From Omaha, Nebraska:


My husband Tim and I bought the Musette Bar, located in Benson (Omaha), Nebraska, in February of 1996. Within two weeks, Tim, an avid shuffleboard player, had located, purchased and installed a classic shuffleboard. The shuffleboard now occupies the same space where a shuffleboard had been located for over 30 years. The previous owner had sold the board, declaring: "Darts are the game of the future; shuffleboard is dead." Talk about having to eat your words!

I have played in various pool leagues and tournaments over the last 20 years, but have been lacking the enthusiasm needed to enjoy the game. It seemed logical for me to focus my attention on shuffleboard. I had been a spectator for years, watching shuffleboard tournaments that Tim would compete in, so at least I knew how to keep score!

This year we formed a solid mixed team which includes four rookies and two experienced players. We are currently in the running for seventh place out of 16 teams. The Musette Bar took second place in the men's league after being out of the league for over five years. While playing leagues, there is a sense of community among the players. The players seem willing to help the less experienced and give advice on certain shots, sometimes without encouragement to do so. Many of the folks on the leagues have welcomed the Musette back into The World of Shuffleboard while exclaiming that the Musette had once been nationally recognized as the place to find a good game. Of course, being the novice that I am, I wouldn't have been aware of the legends that may have played at the Musette, but hope that some of their expertise may come my way.



<u>Lags Determining Factor in Events at Piccolo's</u>






2nd Annual Bill Gibbs Memorial Held in Phoenix



They started out weight-for-weight for several frame and their opponents were turning out to be pretty darn good. Ironically, the game ended up 15-13 with Lil an Eddie as losers!


Heartland Handicap Another Success for Oklahoma



Hall of Famer Glen Davison of Oklahoma teamed up with Hoosier Mike Johnson to take first place.




Director Terry Dowell (center) presents first-place plaques to Mike Johnson and Glen Davidson.

The Bourbon American Legion Auxiliary's barbecue chicken and swiss steak cook-out was its usual big attraction, along with prizes awarded throughout the tournament.



Ed Galke Has Ideas for Gaining National Sponsorship for Shuffleboard

Some time ago, John McDermott expressed an interest in what I felt should be used to try and determine methods for both rating systems and national sponsorship, which is needed to keep this game viable. The following is just some sort of an outline that can be adapted to local usage and conditions.

Shuffleboard Survey for Potential National Sponsorhip

Dear Sister or Brother Shuffleboard Players:

If you are a fairly active player in leagues and tournaments, you are well aware of the appalling lack of local or national sponsorship by the manufacturers of products we all use either to and from these activities and most definitely at these functions. I think it is time that the sport or game of shuffleboard and its players finally make a concerted effort to attract this local and national sponsorship to further promote our mutual interests.

Without taking the individual time and effort to assemble the statistics and demographics to knowledgeably collect and present these figures to any potential sponsors, we will never achieve the stature of all the other competing sports, all of which at one time faced the same situation that shuffleboard faces today. As you know, these sports all started out without any serious sponsorship and with that sponsorship came local and finally national recognition. Golf and bowling are two activities that started out like shuffleboard and now, if you follow these sports on TV, you know that pool and dart leagues and tournaments are becoming very successful.

Would you please take the personal time and effort to fill out this questionnaire so that, for the first time, we can collectively present to manufacturers and distributors of the products we all use a true picture of the use of these potential sponsors' products. Some of the following information could be optional if you prefer to remain as an unidentified person, or if you feel this is an invasion of your personal privacy. I have been at this game for over 52 years with no gaps in between and I know that the major companies making and selling products we all use have no idea of the potential for business that we as a sport or hobby or form of recreation represent for them in potential sales. Without this awareness, we will never get the sponsorship needed to make this become a truly recognized game. I can envision a genuine professional sport with the proper funding and sponsonship of teams and individuals just as all of the other sports have become. Thank you.

(1) Name, mailing address, telephone number

(2) Are you a participant in any organized leagues?

(3) Have you played in any local, regional or national tournaments?

(4) What is the farthest distance you have travelled to play? (5) How far would you be willing to travel to compete in a truly recognized tournament, with local or ^ national sponsors?

For League Players:

(1) How many teams or players in your league? (2) Is it a house league -- how many players? (3) Is it a travel league -- how many teams, players per team? (4) If you play in a travel league, what is the farthest you travel to any location? (5) Is there any form of sponsorship or monies put up by anyone other than actual players? (6) How many times a year do you participate in your league? (7) What sort or brand of product do you normally use? (8) Do you drink beer -- what brand? (9) Do you drink liquor -- what brand? (10) Do you smoke cigarettes - what brand? (11) Do you smoke cigars -what brand? (12) What brand of gas do you use in your car? (13) Do you have food at your league? (14) What sort and brand of shuffleboard products do you use? (15) Is there a league requirement for certain waxes or sprays? (16) What is the manufacturer of your board? (17) What weights do you use? (18) Do you have league weights? **Tournament Players:**

(1) Have you played in any tournaments other than local? 25-mile radius? (2) How far would you travel to play in a nationally sponsored tournament? (3) How far have you travelled to play in the past? (4) How many times have you travelled to play? (5) What sort of format interests you the most: singles? doubles draw partner? doubles bring partner? mixed doubles? team events and what kind? (6) When you play in any of these tournaments, how do you get there? Do you fly -- what airline? Do you take bus or train -- name? Do you drive? What gas do you use? (7) Which motels do you normally use? (8) What restaurants do you normally use when travelling? (9) Do you eat in local restaurants when playing at tournaments? (10) What other services do you use locally when you play in tournaments? (11) What is the farthest distance you have travelled to play in tournaments? (12) What is the farthest you would travel to play in major nationally sponsored tournaments? (13) Would you play in a tournament that was only sponsored by one brand of beer or any other product? (I feel that a tournament sponsored by a specific product should only sell that sponsor's product for the duration of the tournament. I think this would add more incentive for a particular sponsor to participate. When I say sponsor, I am not only referring to trophies and jackets, but actual cash monies to make it worthwhile for players to travel to play in these sponsored tournaments. This would also lead to companies sponsoring individuals and teams to participate in these events.)

All or any of the previously mentioned questions can be adapted or changed depending on local situations by anyone who truly has the interests of shuffleboard in mind. I will tell you that without your interest in furthering the game, it will stay as it is or it will once again recede as it has done in the past.

As you all know, one of the primary reasons that the game of shuffleboard is still viable is the appearance of The Board Talk, with the addition of Shuffleboard World, The Shuffleboard Federation, the Evergreen Shuffleboard Association, as well as others I am not even aware of. I feel this game can be promoted to the extent that all sponsors and participants can mutually benefit. As one of the requirements necessary to the fair and equal conditions for play, I think the following is necessary: **Rating Systems:**

There should be detailed official scores kept of each game at any league or tournament events. This includes players' full names and scores of each game played and against who. Any information gathered should be sent to one central location to be categorized so as to form a true picture of every player's capabilities for future handicap ratings.

All players in any tournament or league, to the best of their knowledge, should rank or rate the quality or ability of the players known to them, either by 1-2-3-4 or A-B-C-D-E. This would assist the various rating and handicap systems being devised in various parts of the country to arrive at a more equitable way for players of varying degrees to compete against one another. This would definitely promote a greater interest in this sport. With the efforts of people such as Ron and Debbie Bowers and Ron and Sharon Huddleston, this game is progressing. But we can all make their jobs easier by furnishing as much specific input as we can to speed up the process. For too long, only certain people or groups have carried the game to where it is now. With the concerted efforts of all truly interested players and sponsors, this game has every chance to be a nationally-recognized entity. In Conclusion:

For anyone interested, please revise these general outlines to suit your individual needs. I am sure that with the proper documentation, these very reluctant sponsors can be brought on board. As you all know, everyone is just interested in what you can do for them. I think we can convince them just exactly what we can do for them.

I also feel that with the power to boycott certain products at specific tournaments or leagues, we can exert pressure that would be beneficial to us as participants.
