3's on the table. On his third weight, again, instead of covering, he lagged a deep 3, which was dead-center. It was almost a four! Eddie wasn't laughing now, but Lil was. She commented: "What do you plan to do now, 'Mr. 5-Point Frisco'?" Eddie sneered at her and said: "I will stick the deep one in the center." He shot a "thumber" this time and, indeed, he stuck it head-on. It appeared that Eddie's weight was barely in front of the other two 3's. Eddie was laughing again then as he said: "We know about your lag, Mr. Tim, but let's see if you can hit a weight."

Tim was very casual throughout this whole thing and he just smiled back at Eddie. He sized up the weight and then let go a left-hand thumb shot. Tim's weight

caught Eddie's on its left side, taking it off the board....then sliding into a 4! That was it! With the 5-point spot, and the 10 points on the table, it was over!

Eddie had a look of total disbelief on his face. He was actually sick to his stomach. He sat down then and reached for another drink. He put his arms around both of them after they got out the door and said: "I think I'll have that giant fillet they serve there. It's pretty expensive, but who cares? Right, Eddie?"

They all got into the rental car, but Tim took the driver's seat as he had the least to drink. As they drove off from the house, they were all too "mellow" to notice a pair of headlights that turned on behind them. They were busy laughing and talking -- as those headlights stayed right with them on every turn....



Profile: The Wizard of Pembroke Pines, Pete O'Neill

Our 3rd Annual Florida Open turned out to be ver special. One of the nicest guys and a class act all the way won the singles champions and was part of the winning doubles championship.

At age 74, "Super Senior" Pete O'Neill stays your by playing in an in-house shuffleboard league two night a week. He's also a mentor, teacher and instructor. Alor with Chris Boyett and Charlie Fisher, he is helping to develop shuffleboard at Huddles Sports Cafe in Pembroke Pines, Florida.

The first thing you notice about Pete playing

shuffleboard is his great release and follow-through and, in my opinion, this is the main reason he is still so competitive. I'm curious by nature, so I asked Pete who had taught him such a great shuffleboard release. Pete smiled and said: "Let me tell you a little story." Well, as Pete's story unfolded, I was amazed. This is a baseball story and you may recognize some of the names mentioned. It's important to understand that the story timeframe takes place in the late 1940s. The following is my condensed version of Pete's classic tale:

"Well," Pete begins, "I was in the Brooklyn Dodgers' Minor League Farm System at Nashua, New Hampshire, in the New England League. Fuzzy Bavisi was our general manager. Walter Alston played first base and was our player-manager. Don Newcombe was one of our hot pitching prospects but was a little wild and was working on his control. His best pitch at the time was a 'brush back' pitch."

Pete laughs and pounds the table top in remembrance. "Roy Campanella was our catcher. Roy had a rifle of an arm but his throws to second base tended to sail a little. In fact, if you were sitting in the grandstands, you might think, at times, that Roy and our center fielder were playing catch."

Here I interrupt Pete to ask what he was working on in the minors. Pete smiles and says: "I was a southpaw pitcher with pretty good control and I was working on keeping the ball low. You know, Roy was great with all pitchers and he was a regular chatterbox during a game. But Roy would tell all of his pitchers -- 'forget the chatter; you concentrate only on my signal and where I want the ball. Nothing else.' After one of my better games, Roy put his arm around me and said: 'Pete, you know what I like about your pitching? I like your good control and balance, but what I like most is your great release and great follow-through.'"

Well, Pete had thrown me a curve ball, but the point is a correlation does exist between baseball and shuffleboard.

Pete is a master story teller and I wish I had time to tell you about how "Pete Learns Shuffleboard in Baltimore, Maryland, 1946" and his "Conference at the Pitching Mound" tale. Well, maybe next year....

Pete, you're a "major leaguer" now and we all love you. Congratulations! I'm going over now to my "home board" and practice my follow-through. Us minor leaguers are always working on something.

(Editor's Note: Please don't wait until next year to share Pete's tales. You've piqued our curiousity, particularly how, where, and who taught him how to play shuffleboard in Baltimore, Maryland. We bet we have some '40s players on our mailing list who would like to take credit for that! whole game into a hammer control contest and, you are right, the less-experienced player has even less of a chance to win. It also makes the coin flip a lot more important than it should be. If you win the hammer and the game starts from the better lagging end, it is a tremendous advantage.

In order to minimize the possibility of this happening, we decided that all the games would start at the same end. Because the format was two out of three, the thinking behind our decision was that if there was a board with a decided lagging advantage, at least both players would get a chance to have this advantage for one game. Much to my surprise, the players were very much opposed to doing it that way and we dropped the idea.

As far as your views on the draw lag, we are in total disagreement with you on this one. Part of what makes shuffleboard a great game is that there are so many different aspects -- hitting, sticking, sliding, lagging, are all important. Equally important is lagging defense. Watching top players play each other is a thing of beauty. If you let any good player lag in the same place every time, you are in for a long day (if you are doing it in a tournament, it will be a short day). Watching them try to force their opponent to lag in different areas through the use of short weights, or a deep one in their favorite lag spot, is one of the most intriguing aspects of our sport. Certainly, these players would have no trouble adapting to a game that did not require all the other skills such as keep hammer, frames format. The real question is why would anyone want to. To me, your version of shuffleboard sounds like golf without chipping and putting. If anyone feels that they need to improve their lag so they can compete in the modern era, we recommend you spend some time playing Deuces Wild or Horsecollar.

The fact that shuffleboard is much more of a finesse game now than it was when you learned is the primary reason why so many women are playing shuffleboard these days. It also is a major factor in making shuffleboard quite possibly the ultimate unisex sport. To go back to the style of play you advocate would cause players to head for the exits.

Dear George: As you know from our many conversations over the years on the subject of players wiping the weights on their shirts, I strongly disagree with your views. Perhaps the time has come to turn this from a private difference of opinion into a public discussion, kind of a shuffleboard version of point-counter point.
