# The Federation's 7th Annual NASC is Blockbuster!

The Shuffleboard Federation's 7th Annual North American Shuffleboard Championships at the Sands Regency Hotel Casino, Reno, Nevada, on Oct. 28-Nov. 3, was indeed a "blockbuster," with players from 16 states and Canada competing for a a share of the record-setting pot of \$187,675 including the \$6,000 added by the Sands

Regency. And, thanks to the time-tested talents of director John McDermott, bracketeer Rob Kern, a host of helpers, and a supportive host location, this BIG event set a pattern of professionalism with very few "glitches" (all of which will be addressed in the 8th Annual NASC, already in the planning stages).

The roster of participants in both the pro and amateur (and in between) ranks read like a "Who's Who in Table Shuffleboard" listing and they filled nearly all of the 11 events, played on 18 boards, to capacity.




# 1st Annual East Coast Showdown a Success!

The 1st Annual East Coast Showdown was held on November 8-10 at Harvey's Place in Street, Maryland. Players from New York, Pennsylvania, Maryland, Delaware, and Texas (yes, Texas!!!) went to the "Showdown" for the opportunity to grab a chunk (or two or three) of a total pot worth over \$8,500.

Torrential rains, flash floods, and tornado watches slowed down the arrival of some folks for the kick-off event, the open draw, but it ended up starting on time. Forty players put up their \$25 entry fee to take a shot at the \$3300 up for grabs. In the wee hours of the morning, it was Steve Bennett of New York and Charlie Walker of Texas who took over half the pot by double-dipping Dick Smedberg of New York and Rick Niblett of Maryland. Third place was taken by Wayne Nichols of Maryland and Louise Freer of Pennsylvania, with Brenda Wallace of Maryland and host Harvey Comer in fourth. Jim Wallace and Lindsay Hall, both of Maryland, took the fifth and final money spot.



Second place went to Rick Niblett and Len Dell of Maryland, and the third and final money spot was taken by Al DiBella and Louise Freer of Pennsylvania. The event finished early enough for the regular Saturday night round robin (\$10 double elimination), as well as pricier single-elimination round robins for those who like bigger risks.








Cindy Clark (left) of Arizona took fourth place. Melody Marine of Washington and Robin Powers of California finished 5th and 6th.

So, if you couldn't get a team together because you could not find a second lady for your team, here is a little advice: take one of the ladies in your area who is interested in the game and teach her to play."





# Nebraska Plays for Cystic Fibrosis -- "A Greater Cause"

Each year, players from around the state of Nebraska gather together to show that winning for yourself isn't always the most important thing. Sometimes winning for a greater cause is just as important -- our cause being the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation.

The tournament, held Oct. 25-26, is an A-B Draw, held at three bars, all within a mile radius of each other. The bars that are always used are: Sideline, owned by Len Walsky; Harold's, owned by Harold Newbanks; and the My Way, owned by Kevin Higbee.

This year, 30 players entered the tournament for an entry fee of \$10 per person. The league donates \$100 for purchases made for a silent auction, which raised \$301. The players only receive one-third of the entry fee back, with two-thirds going to Cystic Fibrosis. Many people also donated funds with the three bar owners matching one-half of the total pot. This year, with the silent auction, entry fees, donations, and the bar owner contributions, approximately \$800 was raised for Cystic Fibrosis.







They didn't have any money and neither did we, but George told them not to worry until we got an invoice. Then we received word that there would be no invoice and we celebrated with those senior citizens at an appreciation dinner, after which George gave them tips on the care of their new board, rules of the game, and some playing techniques. It was heartwarming to watch those 90 year old enthusiasts take that advice so seriously. This is just one of the many, many things that Sol Lipkin has done to earn himself the honor of being inducted into the Hall of Fame!

"All in all, it was a great tournament with many memories, a lot of new friends made, and fun was had by all.


Hoosiers (finally) Capture Bourbon Doubles Crown






Doug and Darrol did it again! "Not only are these two great players, they are nice guys -- Hall of Fame contenders," according to reporter Ralph Duarte.




opportune time. It was a pleasure to have visitors from the great state of Texas! And, since Charlie finished first in the draw, they ended up going back home after their vacation with a bonus!
