In the meantime, if you're going to be at the PCSA's Extravaganza VIII in Las Vegas, ask Eileen about further details or call her at 310-803-4943.



A Response to Ken's "To Seed or Not to Seed"

(Editor's Note: In the December 1995 issue, Ken Strong of Houston, Texas, posed some questions regarding the viability of seeding for shuffleboard. Board Talk George drafted a response, but missed the deadline for the January issue and receives no preferential treatment. Therefore, he had to wait until February to present his views.....)

Seeding is not new to shuffleboard. It has been tried and found to be very unpopular, except by the top players. Reasons why seeding is probably not necessary in our sport:

(1) Let's use professional tennis and college NCAA basketball as parallels. These are single elimination tournaments. In fact, I don't know of a double elimination tournament that seeds, the reason being -- if two top seeds meet in the first round, chances are the loser will live to play again in the finals.

(2) As for betters/spectators, betters are going to bet, even if they must ask for points or odds, and wouldn't it be great to pack a stadium with 50,000 plus spectators before a national TV audience for shuffleboard? As we all know, our spectators are made up mostly of the players themselves.

For those not familiar with seeding, you did a great job of explaining it, Ken, and who knows, they might want to try it again in the future. I know the pros would like seeding throughout all tournaments, so maybe they should use it in their pro singles and doubles for starters.

As for your question on sponsorship sales, maybe we could seed first, have the sponsor sale, then announce the seedings.

A Word from Manny About Two Hall of Fame Nominees

I would like to second Darrol Nelson's nomination for Billy Mays and Glen Davidson for the Shuffleboard Hall of Fame.

I played Glen several sessions and never came out ahead. One session, it seemed that whoever won the toss for the first hammer won the game. We thought about skipping shuffleboard and just flipping coins. Even at that, I came out on the short end.

The last session we had, I was down two games to one and had Glen, 14-11. This wouldn't have made the game even, but I would have come out ahead as the ante had risen considerably on the last game. My third weight was a deuce. Glen elected to gamble with a deep three. I stuck on a big four right in front of my deuce. As I was counting my money, I knew that on a combo, the best he could hope for was a three. That crazy man out-lagged my big four! I said something to the effect that this would be my last time to play him -- and it was!

I only played against Billy Mays when I had to, such as at a couple of tournaments. I don't know why anyone in their right mind would play him 20 years ago. Billy didn't win all of the tournaments in the '60s and '70s, but he always won the money. I never saw him lose a money game that counted. It is my opinion that Billy Mays is, or at least was, the greatest shuffleboard player of all time, and has contributed more to the game than anyone I know. He certainly belongs in the Hall of Fame.

Ken Responds to Glen's Concerns

(Editor's Note: In the last issue, Glen Davidson asked: "What good are rules if they are not enforced?" Ken Strong of Houston, Texas, takes the time to respond to his concerns.)

Rules/Officials:No question. I am in total agreement with Glen on this one. Rules need to be posted (a big display is preferred) and adhered to for each tournament; tournament officials/referees should also be posted. As for officials/tournament directors, I guess I haven't run across the problems that Glen mentions, but I do believe that some of the officials for a given tournament need to be selected from the players and represent the various factions of the players. Hell, the tournament director has enough to do to keep the tournament running smoothly, but if the director wants to play, as most directors do, then he/she must accept the rules and the official's decisions the same as the rest of the players.

Weights: This is a tough one, but I tend to agree with Glen. It seems to me that a player who can make it across the country for a prominent tournament ought to be able to afford his/her own set of legal weights. I also believe that good-quality, consistent house weights should be provided for tournament play for those players not having their own weights.

Boards: We all know it takes a lot of work to set boards up for a tournament, but invariably it seems like in every tournament there is one really bad board that cannot be made acceptable for play. Players quickly learn which board it is and no one wants to play on it. And I agree with Glen that this type of board should be taken out of the tournament. The old adage that everyone has to play the board is not necessarily true. A player could go through the entire tournament and never draw the board. To win on a really bad board generally requires pure luck -- not skill. I also believe that the temporary boards brought in for a tournament that simply "settle in" unevenly during the tournamend should be tweaked before play begins that day.

Brackets: There should be no reason for violating brackets. Brackets, both winner's and loser's sides, are well defined. For a given event, when the number of teams is known and **before sponsorship sales**, bracket numbering and board numbering are defined on the brackets. For a non-seeded tournament and **after sponsorship sales**, teams blind draw numbers for position on the pre-numbered brackets. Simple. Rules such as no back-to-back games on the same board and/or play first-available board require posting in the rules, i.e., up front.

Dusting the boards: Glen did not mention this one, but there are rules on dusting the board during a game and I see these rules being flagrantly violated in nearly every tournament that I have participated in or witnessed. I thought that **lightly** dusting the rails up to the near foul line or **lightly** dusting obvious dry spots was the accepted rule. The object is to keep the board shooting as consistently as possible throughout the game. But I see players "drowning" the entire ends of the board, which obviously changes the speed of the board. This is tantamount to taking a wrench and lowering the ends during the game, i.e., tampering with the board. I believe there is a rule on players not being able to tamper with the boards.





February -- Two new features are added to *The Board Talk*: the quarterly "Play Your Way Across the U.S.A." listing of shuffleboard establishments which are subscribers, and the monthly Shuffleboard Tournament Calendar. There are 37 sites in 13 states on this first "map" and six events on the calendar. **Bellflower Bruce** of California becomes a part of the Shuffleboard Directory and remains so today.

March -- In a special feature, **Jim Yank** of Pennsylvania shared his views about the responsibility of established players teaching novices: "The game of shuffleboard needs people to teach newcomers how to shoot and practice properly. If the game is to expand we, as A and B shooters, have to take the time and patience to teach others the basic rules of the game." **Glen Davidson** of Oklahoma calls on players to "get organized" and further the cause of shuffleboard: "It's time we all start getting back something we have put into shuffleboard for the past 20 to 30 years. Now is the time to ask or demand our fair share of the profits!" **Ted Z** announces that his new tavern, The Best Little Wherehouse in Temecula, Calif., has two boards and invites "traveling hustlers" to visit.

May -- Increased advertising and subscribers have given a new lease on life to *The Board Talk*. The Calendar has grown to 10 upcoming events; the "Play Your Way Across the U.S.A." listing has grown to 49 sites in 16 states. Editors George and Donna look ahead with optimism: "In 1996, we'll mount a *Board Talk* banner on each side of a mobile home and hit the road, traveling from one tourney to the next, recording the historical moments in The World of Shuffleboard."

July -- **P.T.**, owner of P.T.'s Shuffleboard Alley in Houston, Texas, receives praise for being the first tournament host to pay for out-of-town players' lodging.

September -- Michigan's John McDermott salutes Oklahoma's Bill Melton as "a man who puts back into the game much more than he takes out. In addition to being a champion of the game he loves, he also works tirelessly for the advancement of the sport." October -- In a special feature, **Rita Yank** of Pennsylvania says it's time for male shooters to realize that shuffleboard is for both sexes: "When a female shoots a male....he becomes amazed that she can shoot, shocked that she knows the game, embarrassed when she beats him and mad because it was done by a woman." Board Talk George starts ranking the Top 20 players in the USA, reflecting the "limited information and observations of the editors." The top 10 of the 20 (in order) were: **Darrol Nelson**, Oregon; **Billy Mays**, Texas; **Doug Buhl**, California; **John McDermott**, Michigan; **Bill Melton**, Oklahoma; **Glen Davidson**, Oklahoma; **Mickey Mickens**, New Jersey; **Lee McDonald**, Michigan; **Ed Graves**, Oklahoma; and **Dave Williams**, Texas.

November -- The "Play Your Way Across the U.S.A." listing has grown to 81 sites in 17 states -- and Canada! The Top 20 list has shifted dramatically, based on tournament finishes and reader input: Billy Mays in first, followed by John McDermott in second and Darrol Nelson in third, Glen Davidson of Oklahoma in fourth, Bill Melton in fifth, **Howard Mouton** of Texas and **Earl Kelly** of Texas in sixth and seventh, Ed Graves in eighth, **J.R. Lopez** of Michigan in ninth; and Dave Williams still in tenth. For the first time, a woman shows up on the list, **Diana Hagen** of Texas in No. 18. The Top 10 subscription states are (in order): Texas, California, Michigan, Indiana, Oregon, Oklahoma, Arizona, Delaware, Missouri and Maryland (*Editors' Note: compare that with the back panel of this 1996 issue*).

December -- The Top 20 remains pretty stable, except for a couple of players who have worked their way into the top half -- **Rick Boyer** of Texas in third and **Sam Summers** of Oklahoma in 7th. A "kid" from Indiana, **Bobby Voorhis**, has made his way to No. 11 and Diana Hagen is now No. 17. As the year ends, George's picks are being challenged -- as he had hoped would happen.

Three Canadian shufflers -- Mike Jacoby, Harvey Groleau, and John Komadaski -- travelled 1500 miles (one-way) to attend the 2nd Annual Board Talk Shufflers' Reunion at the Log Cabin, Howell, Michigan, over the July 4th weekend. Mike and Harvey, even though they were accustomed to playing on 14-foot boards, finished 3rd in the Open Doubles.




