Bourbon, Indiana, May 4, 1996 -- Whether you're here in person, or in spirit, the National Shuffleboard Hall of Fame (NSHF) Board of Directors and the American Legion Post 424 welcome you to this historic event!

After years of talking and wishing and dreaming about a Hall of Fame for shufflers, a small group of dedicated, determined leaders in our World of Shuffleboard decided to do more than talk and wish and dream. Led by Glen Davidson of Oklahoma, a veteran shuffler whose career has spanned several decades, the group met in Las Vegas, Nevada, on Feb. 3, 1995, during the Pacific Coast Shuffleboard Association's Extravaganza VII, to form the NSHF, a non-profit association. Its purpose: to serve the shuffleboard community with dignity, honor, and prestige in its quest to seek out and recognize excellence for all deserving participants in the world of shuffleboard.

A board of directors was elected: Glen Davidson, president; Hal Perry, California, vice-president; Bob Hunt, California, chief financial officer; Louise Freer, Pennsylvania, secretary; Larry Creakbaum, Indiana, director; and Jim Foran, Washington, director.

A small segment of the population of The World of Shuffleboard jumped on board immediately with contributions and pledges of support. Most, however, took a "wait and see" attitude and like all "infant" associations, the NSHF had its share of growing pains. The board was frustrated by the lack of feedback from the people it

hoped to serve. It took almost a year before shufflers started responding to the directors' pleas for input on the induction process and for nominations for induction.

To date, four players, all deceased, have been inducted into the NSHF: Bob Miles, Oregon; Mickey Mickens, New Jersey; Earl Kelly, Texas; and PeeWee Ramos, California. It's the directors' goal to honor players over the age of 65 while they are still living.

Another goal of the NSHF Board of Directors is to have a permanent "home" to display all the memorabilia tracing the history of shuffleboard. That takes big bucks and will likely be a long-term goal.




NSHF President Glen Davidson of Oklahoma will be there to see a giant step forward toward his long-time dream.

John's Views on Wiping Weights

(Editor's Note: In last month's issue, John McDermott responded to views expressed by Ray Boyett and Ed Galke on a number of issues. We ran out of space before he had the opportunity to challenge Board Talk George on the issue of wiping weights, but promised to continue this month.....)

As you know from our many conversations over the years on the subject of players wiping the weights on their shirt, I strongly disagree with your views. Perhaps the time has come to turn this from a private difference of opinion into a public discussion -- kind of a shuffleboard version of point-counter point.

You do not feel that players should wipe their weights on their clothing because of the possibility that some foreign substance could be applied to the weight. I feel this is ridiculous given the fact that any foreign substance on the board or the weights would harm the performance of the weight, not help it. The whole idea of wiping the weights to begin with is to ensure there is no foreign substance present.

The reason why most of the top players wipe their weights off before shooting is that most of them have probably been cheated at some point in time by someone wetting the bottom of their weight. For those of you who have never experienced this, I hope you never do. It's pretty easy to tell if someone does this to you -- your weight will only go a few feet and there will be a track as wide as the weight because the wet weight will pick up all the wax. This has happened to me only twice in 20 years, although I understand from the older players that this used to happen fairly often. It should be noted that because of players and/or spectators carrying drinks, it is possible that a few drops of moisture from a drink or condensation, or even a drop of sweat in the summer can

end up in the gutter and subsequently affect a weight.

On one of the two occasions where this happened to one of my weights, I did not wipe it on my shirt as I normally do. Because it was summer and very hot in the bar (which had poor air conditioning), many of the players were sweating. It was a crucial situation (he was leading 14 to 13 and it was my hammer). My opponent had a weight about 3/4 of the way down the board. I lagged my weight which proceeded to stop several feet short of the scoreboard. I went and picked up the weight and looked at the bottom and, sure enough, it was wet. The thing I regretted was that it put a doubt in my mind about the integrity of my opponent who, prior to that time, I had no reason to distrust. This could have been avoided if I had wiped off my weight. Because of the conditions in the bar, I had no way of knowing whether it was just an unfortunate break or if I was cheated, but wiping off the weight would have erased those doubts from my mind.

George, you say we could accomplish the same thing by wiping the weight on the carpeting inside the frame. I say this is a poor answer for several reasons. First and foremost, if foreign substances are the concern, someone could easily put a foreign substance on the carpeting inside the frame. Secondly, the inside of virtually every frame I have ever seen has been covered with some type of non-absorbent material. I always wear cotton shirts for this reason.

Most frames have some form of carpeting around the inside. Carpeting is made of synthetic non-absorbent materials. Trying to wipe off a weight on this type of material would be as futile as trying to wipe up a spill with Saran Wrap. Furthermore, these surfaces generally have years of accumulated silicone over spray and nicotine build-up. Many other boards have vinyl padding; no further explanation is required for these types of boards. To sum it up, the inside of the frame is the last place I would consider wiping off a weight.

My problem with this entire subject goes beyond a simple difference of opinion. I have spoken to literally dozens of players who also wipe off their weights. We feel that you are doing an injustice to the game by making an issue out of this. As more and more of your new subscribers fall into the category of "less experienced," you are placing doubts in their minds about the integrity of players they see.

I am sure that this letter will not change your opinions on this subject. However, speaking on behalf (continued on Page 8)





January --



Al and Von Stewart were recognized for their years of distinguished service to shuffleboard with a plaque from The Shuffleboard Federation and a standing ovation from the crowd at the PCSA's Extravaganza in Las Vegas on Jan. 12-16.

March -- At the Arizona Open, **Diana Hagen** of Texas becomes the first woman to take a first-place trophy in an open doubles tournament.

May -- Al Stewart, A & M Amusement Service, El Monte, California, thanks all the people who responded when he fell while loading a board for delivery and cracked his ribs. One of his competitors, Bob Lewis, flew in from Phoenix, Arizona, and aided by Joe Muniz, Billy Chiles, Jay Kimble and Andy Smeder, finished Al's interrupted delivery. Editors travel East for the Benedict family's 1st Annual Genesee Open in Sherburne, New York, directed by Dick Gorman. Women shufflers write another chapter in the sport's history by taking all three top places in singles event at the "Shufflin' Neighbors" tourney in Omaha, Nebraska: Cyndi Busch, Gwynette Orsi, and Maggie Worley.

July-August -- This has not been a good year for Al & Von Stewart. Following his fall, he develops pneumonia, she sprains her ankle, then has a massive heart attack that requires a triple by-pass. They are forced to use all their life savings to pay a portion of the medical bills and then The World of Shuffleboard steps in. The editors' 86year-old Mom crochets an aphgan and Trudy Broka of Ohio made a wreath to be auctioned off at the 5th Annual Shufflers' Reunion. Then, West Coast players, under the leadership of Lou Lusero, and the PCSA, establish a Stewart Benefit Fund, which helps pay off the staggering \$89,000 medical bill. 



The bring partner tournament wasn't the only event for this fun-filled weekend at Texas Mist. Friday night's draw partner event attracted 44 players




