Bill & Billy Melton "Do It Again" at Bourbon

At 6:15 a.m. Sunday, May 7, the two remaining teams out of the 70 that started the marathon 35th Annual Bourbon Spring Doubles/1st Annual National Shuffleboard Hall of Fame Tournament on Saturday morning delivered their final strokes on Board 3 at the American Legion Post 424 in Bourbon, Indiana.

When Bill and Billy Melton of Oklahoma, last year's champions in the 34th Annual Bourbon Spring Doubles, met and defeated the undefeated Hoosiers Jim DeWitt and Bob Brown Sr. on Board 2, and again on Board 3, the crowd that had packed the American Legion since Thursday had thinned down to a handful of observers, including director Fritzi Broka, who had slept in a back room on a hospital cot to protect the "humoungous" sponsor sale kitty from the night before. Also "hanging in there" after the vast majority of participants had long ago folded was Jimmy (the cop) Kumpula, Detroit/Florida, who had taken a chance on the "dark horse" team of DeWitt and Brown in a field of the best shooters from 16 states and Canada. Another faithful gallery observer was Mike Melton (son and brother of the top contenders) who said: ""Boy, Dad's going to rag on Billy for that shot," even though Billy had drawn a 4 to beat out tournament favorites John McDermott (Michigan) and Bob Shaw (Texas) in an earlier game.

At this hour, even the crew on the train that goes roaring past the American Legion and shakes its foundations at regular intervals had taken a break and it was quiet, quiet, quiet.....The only time it had been quiet in three long days and nights....

Fallen by the wayside in the quest to win the 1st NSHF/35th Annual Bourbon Spring Tournament, but still in the money, were: Jeff Cottrell and Mark Holland, Michigan (another long shot), 3rd; John McDermott and Bob Shaw, 4th; Garry Young and John Myles, Michigan; Bobby Voorhis, Indiana, and Jim Allis, Washington, 5th and 6th; Buddy Broka, Indiana, and Fred Thuman, California, Tom and Greg Massie, Indiana, 7th and 8th;



News and Views from The World of Shuffleboard

More on The Hall of Fame from Ed Galke....

In reply to the March story from Balboa Ron recalling Tacoma Tim's story to Frisco Eddie and Lil, detailing the matches played by the mystery man at Longview, Washington, in 1963, I would be willing to bet anything I own that this man was Kid Spooks. All of the mannerisms and play would indicate this to be so. Kid Spooks was a phenomenal player at that style of game. I also feel that he would be very adept at the present style of play.

For a couple of reasons, I disagree with Glen Davidson's comments in the March '96 Board Talk concerning the requirements to be nominated and consequently admitted to the Shuffleboard Hall of Fame.

Regarding the over-60 age limit for the present time I feel is fair, but all prudence should be taken to assure any deserving player to be considered based upon the documentation the board has decreed. I also feel that a player's consideration should be based upon the input from players other than his own home area. I do not mean that this home town input should be totally ignored, but I feel that one of the strongest requirements should be that this player's skills -- not his personality -- are ranked by as wide an audience as possible. A lot of players can dominate their local areas, depending upon the caliber of his competition. I feel it takes a pretty damn good player to more than hold his own on the road. Therefore, I feel that the perception of as many opponents and geographical areas as possible should weigh more heavily than local judgements. Naturally some player's playing skills are known before he ever gets into a certain area. How well he plays against the local competition in any area he visits should be a considerable factor.

As to the issue raised by Louise Freer or the board

regarding the nomination of individuals for the Hall of Fame, I must take exception. I have already gone on record as to my sentiments that I feel strongly that I belong in the Shuffleboard Hall of Fame. I can quote my playing ability no matter where I compete in the country for one factor. I can also state that I have played an above average game for all of my 50 years of play encompassing all styles of play, but I should not have to do this thing which I personally feel is demeaning to me.

The area of the country where I started to play and still live has no shuffleboard players, with the lone exception of Dick Smedberg. If I were to be so presumptuous as to lobby for support and documentation in my area, it would take a prodigious effort on my part or any potential person who would deign to sponsor me to local people who have not been active in the game for the past 4() years if they were even alive or still residing in the area. There are enough top players in all areas of the country where I have competed who can vouch for my playing skills. I want it known that I am not one of the players who have petitioned the board's members to sign any petition for me. I did discuss with Glen Davidson at the Mickey Mickens tournament in the presence of Judy Gartland what my personal beliefs were as to whether I belong in the Hall of Fame. The reason I expressed myself in front of Judy was that she is one of the persons who would have known of my abilities. She was of the opinion that my personality was a factor that would weigh against me and so informed Glen. I agree that I am not Mr. Personality. But I defy you to show me any person who has put more effort into both promoting the game and playing the game all over this country.

As far as the validation of a player's past playing credentials, these can be elicited from the player and checked by persons he names in any geographical areas he has played.

I do not agree that nominations should require a cash donation to merit possible consideration for the Hall. No other sport that I am aware of has a like requirement and I feel that it presents the appearance of begging for funds and also it may present the impression that the heavier the donation, the more consideration given that person's nomination, or the appearance of buying one's way in. I have stated in the past that each tournament that has their entries and results published in The Board Talk pay a minimal fee towards the Hall of Fame, even if a small percentage was deducted from each 50-50 pot. This would surely help.



I really feel that on the basic issues relating to the game, John has some very fine points and he is always looking to promote the teaching of the game and to bring a sense of fairness to it. Even though we all have our very own agendas, I think the truly dedicated players have the best interests of the players at heart. Naturally, one of my interests were for me to travel wherever I heard there were players of some skill. My competitive spirit made me want to challenge these players at their own boards. Of course, if during the course of this play, a couple of hundred dollars changed hands, it made it that much more interesting and stopped the old story of: I wasn't really trying if you beat the opposition, in which they had a financial interest. How many of you have heard that lame excuse that your opponent wasn't really trying because there was nothing on the game.

I really want to address the issues covered by John McDermott in your April issue, but it would be too much for this next issue to cover, In my next letter, I will try and answer each specific area as it pertains to my thoughts.

First, we've got an "inside tip" that the mystery man was not Kid Spooks, so don't place your bet yet, Ed. Second, we'll leave it up to the NSHF Board of Directors to respond to your concerns regarding the induction process. Third, thank you for opening this opportunity to tell ALL citizens of The World of Shuffleboard: If you are withholding your financial support for the Hall of Fame simply because you do not agree with all the principles/criteria the board has set down, keep this in mind......For the past two years, six people have worked VOLUNTARILY to make a dream a reality and have literally begged for input on this vital project. Art Green on Keep/Switch Hamme

I have played shuffleboard since I was 16. Joe Muniz and Troy Tolbert taught me. Joe played keep hammer; Troy played switch. I quit in 1985 at 37 year old and began to play again in 1995.

The keep hammer was a good game at first becau I learned to hit with force, and to slide off of deep weights into the scoring zone. This was mainly a bangbang game and one which good players would very school lag against an opponent's pucks. Drive weights slide off deep ones into a two or more. Not much pressure in this style, knowing if you go off the board, you maintain hammer. The switch hammer -- much more pressure.

I truly believe something has to be done to make shuffleboard games last on the average of about 20 to minutes instead of 35 minutes to 1 hour. The keep hammer frame game can go fast, but as many of us know, the winner of the coin flip has a huge advantage he can blast weights. Even though boards are set up fo good pass wieghts, a player with any smarts in a short keep hammer frame game is not going to throw a weig on a clear board to any spot where his opponent can prin a frame game where he has control of the hammer.

If we go back to a big blast game, we come up we the same problems we once had; namely damage to purand boards, also big trails through the wax. And sometimes other things, like what I once did when shooting a combo. I made the combo, but my weight that I shot (continued on Page




